Decision made:	To prosecute the defendant for offences under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, Section 117
Reasons for decision:	The defendant parked his car in an on-street disabled persons parking bay in Broad Street, Hereford on 29 <sup>th</sup> July 2021. There was a disabled persons parking badge on display in his vehicle which he was not entitled to use. If used correctly it would have allowed three hours of free parking in this city centre location.
	The defendant could easily have parked in an on-street pay and display bay further up the street or in a nearby car park, in choosing not to he caused the loss of parking income to the Local Authority and took up a disabled parking bay that a genuine user could have used.
	The defendant initially indicated to the enforcement officer that it was his badge, then his fathers before saying that a friend had given it to him.
	A back office check showed the badge was reported as stolen in February 2020.
	In the PACE interview by post the defendant confirmed that he was the person responsible for the offence. He sincerely apologises and asks for forgiveness as he has brought shame to his family and community. He says this is not who he is and is pleading guilty to the offence.
