B) Describe in summary the aims, objectives and purpose of the proposal, including desired outcomes:

Midland Heart provide a range of services for people with Learning Disabilities across the county. The services are concentrated in Hereford and Leominster. The services are provided in four parts;

1 – Residential Accommodation. This is provided at two locations; one in Hereford and the other in Leominster.

2 – Supported Living. This is provided at a range of locations in both Hereford and Leominster.

3 – Respite Service. This is located at Southbank Close in Hereford

4 – Move On service. This service is intended to be focused on the housing and accommodation needs of LD service users and works closely with the AWB LD team.

The four elements of this contract are intended to deliver against the following corporate priorities and objectives:

- To maximise the service user's capacity for independence and self-care.
- To improve and maintain the service user's quality of life and capacity for self-fulfilment.
- To assist with health, personal and domiciliary care tasks as necessary.
- To support service users' involvement in their social networks and local community.
- To maximise the service user's capacity for self-determination and control over their own life.

The proposal

1 - It is proposed to re-procure the residential service but, as the majority of the current services users are aged 50 plus, the service will be re-focussed as a specialist provision for older learning disabled people. The contract would exclude most daytime opportunities provision for residents which would be provided by a range of providers in order to promote personalisation, choice and control.

2 - It is proposed to re-procure the supported living service more or less "as is".

3 - It is proposed to keep the respite unit open and to explore other options for its use including bringing in younger service users in transition to Adult Services

4 - It is proposed to downsize the Move On Service and to bring it in house to provide accommodation and housing support to the complex pathway, under the leadership of the Mental Health Housing Officer.

	The elements of the contract are valued as follows; 1 – Residential Accommodation; £1.12m. 2 – Supported Living; £1.7m 3 – Respite Service; £360,000 4 – Move On service; £125,000.

E) What are the anticipated impacts of the proposal?

Positive impacts.

1 – Residential Accommodation; Older LD service users are an emerging group with their own distinctive range of need and issues which are not always adequately addressed within traditional 'mixed age' LD care settings. LD dementia, for example, is one such emerging trend that requires a specialised care approach. The proposed refocus of this service into a service that is consciously aimed at older LD residents will allow a new provider to bring in specific services and innovations aimed at that age group to meet their particular needs. The refocussed service will also include a

greater range of day opportunities provided by a wider range of providers giving service users a better choice of services.

2 – Supported Living; As it is intended to re-procure the same level and style of service, there are no positive or negative impacts anticipated for the majority of service users by the proposed changes.

3 – Respite Service; As it is intended to re-procure a similar level and style of service, there are no positive or negative impacts anticipated for service users by the proposals.

4 – Move On service; by bringing this service 'in-house' service users will no longer have to go through 'third parties' to access services and effect changes to their living arrangements. This will give service users a greater sense of continuity and control as they will be dealing with fewer links in the decision making chain. Operationally this change will also allow the LD and MH operational teams to offer a much more responsive and targeted service as they will be able to exercise a greater degree of control over how the service is deployed.

Overall, the proposed changes are expected to provide better value for money. The changes will also allow a greater degree of choice, control and targeted support for groups such as older LD service users.

Negative impacts

1 – Residential Accommodation; There are no significant negative impacts anticipated by the proposed changes as the majority of current service users will, by reason of their age, fall into the proposed user group that this realigned service will be aimed at. A small number of slightly younger users however, will need to be relocated in alternative accommodation as their needs will no longer be met by this service. Where these changes are required they will need to be handled carefully following a full consultation with the service users and their families to ensure that they are happy with any changes made.

2 – Supported Living; There are no negative impacts to service users anticipated by the proposed changes.

3 – Respite Service; There are no significant negative impacts anticipated by the proposal

4 – Move On service; There are no negative impacts to service users anticipated by the proposed changes

As most of the current service users are in an older age group they will not notice any change to the service they receive. A small number of younger residents may need to be relocated into more suitable accommodation. These moves will only be undertaken following in depth assessments, consultations and discussions with the service users, their families and appropriate hea professionals.2 – Supported Living; it is not intended that we make any substantive changes to the delivery of this service.3 – Respite Service; There are currently 15 or 16 regular users of this service. It is not intended that we make any substantive changes to the way this service is delivered but is expected that it will be made available to a larger number of people with a greater range of need4 – Move On service; it is proposed that this service will be brought back in-house. Service users should not notice any change to how they access the service.
