

#### The Seven Principles of Public Life

(Nolan Principles)

#### 1. Selflessness

Holders of public office should act solely in terms of the public interest.

#### 2. Integrity

Holders of public office must avoid placing themselves under any obligation to people or organisations that might try inappropriately to influence them in their work. They should not act or take decisions in order to gain financial or other material benefits for themselves, their family, or their friends. They must declare and resolve any interests and relationships.

#### 3. Objectivity

Holders of public office must act and take decisions impartially, fairly and on merit, using the best evidence and without discrimination or bias.

#### 4. Accountability

Holders of public office are accountable to the public for their decisions and actions and must submit themselves to the scrutiny necessary to ensure this.

#### 5. Openness

Holders of public office should act and take decisions in an open and transparent manner. Information should not be withheld from the public unless there are clear and lawful reasons for so doing.

#### 6. Honesty

Holders of public office should be truthful.

#### 7. Leadership

Holders of public office should exhibit these principles in their own behaviour. They should actively promote and robustly support the principles and be willing to challenge poor behaviour wherever it occurs.

### **Purpose**

To consider an application for a grant of a premise licence in respect of Wild by Nature, Lower House Farm, Longtown, Herefordshire, HR2 0NT.

#### Recommendation

#### THAT:

The sub committee determine the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community. They should give appropriate weight to:

- The steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives,
- The representations (including supporting information) presented by all parties,
- The guidance issued to local authorities under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003, and
- The Herefordshire Council Statement of Licensing Policy 2015 2020.

## **Options**

1. There are a number of options open to the sub-committee:

- a) Grant the licence subject to conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application and the mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003,
- b) Grant the licence subject to modified conditions to that of the operating schedule where the sub-committee considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and add mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003.
- To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates
- d) To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premise supervisor, or
- e) To reject the application.

#### **Reasons for Recommendations**

2. Ensures compliance with the Licensing Act 2003.

## **Key Considerations**

- 3. The application for the grant of a premises licence has received relevant representations and is therefore brought before the sub-committee for determination.
- 4. The details of the application are:

#### **Summary of Application**

5. The application (appendix 1) requests the grant of a premises licence to allow the following licensable activities, during the hours shown, as follows:

Films (Indoors/Outdoors), Live Music (Indoors/Outdoors), Recorded Music (Indoors/Outdoors)
Monday – Sunday 12:00 – 24:00

<u>Late Night Refreshment (Indoors/Outdoors)</u> Monday – Sunday 23:00 – 24:00

#### Sale/Supply of Alcohol (consumption on and off the premises)

Monday - Sunday 12:00 - 24:00

6. During the consultation process and after speaking with local residents, the applicant decided that they no longer wished to have the outdoor music or outdoor cinema options. The request can be found at Appendix 2

#### **Summary of Representations**

- 7. No representations have been received from the responsible authorities
- 8. Four (4) relevant representations have been received from members of the public that the licensing authority have accepted as being relevant. One (1) of these representation has since been withdrawn and the three (3) remaining representations can be found at appendix 3.
- 9. Thirteen (13) representations were received from members of the public opposing the application which have been rejected by the Licensing Authority as not being relevant.
- 10. One (1) further representation was deemed as being relevant, though has since been withdrawn.
- 11. Two (2) letters in support of the application have been received from members of the public which are not relevant representations under the act. However they have been placed on file for reference.

#### **Community Impact**

13. Any decision may have an impact on the local community.

### **Equality duty**

- 14. There are no equality issues in relation to the content of this report.
- 15. This report has human rights implications for both the premises licence holder and the residents from the local neighbourhood. Any of the steps outlined in section 1 of this report may have financial implications for a licensee's business and livelihood and/or may have impact upon the day to day lives of residents living in close proximity to the premises.
- 16. Article 8(i) of the European Convention of Human Rights provides that everyone has the right to respect for his/her private and family life and his/her home (which includes business premises). This right may be interfered with by the council on a number of grounds including the protection of rights and freedoms of others. The First Protocol Article 1 also provides that every person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of his possessions and shall not be deprived of his possessions except in the public interest and conditions provided for by law. Members must accordingly make a decision which is proportionate to the hearing and endeavour to find a balance between the rights of the applicant, residents and the community as a whole.

## **Financial implications**

17. There are unlikely to be any financial implications for the authority at this time.

### **Legal Implications**

- 18. As relevant representations have been received, the sub committee must determine the application under Section 3.5.7 (c) of the Herefordshire Council constitution. The representations must relate to the licensing objectives and the sub committee must determine the likely effect of the grant of the premises licences on the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 19. The licensing authority must have regard to the promotion of the four licensing objectives namely; the prevention of crime and disorder; public safety; the prevention of public nuisance; and the protection of children from harm in exercising its functions under the Licensing Act 2003. Further regard should be had to the statutory guidance under Section 182 of the Act and the Council's own statement of licensing policy. The options available to the licensing authority are set out in section 1 of this report.
- 20. The sub committee should be aware of a number of stated cases which have appeared before the Administrative Court and are binding on the Licensing Authority.
- 21. The case of Daniel Thwaites Plc v Wirral Borough Magistrates' Court (Case No: CO/5533/2006) at the High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division Administrative Court on 6 May 2008, [2008] EWHC 838 (Admin), 2008 WL 1968943, Before the Honourable Mrs Justice Black. In this case it was summed up that: -
  - A licensing authority must have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. Licensing authorities may depart from it if they have reason to do so but will need to give full reasons for their actions.
- 22. Furthermore the Thwaites case established that only conditions should be attached to a licence with a view to promoting the Licensing objectives and that 'real evidence' must be presented to support the reason for imposing these conditions.
- 23. This judgement is further supported in the case of The Queen on the Application of Bristol Council v Bristol Magistrates' Court, CO/6920/2008 High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division The Administrative Court, 24 February 2009, [2009] EWHC 625 (Admin) 2009 WL 648859 in which it was said:
  - 'Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for licensing objectives'.
- 24. In addition to this it was stated that any condition attached to the licence should be an enforceable condition.

## **Right of Appeal**

25. Schedule 5 of the Licensing Act 2003 gives a right of appeal which states:

Decision to grant premises licence or impose conditions etc.

- (1) This paragraph applies where a licensing authority grants a premises licence under section 18.
- (2) The holder of the licence may appeal against any decision—
  - (a) to impose conditions on the licence under subsection (2)(a) or (3)(b)

- of that section, or
- (b) to take any step mentioned in subsection (4)(b) or (c) of that section (exclusion of licensable activity or refusal to specify person as premises supervisor).
- (3) Where a person who made relevant representations in relation to the application desires to contend—
  - (a) that the licence ought not to have been granted, or
  - (b) that, on granting the licence, the licensing authority ought to have imposed different or additional conditions, or to have taken a step mentioned in subsection (4)(b) or (c) of that section,

he may appeal against the decision.

- (4) In sub-paragraph (3) "relevant representations" has the meaning given in section 18(6).
- 26. Appeals should be made to the Magistrates Court and must be made within 21 days beginning with the day on which the appellant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision appealed against

## Risk Management

27. There is little risk associated with the decision at this time as the legislation allows a right of appeal to the Magistrates Court within a period of 21 days of being notified of the decision in writing.







We have seen an increase in traffic in the last two years.

Visitors to the area, delivery drivers and tractors can all be seen driving dangerously fast and with out due care. Visitors to the area are welcome and regrettably often unfamiliar with the protocol for driving safely on the 3 miles of single track road which is Olchon Valley Road. Delivery vehicles, booked by locals and visitors, often drive at dangerously high speeds because of their deadlines. Tractors are often driven far too fast for their tonnage and a safe stopping distance.

We have visiting cyclists, as well as my own children, who periodically fall off their bicycles as a result of the pot holes and farm debris (mud, gravel, muck, flail clippings, broken bows) left on the road and that means that they are extremely vulnerable to being hit by a vehicle driving without due care and attention.

The road is very narrow and has few passing places. The road is unsuitable for large numbers of people to use concurrently.

This week two hedgehogs and a small dog were run over. This may appear to be a small issue. However, statistical analysis of serious accidents shows that there are always, on average, 400 minor events before a major event, such as a death or serious injury.

### **To Prevent Public Nuisance**

**Noise** can be a nuisance from music at weddings and feasts at Lower House Farm for our neighbours, cottage guests and our own family. The problem is exacerbated by the shape of the valley, where the sound is confined and bounces around between the mountains on the west side and Llanveynoe Ridge on the right, it moves like an echo, back and forth, and this leads to an unpleasant repeated thudding.

**Light** from outdoor events at night effects the visibility of the dark skies for stargazing and the hunting effectiveness of nocturnal animals including owls, otters, foxes, hedgehogs and bats. Many are rare and endangered species in the Olchon Valley. We are in one of a few Dark Skies National Parks which are precious places in these times of severe light pollution.

It would help us with this application if you could suggest conditions you would be happy for the premise to operate under to rectify the problems you are experiencing.

All suggested conditions shall be considered in line with the Herefordshire Council Licensing Policy, the Licensing Act 2003 and the Licensing Objectives.

- 5. Prevent music and parties on Sundays, to keep one day special for rest and tranquility

- 8. Prohibit large-piece ensembles (e.g. Big Bands, Orchestras)

Lower House Farm is accessed by a very steep, single track lane with vertical verges, high hedges and a completely blind bend. There are no passing places. This lane is the main exit road to the village for all the residents at this part of the valley. 80% of the properties are farms this means farm machinery and vehicles towing livestock trailers. This traffic being heaviest in the Spring to Autumn and often till late at night during harvest. The road is catagorised as low on the Council ratings which means that although it is constantly in a very poor state of repair rarely is it mended.

The summer months also bring an influx of tourists who are not good at reversing and the road is often jammed.

To increase traffic to larger numbers will surely cause more congestion and frustration, as there is no way out other than to reverse and these vehicles will be reversing out into the main road of the village, which in its self is little more than a single vehicle width. This lane is simply not suitable to take any heavier traffic than it already has and I would request the Licensing Authority to make a visit to assess the suitability of it as an access road.

### To Prevent Public Nuisance

Lower House Farm's events programme was initially very connected to enjoying nature and the farm environment, as the name 'wild by nature' implies. Some of these events have had a noise impact but as they were limited one could let it go. To increase the number of events to several times a week will cause much greater impact and nuisance.

I am very concerned about live or recorded music as this will travel down the valley as will sound from a cinema. There is a cluster of properties close to the farm, I am further along the valley but can clearly hear when there is an event now, live music will travel even more. This valley is a remote and beautiful place where people come to walk the hills, see the birds and enjoy the tranquility, not be stuck in a queue of vehicles all trying to reverse or be forced to listen to throbbing music. Licensing the advancement of this one diversification scheme to include music and cinema could ruin this place for those who live here and who come to visit.

I feel little genuine consideration has been given to the inconvenience and discomfort of the residents of the valley balanced against commercial criteria.

### **Public Safety**

Lower House Farm is approached by a very steep, single track lane which has very few passing places. It also has vertical verges. There is a significant amount of large farm machinery on the road. Residents go in and out. The increase in holiday accommodation has made the lanes much busier. It is also an access road to the Car Park below the Black and Red Daren hills of the Black Mountains.

Lower House Farm has an increased level of traffic already because of their existing business. (Guests, the Farm traffic and deliveries) The events they currently host are much less frequent than the License seeks to allow. Given the details of the application there could be events any day of the week.

As a consequence of current business levels the road has become very busy. Events which must attract large numbers of people to be financially viable are likely to cause a dangerous level of congestion. Vehicles will not be able to pass each other in the lane.

It would be wise of the Licensing Authority to commission an inquiry into suitability of this access road.

#### To Prevent Public Nuisance

The existing wedding hosting business at Lower House Farm causes very little nuisance because weddings have been held on Saturdays mainly. The increased number of vehicles has been limited to the dates of specific events. Because of the wider range of events to be hosted there is likely to be an increased number of events and higher level of nuisance.

I am particularly concerned about noise levels. Outdoor music (live or recorded) travels across the valley and is amplified by the hills. We have already found it intrusive when there are weddings. Cinema held outside is also likely to cause the same problems. This is a peaceful valley which attracts holiday makers and walkers. I question the suitability of such The existing business enterprises at Lower House Farm celebrate an ethical and environmentally responsible farming system and are sympathetic to the area and the surrounding farms and residents. Currently a harmonious locality. Having a license for outside music and cinema is going to impact seriously on the peace of the valley, it will be heard by everyone and is inconsiderate and unsuitable.

- The Herefordshire Council Statement of Licensing Policy 2015 2020.

## **Options**

1. There are a number of options open to the sub-committee:

- a) Grant the licence subject to conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application and the mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003,
- b) Grant the licence subject to modified conditions to that of the operating schedule where the sub-committee considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and add mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing Act 2003.
- c) To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates
- d) To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premise supervisor, or
- e) To reject the application.

5. The application (appendix 1) requests a new premises licence to allow the following licensable activities, during the hours shown as follows:

Sale/Supply of Alcohol (consumption off the premises) Monday – Sunday 06:00 – 23:00

## **Summary of Representations**

6. Two (2) representations have been received from the responsible authorities (local authority and trading standards).

- 7. The local authority have objected to the licence due to Section 176 of the 2003 Act prohibits the sale from premises which are used primarily as a garage, or are part of premises used primarily as a garage. The objection can be found at Appendix 2.
- 8. Trading standards have made representations that have been agreed by the applicant. The initial representation can be found at Appendix 3 and the agreed conditions at Appendix 4.
- 9. The matter was due to be heard on 16 October 2020 but due to a technical issue with the systems, the report and papers in connection this application, were not published within the required five (5) days' notice.

## **Community Impact**

10. Any decision is unlikely to have any impact on the local community.

## **Equality duty**

- 11. There are no equality issues in relation to the content of this report.
- 12. This report has human rights implications for both the premises licence holder and the residents from the local neighbourhood. Any of the steps outlined in section 1 of this report may have financial implications for a licensee's business and livelihood and/or may have impact upon the day to day lives of residents living in close proximity to the premises.
- 13. Article 8(i) of the European Convention of Human Rights provides that everyone has the right to respect for his/her private and family life and his/her home (which includes business premises). This right may be interfered with by the council on a number of grounds including the protection of rights and freedoms of others. The First Protocol Article 1 also provides that every person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of his possessions and shall not be deprived of his possessions except in the public interest and conditions provided for by law. Members must accordingly make a decision which is proportionate to the hearing and endeavour to find a balance between the rights of the applicant, residents and the community as a whole.

## **Financial implications**

14. There are unlikely to be any financial implications for the authority at this time.

## **Legal Implications**

- 15. As relevant representations have been received, the sub committee must determine the application under Section 3.5.7 (c) of the Herefordshire Council constitution. The representations must relate to the licensing objectives and the sub committee must determine the likely effect of the grant of the premises licences on the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 16. The licensing authority must have regard to the promotion of the four licensing objectives namely; the prevention of crime and disorder; public safety; the prevention of public nuisance; and the protection of children from harm in exercising its functions under the Licensing Act 2003. Further regard should be had to the statutory guidance

under Section 182 of the Act and the Council's own statement of licensing policy. The options available to the licensing authority are set out in section 1 of this report.

- 17. The sub committee should be aware of a number of stated cases which have appeared before the Administrative Court and are binding on the Licensing Authority.
- 18. The case of Daniel Thwaites Plc v Wirral Borough Magistrates' Court (Case No: CO/5533/2006) at the High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division Administrative Court on 6 May 2008, [2008] EWHC 838 (Admin), 2008 WL 1968943, Before the Honourable Mrs Justice Black. In this case it was summed up that: -

A licensing authority must have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. Licensing authorities may depart from it if they have reason to do so but will need to give full reasons for their actions.

- 19. Furthermore the Thwaites case established that only conditions should be attached to a licence with a view to promoting the Licensing objectives and that 'real evidence' must be presented to support the reason for imposing these conditions.
- 20. This judgement is further supported in the case of The Queen on the Application of Bristol Council v Bristol Magistrates' Court, CO/6920/2008 High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division The Administrative Court, 24 February 2009, [2009] EWHC 625 (Admin) 2009 WL 648859 in which it was said:

'Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for licensing objectives'.

- 21. In addition to this it was stated that any condition attached to the licence should be an enforceable condition.
- 22. The committee should also be aware of the stated case of R (on application of Murco Petroleum Ltd) v Bristol City Council [2010] EWHC 1992 (Admin). In this case it was summed up that:

Responsible Authorities should be encouraged by this case to ask applicants to provide further information they believe will help them understand the application more fully. If that information is not provided by the applicant, Responsible Authorities can make representations to committees who have the power to require the request is met.

Mr Justice Cranston said:

The sub-committee [has the power] to ask a question of a party, where the question is calculated to elicit an answer which will facilitate the function of considering and adjudicating upon the relevant question

## Right of Appeal

23. Schedule 5 gives a right of appeal which states:

Decision to grant premises licence or impose conditions etc.

2 (1) This paragraph applies where a licensing authority grants a premises licence under section 18.

- (2) The holder of the licence may appeal against any decision—
  - (a) to impose conditions on the licence under subsection (2)(a) or (3)(b) of that section, or
  - (b) to take any step mentioned in subsection (4)(b) or (c) of that section (exclusion of licensable activity or refusal to specify person as premises supervisor).
- (3) Where a person who made relevant representations in relation to the application desires to contend—
  - (a) that the licence ought not to have been granted, or
  - (b) that, on granting the licence, the licensing authority ought to have imposed different or additional conditions, or to have taken a step mentioned in subsection (4)(b) or (c) of that section,

he may appeal against the decision.

- (4) In sub-paragraph (3) "relevant representations" has the meaning given in section 18(6).
- 24. Appeals should be made to the Magistrates Court and must be made within 21 days beginning with the day on which the appellant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision appealed against

## **Risk Management**

25. There is little risk associated with the decision at this time as the legislation allows a right of appeal to the Magistrates Court within a period of 21days of being notified of the decision in writing.

# Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. - A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, when produced in combination with an
  official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a
  Government agency or a previous employer.

- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A current Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder
  with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not
  subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity
  when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance

- A Certificate of Application, **less than 6 months old**, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK
  with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or
  reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
  decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but
  who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in
  the UK including:-
  - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
  - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
  - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
    - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
    - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
    - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
    - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

**Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities.** If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:-

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
- (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
- (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
- (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and
- (v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

## Home Office online right to work checking service

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.



This objection is based upon the fact that Section 176 of the 2003 Act prohibits the sale from premises which are used primarily as a garage, or are part of premises used primarily as a garage. Premises are used primarily as a garage if they are used for one or more of the following:

As an authorised body under the Licensing Act 2003, Herefordshire Council Environmental Health and Trading Standards have received details of your application for a premises licence for Bromyard Service Station, 1 The Bypass, Bromyard, Herefordshire HR7 4DJ.

Trading Standards have the responsibility for enforcing the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of sales of alcohol to anyone under the age of eighteen.

After looking at your application under the section protection of children from harm we would seek to include the following conditions on the premises licence in addition to those already specified on the application:

- 1. All permanent staff engaged in the sale of alcohol to be trained in responsible alcohol retailing to the minimum standard of BIIAB level 1 or any equivalent training course within 1 month of commencing employment at the premises. Where there are existing staff this training shall be completed within 3 months of the date that this condition first appears on the licence. No person shall be authorised to sell or supply alcohol until this training is completed. Refresher training will be conducted at 12 monthly intervals. All temporary staff must be trained before an event takes place or have undertaken the training within 12 months prior to any event taking place. Training records shall be kept on the premises and produced to the police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of Herefordshire Council on demand.
- 2. A written or electronic register of refusals will be kept including a description of the people who have been unable to provide required identification to prove their age. Such records shall be kept for a period of 12 months. It will be collected and reviewed on a weekly basis by the Designated Premises Supervisor and produced to the police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of Herefordshire Council on demand.
- 3. The premises shall operate a Challenge 25 Policy. Such policy shall be written down and kept at the premises. The policy shall be produced on demand of the Police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of Herefordshire Council. Prominent, clear and legible signage (in not less than 32 font bold) shall also be displayed at all entrances to the premises as well as at, at least one location behind any sale area advertising the scheme operated.

#### TRADING STANDARDS REPRESENTATION - AGREED 06.10.2020

Representations regarding this application were first made by Trading Standards on the 4/9/2020. After no response was received, a reminder was sent on the 16/9/2020 and the first response was received later that day from the applicant's agent. Considerable e-mail correspondence ensued trying to reach agreement on the conditions, which was finally reached on the 6/10/2020. The main sticking point was over the part of our rep stating that signage advertising the Challenge 25 policy be in not less than 32 font bold, as it was argued that not all the wording on the signage proposed to be used met that criteria. It was explained that provided the wording advertising the Challenge 25 policy was minimum 32 font bold, this condition would be met.

Therefore, the conditions agreed between Trading Standards and the applicant, namely Bromyard Service Station/ TG Convenience Stores Limited, regarding the Protecting Children from Harm licensing objective are as follows:

All staff engaged or to be engaged in the sale of alcohol on the premises shall receive training in their responsibilities under the Licensing Act 2003 (if in force) and specifically the company's age restricted policy and procedures. Such training must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member. Refresher/reinforcement training must be completed and documented at intervals of no more than 6 months. Training records will be available for inspection by the Police, Trading Standards or the Licencing Authority on request.

All cashiers shall be trained to record refusals of sales of alcohol in a refusals book/register. The book/register will contain:

- details of the time and date the refusal was made;
- the identity of the staff member refusing the sale;
- details of the alcohol the person attempted to purchase.

Such records shall be kept on the premises for a minimum of 12 months and shall be available for inspection by the Police, Trading Standards or the Licencing Authority on request.

The premises licence holder will ensure that an age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce, before being sold alcohol, identification being a passport or photocard driving licence bearing a holographic mark or other form of identification that complies with any mandatory condition that may apply to this licence. Such a policy will be written down and kept at the premises for inspection by the Police, Trading Standards or the Licensing Authority on request. Prominent, clear and legible signage advertising the policy, shall be displayed at all entrances to the premises, as well as at least one location behind the sale area. Such signage to be in minimum font size 32 bold.
