	The Service Director is authorised to approve revenue payments between £250,001 and £500,000 as per Herefordshire's Financial Procedure Rules (Section 7).

Decision made:	Allocate up to £300,000 of the DfE SEND and AP Change Programme grant funding to pilot the Harvest Project for the 2025/2026 academic year.
Reasons for decision:	The Department for Education's (DfE) Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and Alternative Provision (AP) Change Programme has allocated grant funding for the 2025/2026 academic year to each of the following four local Authorities: Telford and Wrekin, Shropshire, Herefordshire, and Worcestershire. Each authority is required to use this funding to test and refine SEND and AP reforms, in the form of pilot projects in their respective local areas.
	Data and evidence gained from these projects will be used to assist each local authority to understand and to respond to cohort trends, so they can deliver improved outcomes and experiences for children and young people, their parents and carers in community, early years and mainstream settings.
	The Harvest Project will provide specialist Tier 2 Alternative Provision (AP and be run by Herefordshire Pupil Referral Service (a local authority maintained service, known as HPRS). Up to 24 places will be available for pupils who present with Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH difficulties between Year 7 to Year 11 (Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4), each class size will be for up to 8 pupils, and each pupil will be able to attend for up to two days per week alongside attending a minimum of three days a week at their mainstream school.
	Progress and risk management reports will be submitted to the Council's SEND Partnership Group on a half-termly basis to monitor the project and evaluate the outcomes achieved from using the Project Grant.
Highlight any associated risks/finance/legal/ equality considerations:	The financial assistance will be administered by the Council through the grant, however alternative funding sources may need to be sourced if this pilot proves to be a success and DfE funds are withdrawn in the future.
