Decision made:	To provide a food voucher of £90 per child eligible for free school meals for
	the Summer Holiday period, at a total cost estimated to be £436,000.00
Reasons for decision:	The free school meal system is an important component of the support
	that is provided to low-income families. Providing vouchers in the school
	holidays for children entitled to free school meals is an extension to this
	support and will benefit over 4,694 children. Through this proposal,
	primary and secondary aged school pupils who are eligible for benefits
	related free school meals will receive a food voucher of £90 for the
	Summer Holiday period.
	Herefordshire Council has received an allocation of £1,329,601.78 from the
	Department of Works and Pensions under the Household Support Fund.
	The expectation is that the funding should be used primarily to support
	households in the most need, particularly those including children and
	pensioners who would otherwise struggle with energy, food and water bills
	as well as other essential costs.
	By utilising the funding from government, this will have a positive impact
	on low income families and child poverty by minimising the debt burden or
	those that struggle to pay essential bills.
