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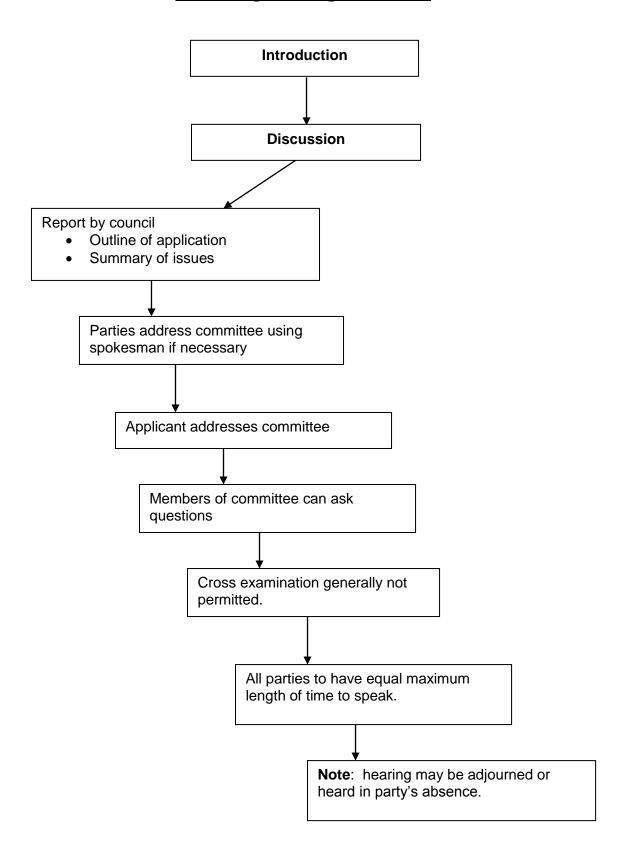
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### **Licensing Hearing Flowchart**

### **Purpose**

To consider an application for a new premises licence in respect of Supersam, 141-143 Eign Street, Hereford, HR4 0AJ.

### Recommendation

#### THAT:

The sub-committee determine the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community. They should give appropriate weight to:

- The steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives,
- The representations (including supporting information) presented by all parties,
- The guidance issued to local authorities under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003, and
- The Herefordshire Council statement of licensing policy 2015 2020.

### **Options**

- 1. There are a number of options open to the sub-committee:
  - a) Grant the licence subject to conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application and the mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003,
  - b) Grant the licence subject to modified conditions to that of the operating schedule where the committee considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and add mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003,
  - c) To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates
  - d) To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premise supervisor, or
  - e) To reject the application.

### **Reasons for Recommendations**

2. Ensures compliance with the Licensing Act 2003.

### **Key Considerations**

### **Licence Application**

- 2. The application (appendix 1) for a new premises licence has received representation and is brought before the committee for determination.
- 3. The details of the application are:

### **Summary of Application**

4. The application requests a new premises licence to allow the following licensable activities, during the hours shown as follows:

Sale of Alcohol (Off Premises)

All days 07:00 – 23:00 Non Standard Timings: None

#### **Previous Licence**

- 5. The premises was previously licensed for the sale of alcohol between 0800 to 2200 on all days of the week.
- 6. The licence was issued 8 January 2015 and was revoked following an expedited review of the licence on 15 December 2016 as a result of the premises being involved in the sale of non-duty paid and smuggled tobacco.

### **Summary of Representations**

- 7. Two (2) representations have been received from the responsible authorities (police and trading standards).
- 8. Both the police and trading standards have objected outright to the licence being granted.
- 9. The police representation can be found attached (appendix 2) as can the trading standard representation (appendix 3).

### **Community Impact**

10. Any decision is unlikely to have any significant effect of the local community.

### **Equality duty**

- 11. This report has human rights implications for both the premises licence holder and the residents from the local neighbourhood. Any of the steps outlined in section 1 of this report may have financial implications for a licensee's business and livelihood and/or may have impact upon the day to day lives of residents living in close proximity to the premises.
- 12. Article 8(i) of the European Convention of Human Rights provides that everyone has the right to respect for his/her private and family life and his/her home (which includes business premises). This right may be interfered with by the council on a number of grounds including the protection of rights and freedoms of others. The First Protocol Article 1 also provides that every person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of his possessions and shall not be deprived of his possessions except in the public interest and conditions provided for by law. Members must accordingly make a decision which is proportionate to the hearing and endeavour to find a balance between the rights of the applicant, residents and the community as a whole.
- 13. There are not considered to be any equalities implications arising from this report.

### Financial implications

14. There are unlikely to be any financial implications for the authority at this time.

### **Legal Implications**

15. The licensing authority must have regard to the promotion of the four licensing objectives namely; the prevention of crime and disorder; public safety; the prevention of public nuisance; and the protection of children from harm in exercising its functions

- under the Licensing Act 2003. Further regard should be had to the statutory guidance under Section 182 of the Act and the council's own statement of licensing policy.
- 16. The options available to the licensing authority on considering this application under the Licensing Act 2003 are set out in section 1 of this report.
- 17. The case of Daniel Thwaites Plc v Wirral Borough Magistrates' Court (Case No: CO/5533/2006) at the High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division Administrative Court on 6 May 2008, [2008] EWHC 838 (Admin), 2008 WL 1968943, Before the Honourable Mrs Justice Black.
- 18. In this case it was summed up that:-
  - A licensing authority must have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. Licensing authorities may depart from it if they have reason to do so but will need to give full reasons for their actions.
- 19. Furthermore the Thwaites case established that only conditions should be attached to a licence with a view to promoting the licensing objectives and that 'real evidence' must be presented to support the reason for imposing these conditions. It should be noted that hearsay evidence is admissible in the context of making decisions on licensing matters.
- 20. This judgement is further supported in the case of The Queen on the Application of Bristol Council v Bristol Magistrates' Court, CO/6920/2008 High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division The Administrative Court, 24 February 2009, [2009] EWHC 625 (Admin) 2009 WL 648859 in which it was said:
  - 'Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for licensing objectives'.
- 21. In addition to this it was stated that any condition attached to the licence should be an enforceable condition.

### **Right of Appeal**

22. There is a right of appeal to the Magistrates Court within 21 days of being notified in writing of the decision in relation to both the decision in relation to the review under Section 53C and in relation to review of the interim steps under Section 53D

### **Risk Management**

23. There is little risk associated with the decision at this time as the legislation allows a right of appeal to the Magistrates Court within a period of 21 days of being notified of the decision in writing.

### **Background Papers**

The following guidance is issued under Section 182 of the Act in respect of steps to promote the licensing objectives:

### Steps to promote the licensing objectives

- 8.38 In completing an operating schedule, applicants are expected to have regard to the statement of licensing policy for their area. They must also be aware of the expectations of the licensing authority and the responsible authorities as to the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and to demonstrate knowledge of their local area when describing the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives. Licensing authorities and responsible authorities are expected to publish information about what is meant by the promotion of the licensing objectives and to ensure that applicants can readily access advice about these matters. However, applicants are also expected to undertake their own enquiries about the area in which the premises are situated to inform the content of the application.
- 8.39 Applicants are, in particular, expected to obtain sufficient information to enable them to demonstrate, when setting out the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives, that they understand:
  - the layout of the local area and physical environment including crime and disorder hotspots, proximity to residential premises and proximity to areas where children may congregate:
  - any risk posed to the local area by the applicants' proposed licensable activities; and
  - any local initiatives (for example, local crime reduction initiatives or voluntary schemes including local taxi-marshalling schemes, street pastors and other schemes) which may help to mitigate potential risks.
- 8.40 Applicants are expected to include positive proposals in their application on how they will manage any potential risks. Where specific policies apply in the area (for example, a cumulative impact policy), applicants are also expected to demonstrate an understanding of how the policy impacts on their application; any measures they will take to mitigate the impact; and why they consider the application should be an exception to the policy.
- 8.41 It is expected that enquiries about the locality will assist applicants when determining the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. For example, premises with close proximity to residential premises should consider what effect this will have on their smoking, noise management and dispersal policies to ensure the promotion of the public nuisance objective. Applicants must consider all factors which may be relevant to the promotion of the licensing objectives, and where there are no known concerns, acknowledge this in their application.
- 8.42 The majority of information which applicants will require should be available in the licensing policy statement in the area. Other publicly available sources which may be of use to applicants include:
  - the Crime Mapping website;
  - Neighbourhood Statistics websites;
  - websites or publications by local responsible authorities;
  - websites or publications by local voluntary schemes and initiatives; and

- on-line mapping tools.
- 8.43 While applicants are not required to seek the views of responsible authorities before formally submitting their application, they may find them to be a useful source of expert advice on local issues that should be taken into consideration when making an application. Licensing authorities may wish to encourage co-operation between applicants, responsible authorities and, where relevant, local residents and businesses before applications are submitted in order to minimise the scope for disputes to arise.
- 8.44 Applicants are expected to provide licensing authorities with sufficient information in this section to determine the extent to which their proposed steps are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives in the local area. Applications must not be based on providing a set of standard conditions to promote the licensing objectives and applicants are expected to make it clear why the steps they are proposing are appropriate for the premises.
- 8.45 All parties are expected to work together in partnership to ensure that the licensing objectives are promoted collectively. Where there are no disputes, the steps that applicants propose to take to promote the licensing objectives, as set out in the operating schedule, will very often translate directly into conditions that will be attached to premises licences with the minimum of fuss.
- 8.46 For some premises, it is possible that no measures will be appropriate to promote one or more of the licensing objectives, for example, because they are adequately covered by other existing legislation. It is however important that all operating schedules should be precise and clear about the measures that are proposed to promote each of the licensing objectives.

No alcohol or tobacco will ever be purchased from sellers calling at the premise. Exceptions to the condition would be purchases made from authorized representatives who have made prior appointments to visit the store.

All alcohol and tobacco products sold at the premises shall have the relevant UK duty paid.

Foreign tobacco, which does not comply with relevant UK legislation, shall not be stored and/or sold at the premise. Invoices, or copies of invoices, for all alcohol and tobacco purchases for the sale at the premises, will be retained and kept at the premises, and made available to officers from Trading Standards, the Police or HMRC, upon request

A stock control system will be maintained, to enable the licensee and designated premises supervisor to quickly identify where and when alcoholic and tobacco product have been purchased

An ultra-violet light will be available at the premises and will be used for the purpose of checking the UK Duty Stamps on spirits as soon as practicable after purchase

If any spirits purchased for or on behalf of the business have UK Duty Stamps that do not fluoresce under ultra-violet light, or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee and/or designated premises supervisor shall notify the supplier to Staffordshire County Council Trading Standards and HMRC as soon as possible.

If any tobacco products purchased for or on behalf of the business does not have UK Duty Paid fiscal mark or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee and/or designated premises supervisor shall notify the supplier to Staffordshire County Council Trading Standards and HMRC as soon as possible.

Protecting Children from Harm

### b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- 1. The CCTV system must be installed and operate internally to cover all areas that lieensable activities take place and where alcohol is displayed within any public area.
- 2. The CCTV unit shall be positioned in a secure part of the licensed premise. Access to the system should be allowed immediately to the Police upon request.
- 3. A competent trained person in the use of and operation of the CCTV will be in attendance at the premises at all times that licensable activities take place and be able to fully operate the CCTV system to be able to down load in a recognized format any information requested by the Police.
- 4. The CCTV system clock should be set correctly and maintained (taking account of GMT and BST).
- 5. A facility will be available for the Police to remove from the CCTV system a copy of any material relevant to any ongoing Police investigation.
- 6. All CCTV images will be retained for a period of not less than 31 day
- 7. An incident register of all occurrences and ejections from the premises will be maintained at the premises and all details of public order offences will be recorded.
- 8. All persons involved in the sale of alcohol will receive initial and subsequent 6 monthly refresher training by the Designated Premises Supervisor or an appropriately accredited training provider with regards to the law in relation to the sale of alcohol. This will be recorded in a staff training register and will include, signature of the member of staff, the DPS or an appropriately accredited training provider together with the date.
- 9. At any time when there is no Personal License holder on the premises there must be at least one member of staff on duty inside the premise who has been authorised by the DPS. Any such person should have seen, read and be fully aware of the conditions of the premise licence and take all steps to ensure that such conditions are adhered to whilst they have responsibility for the premise.
- 10. A record should be kept detailing, the name and address relative to the person left in charge of the premise and the times and dates when the authority to cover exists, in writing.
- 11. These should be individual entries covering short periods of time only and should not exceed more than a three week period.
- 12. The authorised person should also sign on each occasion that he/she has physically seen inspected and is fully aware of all the conditions attached to the premise licence. The DPS should sign to acknowledge that they agree to the authorized person being in charge of the premise for any times specified. The records of these matters should be kept fully updated at all times.
- All Records shall be retained at the premises for a period of no less than 12 months and made available to responsible authorities on request.

A Challenge 25 policy will be adopted in order to reduce the potential for underage sales of age restricted products including alcohol. If a customer appears to be under 25 years of age and cannot prove that they are eligible to purchase the age restricted item with a valid UK or Ireland Photocard Driving Licence, a valid Passport or PASS accredited proof of age scheme card, they will be refused service.

Challenge 25 posters will be displayed at the premises to reinforce this policy. Posters will be placed at; each till, each area alcohol is stocked and at the point of entry into the store. The posters will be displayed prominently and in sight of customers and staff.

0 A Refusals Register is to be used to record all incidents when a sale is refused. The register is to be kept in the store at all times unless it is requested by authorised officers of responsible authorities. The Refusal/Challenge Register is to be checked and signed off by the Designated Premises Supervisor every two weeks. D All staff working at the premises involved in the sale of age restricted products including alcohol will receive on-going training and will be refreshed at least every 6 months. This will be recorded in a staff training register and will also include a written test of knowledge. The Training records must be made available to authorised officers of responsible authorities on request. Records shall be retained at the premises.

NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

# Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to
  work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a
  licensable activity.

- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, less than 6 months old, issued by the Home Office under regulation 17(3) or 18A
   (2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2006, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK
  with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or
  reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
  decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
  - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
  - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
  - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
    - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,

Previously West Mercia Police have OBJECTED to the application for a premises licence for a premises called **Supersam**, **Eign Street**, **Hereford**.

The following information will be relied on in the event that this matter will progress to a licensing determination hearing.

West Mercia Police objection is based on information received from Herefordshire Council Trading Standards that on 03 seperate occasions in March and April 2017 tobacco items that had not been subject to UK tax were illegally sold at the premises by staff working on behelf of the applicant to members of the public. These matters are criminal offences that are being investigated by Trading Standards.

The premises has a history of similar conduct and has twice been subject to licensing reviews (whilst under different ownership) that resulted in the premises licence being revoked. The last occasion was in December 2016.

The view of West Mercia Police is that to grant the premises licence will undermine the licensing objectives - in particular that of the prevention of crime and disorder.

Hi,

I wish to object to the alcohol licence application made by Katarzyna Saleh, wife of owner Goraen Saleh who took over on 21/02/17 from Mr Jamal.

The objection is due to the shop selling illegal non UK duty paid cigarettes and tobacco which is serious criminal activity.

The evidence of this since the new owner took over is three test purchases of foreign non-UK duty paid cigarettes.

These were on 8<sup>th</sup> March 2017, 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2017 and 12<sup>th</sup> April by one of our officers. I shall bring the test purchases along to any subsequent hearing and present them as evidence.

In addition the application is for a premise licence. The premises are severely tainted with a history of selling illegal cigarettes and tobacco.

For at least the last 6 years under every different owner the shop has sold these illegal products. As such I suggest it is simply not appropriate for these premises to ever be granted an alcohol licence again.
