Local Nature Recovery Strategy

Public Consultation Results Summary

August 2026

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1. Introduction

As a part of the of the creation of the Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) Herefordshire Council had a statutory requirement to engage in a public consultation to gain feedback on the strategy. This took place over the course of 7 weeks from 5th February 2026-22nd March 2026. The aim for the consultation was to gain feedback from the people of Herefordshire to ensure that the opinions, insights and knowledge of the public was included. This allowed us to make sure that the strategy is one that best reflects Herefordshire as a whole.

The draft strategy was presented for public feedback alongside the LNRS Local Habitat Map.

The documents that were available for comment were:

- Local Nature Recovery Strategy Summary
- Description of the strategy area
- Statement of priorities and measures
- User guides (Developers and planners, Farmers, foresters and land managers, Local interest groups, communities and individuals)
- Previous engagement report
- Methodologies (species, priorities and measures, mapping)

Comments could be given through a quick, high level survey or a detailed survey, or both. Respondents also had the opportunity to give location-specific comments via an interactive map.



Over the course of the 7 weeks Herefordshire council received 609 comments relating to the LNRS. 398 of these came from the online surveys and 211 from Phone calls, emails and in-person events.

This report provides a summary of the feedback that we received and our responses or actions following the feedback.

1.1 Promotion of the consultations

The consultation was promoted widely through various avenues to try and achieve the broadest reach possible. Key routes used include:

- Herefordshire council's social media accounts
- Promotion through members of the LNRS steering group's mailing lists and socials
- Article in the Herefordshire Times
- Inclusion in targeted publications (e.g. Rural Hub newsletter)
- Distribution of leaflets at public events
- Use of external survey host consultant's mailing list

1.2 Events for gathering feedback

Throughout the consultation period, 22 events were held to promote the LNRS and gather feedback. Each event was attended or hosted by at least one member of the LNRS team, who engaged with attendees and responded to any questions raised. Team members were also able to support participants to complete the consultation survey, either via the online survey on an iPad or using paper copies where required. Attendees were encouraged to take away a summary of the strategy for reference and to review the full documentation in more detail online.

In addition to these events members of the public had the opportunity to email or call the LNRS team at times that were convenient to them. This could be if they had any further questions that came to them after the events.

2. Who took part

Demographic information for the LNRS was collected to determine what sectors the public consultation had the most amount of success in reaching and to see if there are any gaps that have been missed by the process. However, we did not collect personal data from respondents as we had no need to identify individuals.

The age profile of respondents to the public consultation (**Figure 1**) indicates a broadly balanced distribution across most age groups, which is broadly reflective of the wider population in Herefordshire. The principal deviation from this pattern is an over representation of respondents aged 65–74, by approximately 23%. In contrast, the 25–34 and 35–44 age groups are under represented by around 8% and 11% respectively. No one under the age of 25 participated in the consultation. These disparities highlight potential areas for targeted engagement in future consultations to improve representation among working age adults and younger people.

Figure 1: Age distribution of survey respondents and Herefordshire population

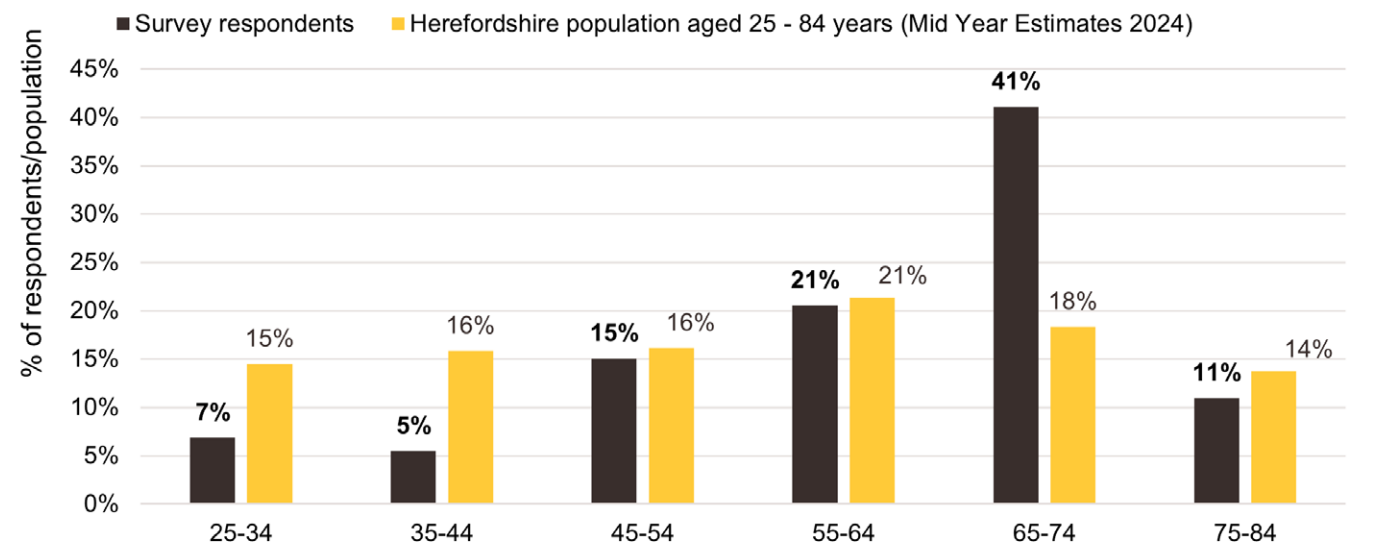
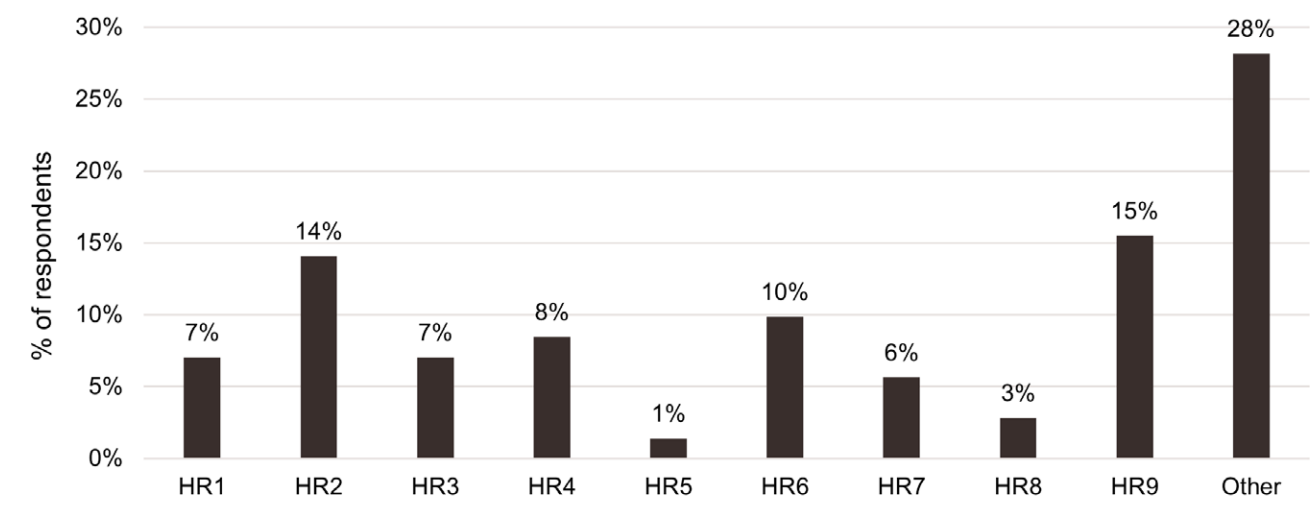


Figure 2 shows a broad distribution of respondents across Herefordshire postcode areas, although responses are unevenly spread. The highest proportion comes from “Other” postcode areas (28%), suggesting a significant number of respondents live outside the main HR1–HR9 areas or chose not to specify a standard postcode. The survey only allowed respondents to identify a HR postcode, however some parts of Herefordshire come under SY or WR postcodes, so these would all fall into the ‘other’ category.

Among the defined areas, HR9 around Ross-on-Wye (15%) and HR2 covering the south-west including south Hereford (14%) are the most strongly represented, followed by HR6 around Leominster (10%) and HR4 covering west central Herefordshire including west Hereford (8%). Mid-range representation is seen in HR1, east central Herefordshire including east Hereford and HR3 west Herefordshire (both 7%) and HR7 around Bromyard (6%), while HR8 around Ledbury (3%) and particularly HR5 around Kington (1%) are underrepresented.

Overall, the data indicates reasonable geographic coverage but with a skew towards a few areas, and notably weaker participation from HR5 and HR8.

3. Quick survey results

The Quick survey was designed to be an accessible point for anyone within the county to be able to provide feedback on the LNRS. The survey was comprised of 10 questions, primarily of multiple choice with areas for further comment if they chose. The questions were structured respondents were not required to read all the strategy documents or fully view the map. However, we wanted to discourage feedback from those who had not looked at the strategy at all and participants were unable to answer the questions if they said they had not read any of the documents. Responders were free to answer as many or as few questions as they chose.

Q1- Please confirm that you have read some or all of the draft LNRS documents

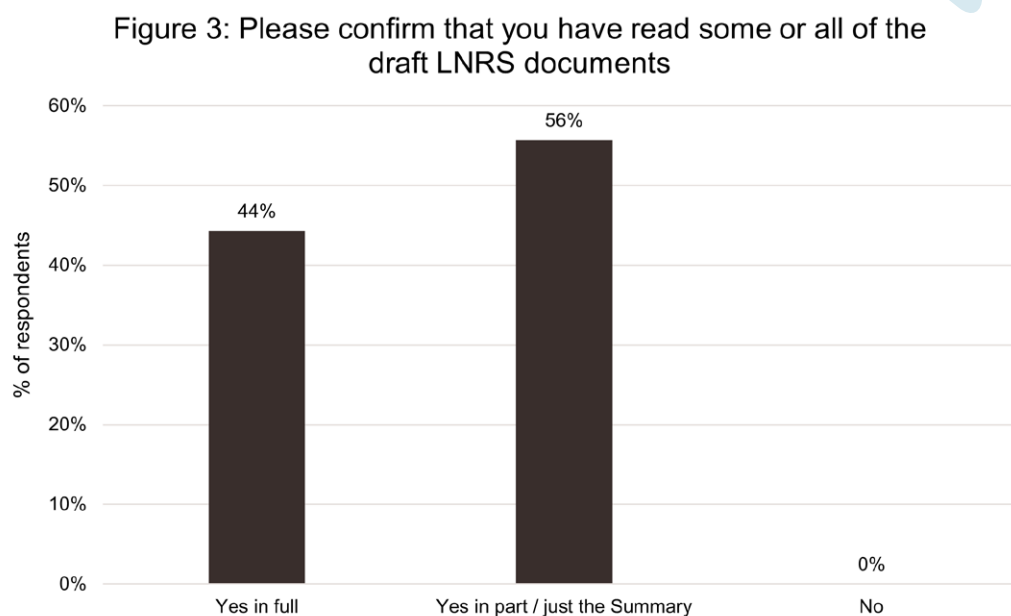


Figure 3 shows a very high level of engagement with the draft LNRS documents among respondents. Overall, all respondents reported reading at least some of the material, with no respondents selecting “No.” [EC2.1] A majority (56%) indicated that they had read part of the documents or just the summary, while a substantial proportion (44%) confirmed they had read the documents in full. This suggests strong overall awareness and engagement, although most participants appear to have focused on summary-level content rather than reviewing the full documentation in detail.

Q2a- How much do you agree with the overall vision and priorities of the Herefordshire LNRS?

Figure 4: How much do you agree with the overall vision and priorities of the Herefordshire LNRS?

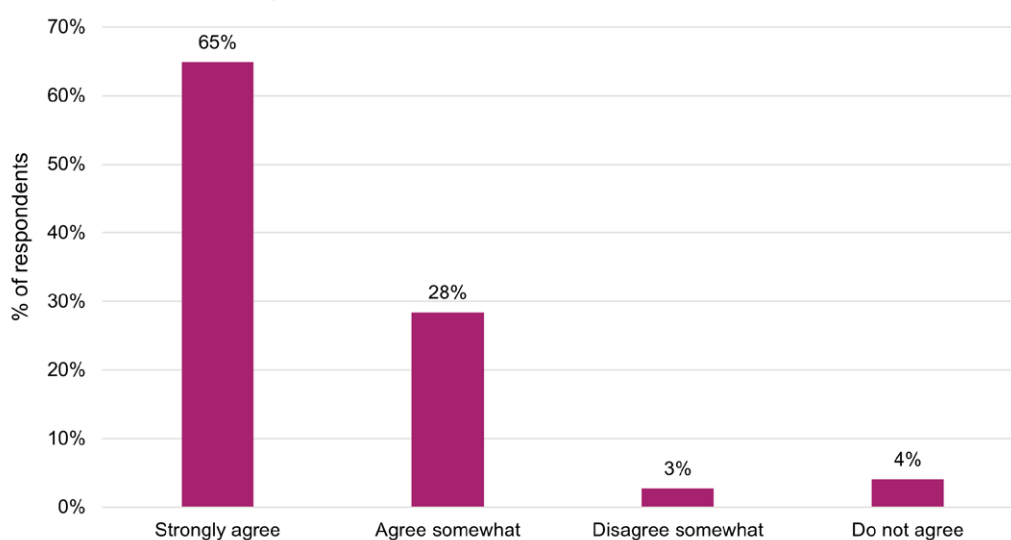


Figure 4 shows very strong support for the overall vision and priorities of the Herefordshire LNRS: 65% of respondents strongly agree and a further 28% agree somewhat, meaning 93% express agreement overall. Only a small minority express disagreement, with 3% disagreeing somewhat and 4% not agreeing at all. In summary, responses are overwhelmingly positive and indicate broad endorsement of the strategy's direction, with dissent limited to around one in fourteen respondents.

Q2b- Please write here if you have any comments

Consultation responses reflect a broadly supportive view of the LNRS vision and priorities, particularly its landscape-scale approach, habitat connectivity, and focus on river catchments, but highlight significant concerns about delivery and clarity. A recurring theme is that the strategy is overly aspirational, lacking clear, measurable targets, timeframes, funding, and accountability, leading many to question its effectiveness and describing it as a “wish list” rather than a deliverable plan. Respondents emphasised the need for stronger engagement with landowners, farmers, businesses and communities, alongside clearer mechanisms for citizen involvement and behaviour change.

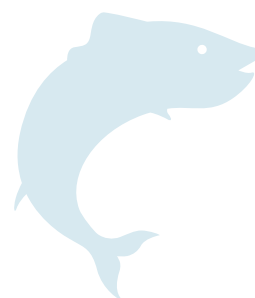


There is also concern about gaps in policy and guidance, including insufficient attention to light pollution and dark skies, ecosystem interdependencies, climate risks (e.g. flooding and fire), and alignment with planning and development pressures. Several responses criticised existing planning decisions and wider government policy as undermining biodiversity, while others questioned value for money or the overall strategic coherence and mapping. Positive feedback noted the strategy's comprehensive scope and strong ecological rationale, but overall there is a clear message that greater specificity, stronger policy backing, improved mapping and communication, and a funded, enforceable implementation framework will be essential to achieving meaningful nature recovery.

"Overall good document, but as is the case on all these reviews they only focus on the environment as seen during daytime. Majority of animal and insect activity occurs at night - therefore concept of "pollution" needs to include artificial light"

"I have lived in Herefordshire since 1991 and over the years have seen the decline in the biodiversity and quality of the natural environment. It could be said that this strategy has only come about because for too long the issues have been ignored by local and national government."

"The LNRS is well thought out targeting a range of habitats as Priority Measures including scrub and farmland habitats alongside grassland and woodland etc. The information around species measures is informative and provides good guidance around their associated links with local habitats."



Q3a- How satisfied are you with the specific habitats and species identified as priorities for Herefordshire?

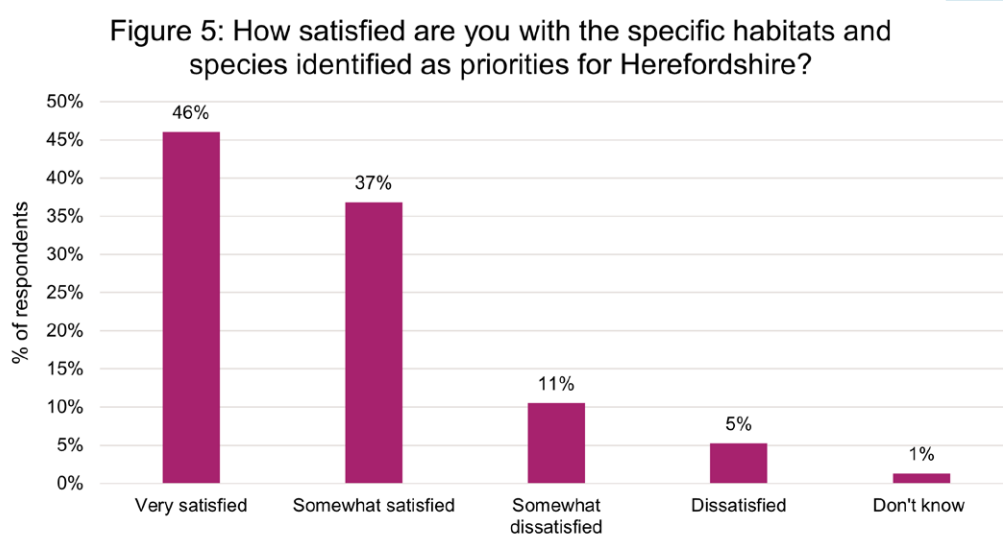


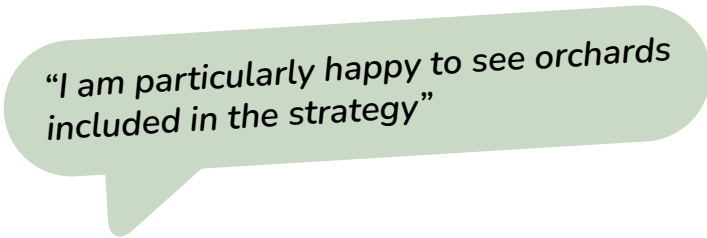
Figure 5 shows a strongly positive response to the identified priority habitats and species in Herefordshire. Nearly half of respondents (46%) reported being very satisfied, and a further 37% were somewhat satisfied, meaning a clear majority (83%) expressed some level of satisfaction. In contrast, dissatisfaction was relatively limited, with 11% somewhat dissatisfied and only 5% dissatisfied, while a very small proportion (1%) indicated they did not know. This distribution suggests broad support for the selected priorities, with only a small minority expressing concerns or uncertainty.

Q3b- Please use this space to share any comments, including if you think any habitats or species are missing or should not be included.

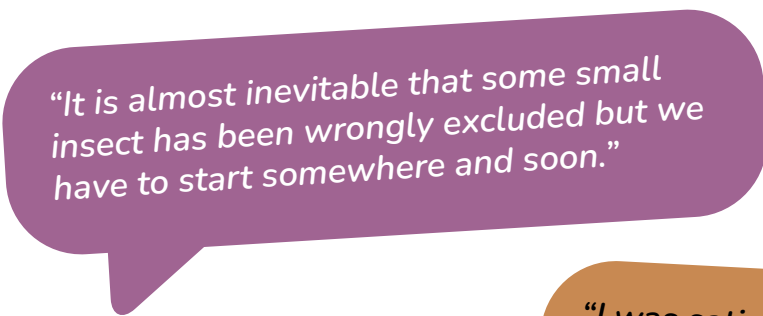
Respondents broadly supported the overall direction of the strategy and felt the range of priority habitats identified was strong. The inclusion of orchards was particularly welcomed, with several noting their cultural and ecological importance, and some respondents were pleased to see a wide variety of habitats considered. There was general agreement that the strategy focuses on many of the right issues and provides a solid starting point for nature recovery across the county.



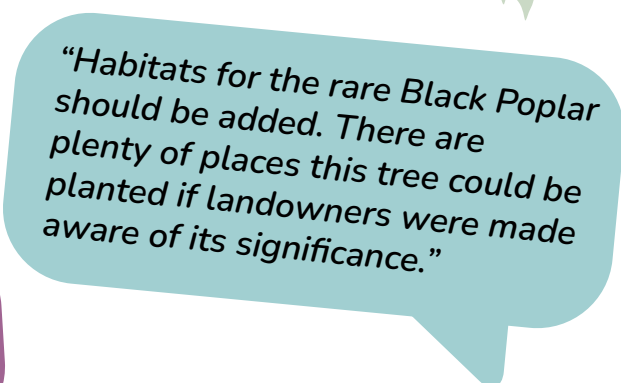
Respondents suggested that the strategy could be strengthened by giving greater emphasis to hedgerows, wetlands, headwater streams, upland valleys and habitat connectivity, particularly between uplands and lowland rivers. Improving scientific consistency across the county, including shared measurement tools and closer links with specialist sites and experts, was seen as important. Several respondents called for clearer prioritisation of species and habitats, stronger justification for selection, and clearer definitions of success, particularly in relation to Biodiversity Net Gain. Increased inclusion of small landowners undertaking positive action, better engagement with experts, and more effective public involvement mechanisms—such as citizen assemblies—were also suggested. Finally, respondents emphasised that nature-recovery measures must be economically viable for land managers if they are to be widely adopted and deliver lasting outcomes.



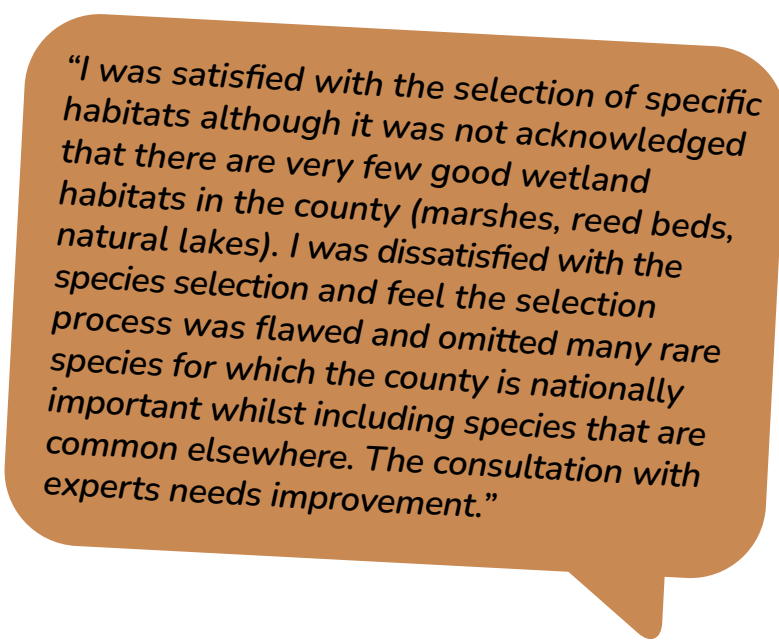
"I am particularly happy to see orchards included in the strategy"



"It is almost inevitable that some small insect has been wrongly excluded but we have to start somewhere and soon."



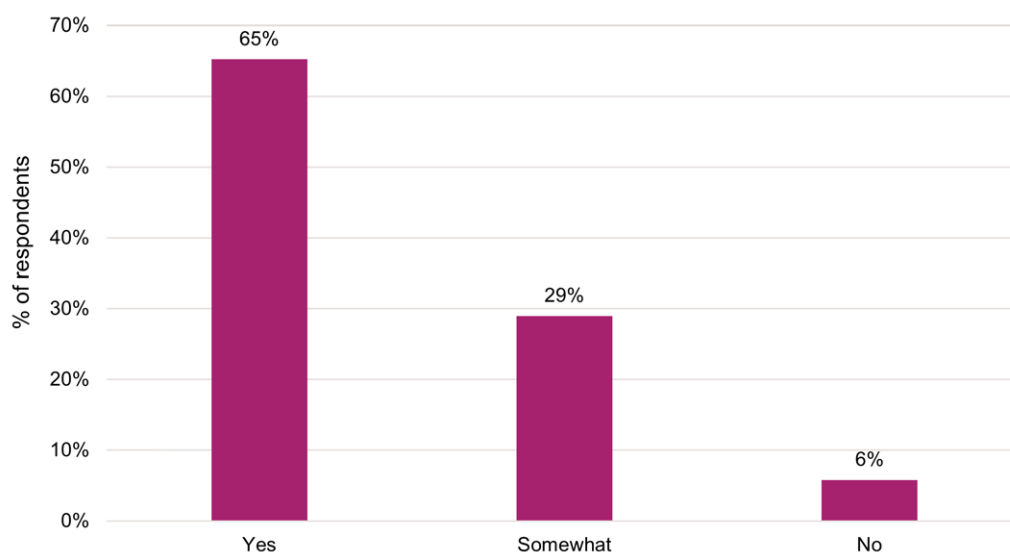
"Habitats for the rare Black Poplar should be added. There are plenty of places this tree could be planted if landowners were made aware of its significance."



"I was satisfied with the selection of specific habitats although it was not acknowledged that there are very few good wetland habitats in the county (marshes, reed beds, natural lakes). I was dissatisfied with the species selection and feel the selection process was flawed and omitted many rare species for which the county is nationally important whilst including species that are common elsewhere. The consultation with experts needs improvement."

Q4a- Do you like the layout and graphic style of the LNRS documents?

The chart (**Figure 6**) shows a predominantly positive response to the layout and graphic style of the LNRS documents. A clear majority of respondents (65%) indicated that they liked the design, while a further 29% expressed a more moderate, “somewhat” positive view. Only a small minority (6%) reported that they did not like the layout and style. Overall, this suggests strong general satisfaction with the documents’ presentation, although around a third of respondents see room for improvement.

Q4b- Please note here anything you would change with the layout and graphic style of the LNRS to make these more engaging and easier to read and use

Overall feedback on the documents was positive, with respondents describing them as well presented, well written, visually appealing and enjoyable to read. The level of detail was valued, particularly by highly engaged readers, although some respondents felt the documents were long and would benefit from clearer summaries, including short “3 second” versions, infographics, zoomable maps, and a clearer explanation of how the various documents relate to one another.



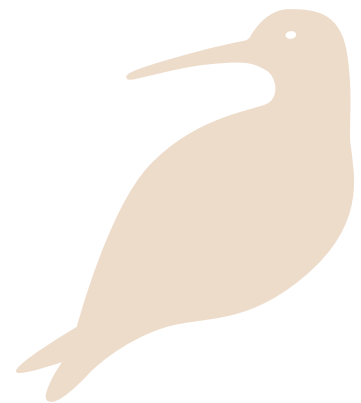
There were suggestions to further improve accessibility for all ages and neurodiverse users, such as careful use of colour and clearer image labelling, alongside strong support for the range of engagement opportunities provided, including face to face events and map based feedback options. A small number of respondents also suggested including more case studies or references to examples of best practice.

"It's very comprehensive and detailed. A relatively short summary with "zoomable" maps would help."

"We need to produce 3 second versions and infographic visuals aimed at the wider public"

"I like all the photos and colour but it is a bit long. the detail is very helpful for people very interested. Have you considered the use of colours for people with ADHD? Like the fact there are several ways of giving feedback including meetings face to face and map options"

"Nothing - it's all spot on"



Q5- What do you think are the biggest barriers to achieving nature recovery in Herefordshire?

Figure 7: What do you think are the biggest barriers to achieving nature recovery in Herefordshire?

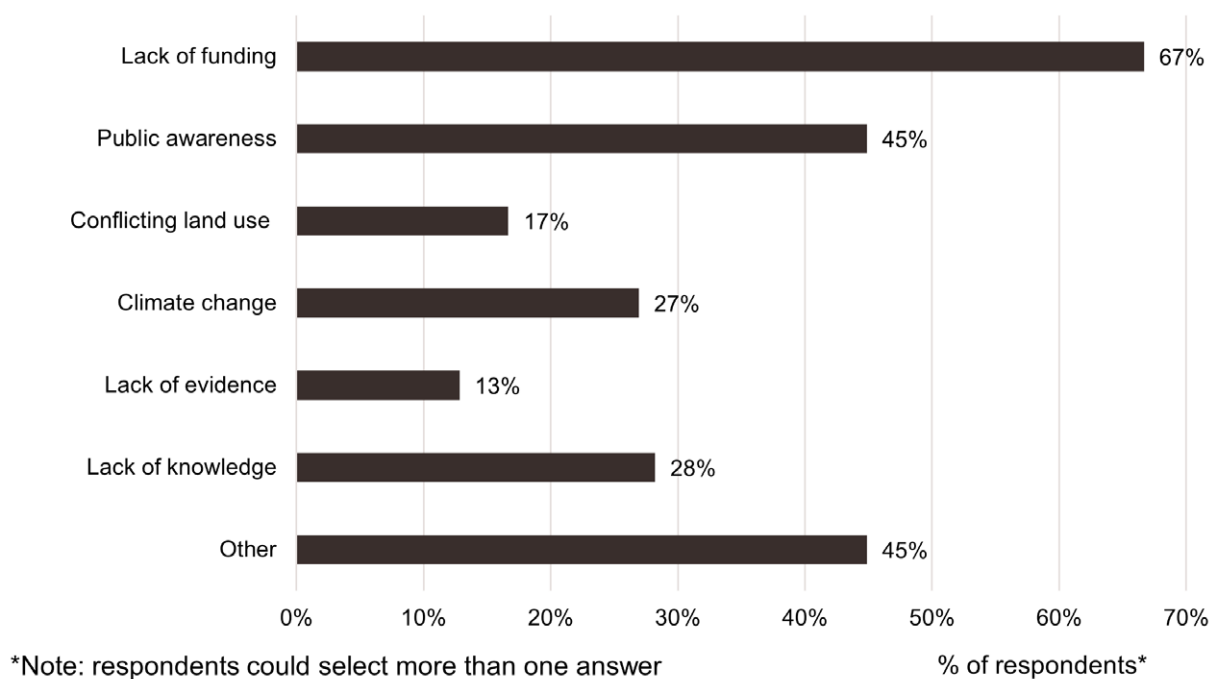


Figure 7 shows that respondents most frequently identified lack of funding as the biggest barrier to nature recovery in Herefordshire, cited by 67% of respondents, significantly higher than any other factor. This is followed by public awareness and other unspecified barriers, both at 45%, indicating widespread concern about both understanding and additional context-specific issues. Mid-ranking barriers include lack of knowledge (28%) and climate change (27%), suggesting capacity and external environmental pressures are also important concerns. In contrast, conflicting land use (17%) and lack of evidence (13%) were least frequently cited, implying these are perceived as less critical obstacles. Overall, the responses highlight that financial constraints and communication or awareness issues are the dominant challenges, while technical or evidential gaps are comparatively less prominent.

Q6- Have you looked at the Local Habitat Map?

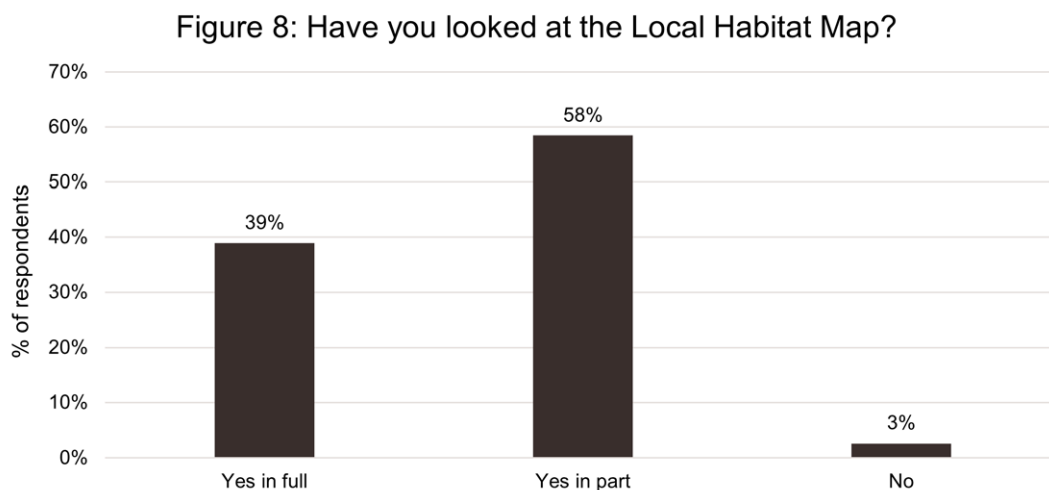


Figure 8 shows that awareness and engagement with the Local Habitat Map are relatively high, with the vast majority of respondents having looked at it to some extent. A majority (58%) reported that they had looked at the map “in part,” indicating partial engagement is the most common experience, while a substantial proportion (39%) stated they had reviewed it “in full.” Only a very small minority (3%) had not looked at the map at all.

Overall, this suggests strong reach and visibility of the map, though the predominance of partial rather than full engagement may indicate scope to improve usability, accessibility, or depth of user interaction.

Q7- Does the Local Habitat Map help you understand the LNRS?

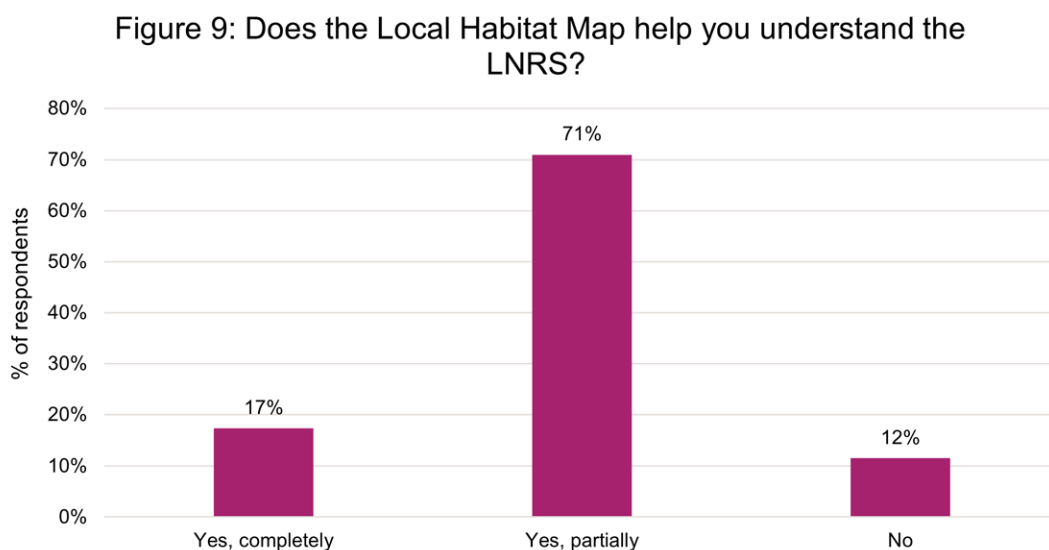


Figure 9 shows that the Local Habitat Map is generally considered helpful in supporting understanding of the LNRS, although its effectiveness varies. A majority of respondents (71%) indicated that the map helps partially, suggesting it provides useful context but may lack sufficient clarity or detail to fully explain the strategy on its own. A smaller proportion (17%) reported that it helps completely, indicating that for some users the map is an effective standalone tool. Meanwhile, 12% of respondents felt it does not help, highlighting a minority who may find the map confusing, inaccessible, or insufficiently linked to the LNRS narrative.

Overall, the results suggest that while the map is a valuable resource, there is scope to improve its clarity, usability, or integration to better support full understanding.

Q8- Is the Local Habitat Map easy to use?

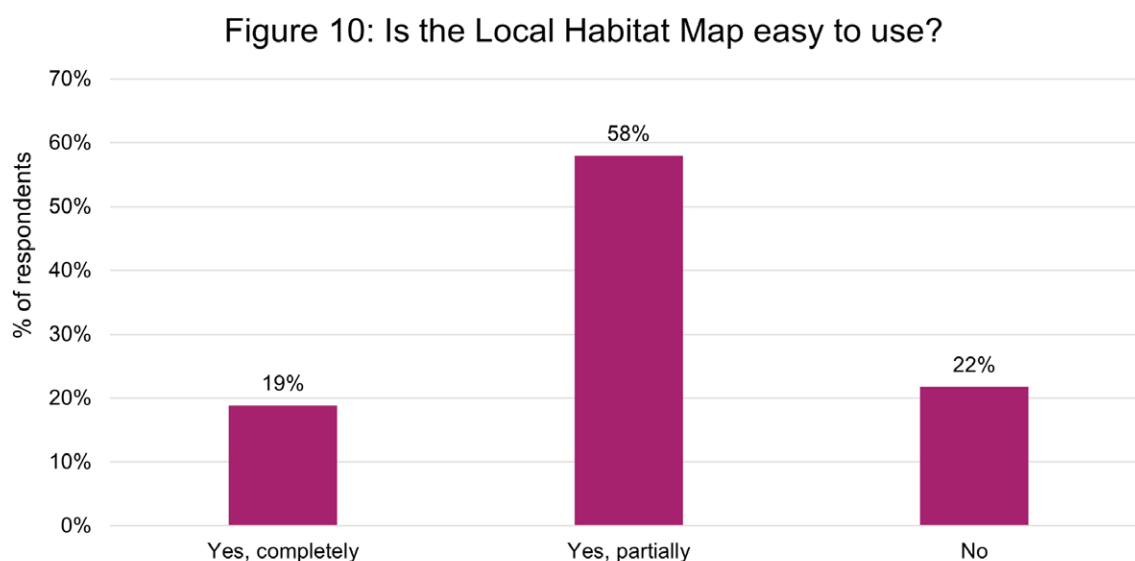


Figure 10 shows that most respondents found the map at least somewhat usable, but with notable limitations. A clear majority (58%) reported that it is partially easy to use, indicating that while the map is functional, users experience some difficulties or inconsistencies. A smaller proportion (19%) felt it is completely easy to use, suggesting that only a minority had a fully positive experience. Meanwhile, 22% stated that the map is not easy to use, highlighting a significant group encountering usability challenges.

Overall, the results suggest moderate satisfaction, with the primary issue being that the map is not fully intuitive or user-friendly for a substantial proportion of users.

Q9- How likely are you to use the LNRS once it is published?

Figure 11: How likely are you to use the LNRS once it is published?

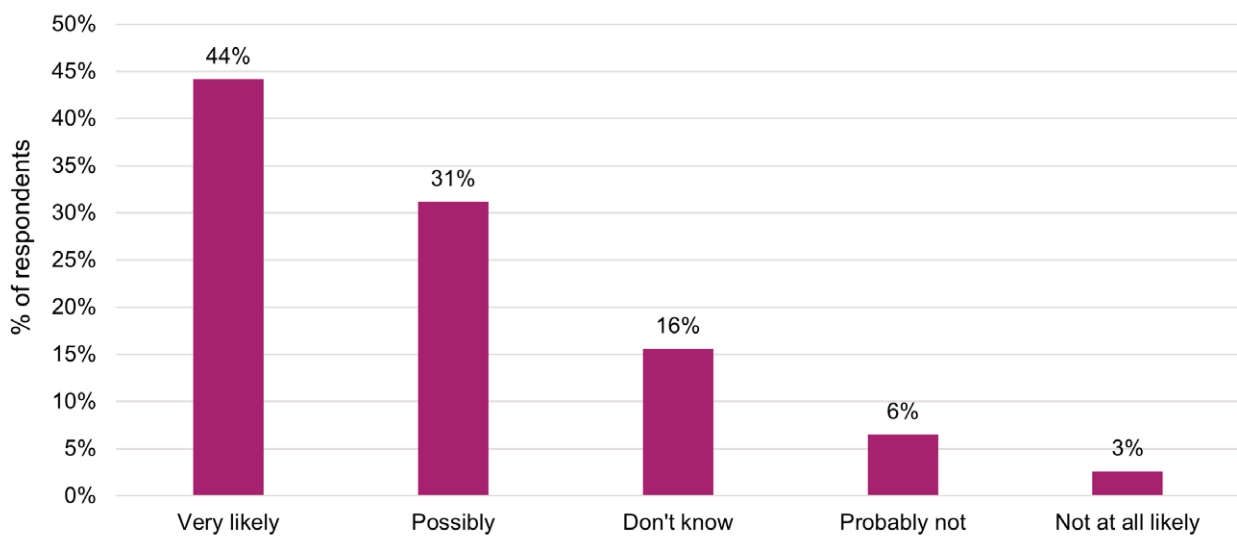


Figure 11 shows that most respondents indicated a positive intention to use the LNRS once published, with 44% stating they are very likely and a further 31% possibly likely to use it, representing a strong overall level of engagement (75% combined). While only 9% expressed a negative intention (6% probably not and 3% not at all likely), a notable proportion (16%) remain unsure, suggesting some uncertainty about how the LNRS will be applied in practice.

Overall, the findings point to strong support, with scope to increase confidence and clarity for those who are undecided.

Q10 - In what capacity are you responding to this consultation?

Figure 12: In what capacity are you responding to this consultation?

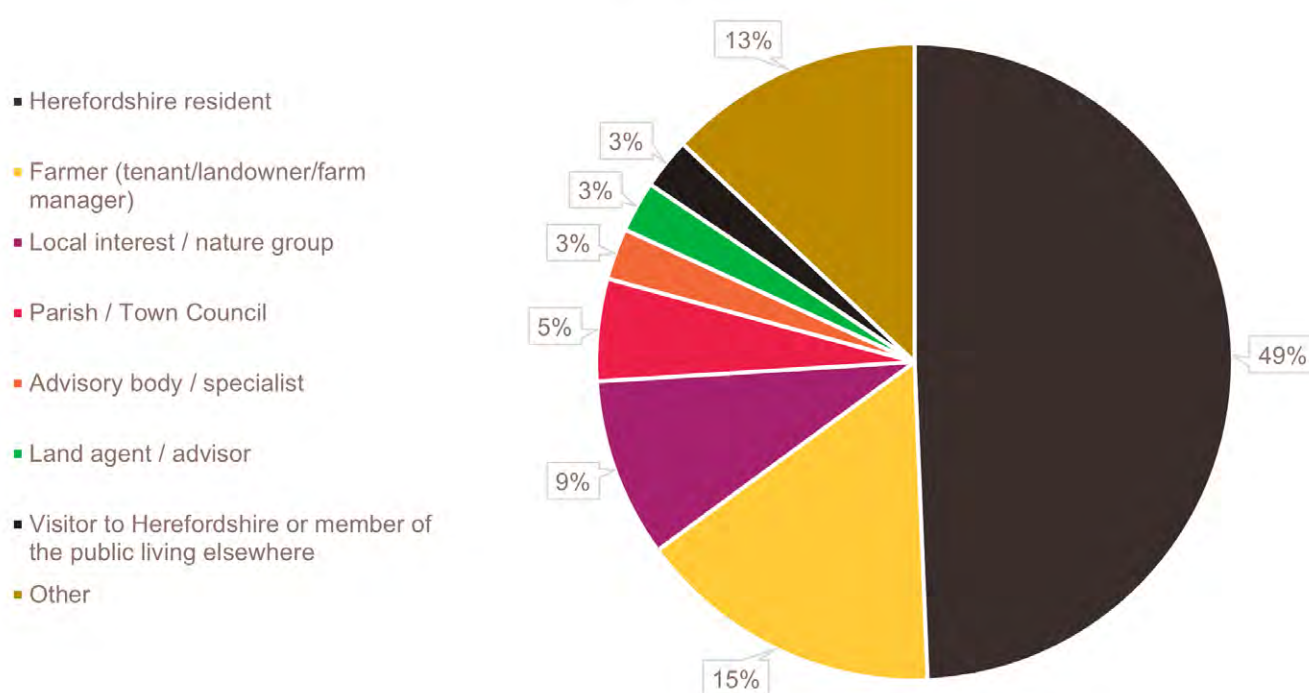


Figure 12 shows that responses to the consultation were dominated by Herefordshire residents, who made up just under half of all respondents (49%). Farmers (including tenants, landowners and farm managers) formed the next largest group at 15%, followed by respondents selecting “Other” at 13%. Local interest or nature groups accounted for 9%, while parish or town councils contributed 5%. Much smaller proportions were represented by advisory bodies or specialists (3%), land agents or advisors (3%), and visitors or those living elsewhere (3%).

Overall, this indicates that the consultation was strongly shaped by local resident perspectives, with more limited input from professional or external stakeholders.

4. Detailed survey results

For the detailed survey we received 24 responses from the public consultation. This survey was designed to provide a route for individuals to give in depth feedback over all areas of the strategy. It was aimed at landowners, professionals and other interested parties who would need to take more time to read all or most of the documents and review all or relevant parts of the mapping.

Due to the limited number of responses, there is not enough data to confidently identify meaningful trends or inform actions. However, individual responses have been taken into account and, where appropriate, recommendations have been actioned.

Positive comments

Feedback on the LNRS was broadly positive, with respondents welcoming the overall focus, detail and presentation, highlighting the inclusion of features and species such as hedgerows, Ice Age ponds and the Pearl-bordered Fritillary, and praising the clarity, usability and quality of the documents in helping individuals and community groups see the bigger picture and their potential role. However, several concerns were raised around implementation and effectiveness, including whether the short timeframe of the strategy is sufficient to demonstrate meaningful change, the unenforceable nature of the strategy, and the need for clearer links to governance arrangements and supporting materials.

Stronger alignment with planning decision making was repeatedly called for, alongside objections to greenfield development, rural housing estates, large solar farms and intensive poultry farming, with preferences expressed for brownfield development and rooftop solar. Respondents also queried aspects of policy framing and evidence, including references to rising property prices as a benefit of nature recovery, assumptions around conifer clearfell and heathland species, and a perceived over emphasis on native only woodland creation rather than mixed forestry.

There was particular support for better integration with agri environment schemes, especially prioritising restoration of historically lost ponds based on hydrology and mapping, and while accessibility and design were generally praised, some issues were noted around colour accessibility and the usability of mapping tools for land managers.



"Glad to see hedges included and also Ice Age Ponds."

"Closer liaison with planning decision makers to rigorously address the negative impact development of green spaces has the potential to have."



“Timeframe for measuring change. If the LNRS is only going to be in place for 3 years will this be enough to measure significant change? It needs clearer links to the new Board being set up. I would have liked slides from a Powerpoint presentation to add to these documents - makes it easier to share with others and become more familiar with content.”

“We agree with the inclusion of the Pearl Bordered Fritillary and would like to see more conservation efforts for these species.”

“Documents produced for public etc are clear and well designed (not sure if for anyone colour blind the colours would be as good?) I like the clarity of priorities and measures, along with the ‘wider environmental benefits’.”

Areas to be improved

Feedback received through the consultation highlighted a number of areas where respondents felt the LNRS could be strengthened. Common themes included requests for clearer and more comprehensive coverage of pollution (including water, agricultural runoff and artificial light at night), greater emphasis on habitats and ecosystem restoration rather than individual species, and stronger safeguards for irreplaceable habitats within planning decisions.

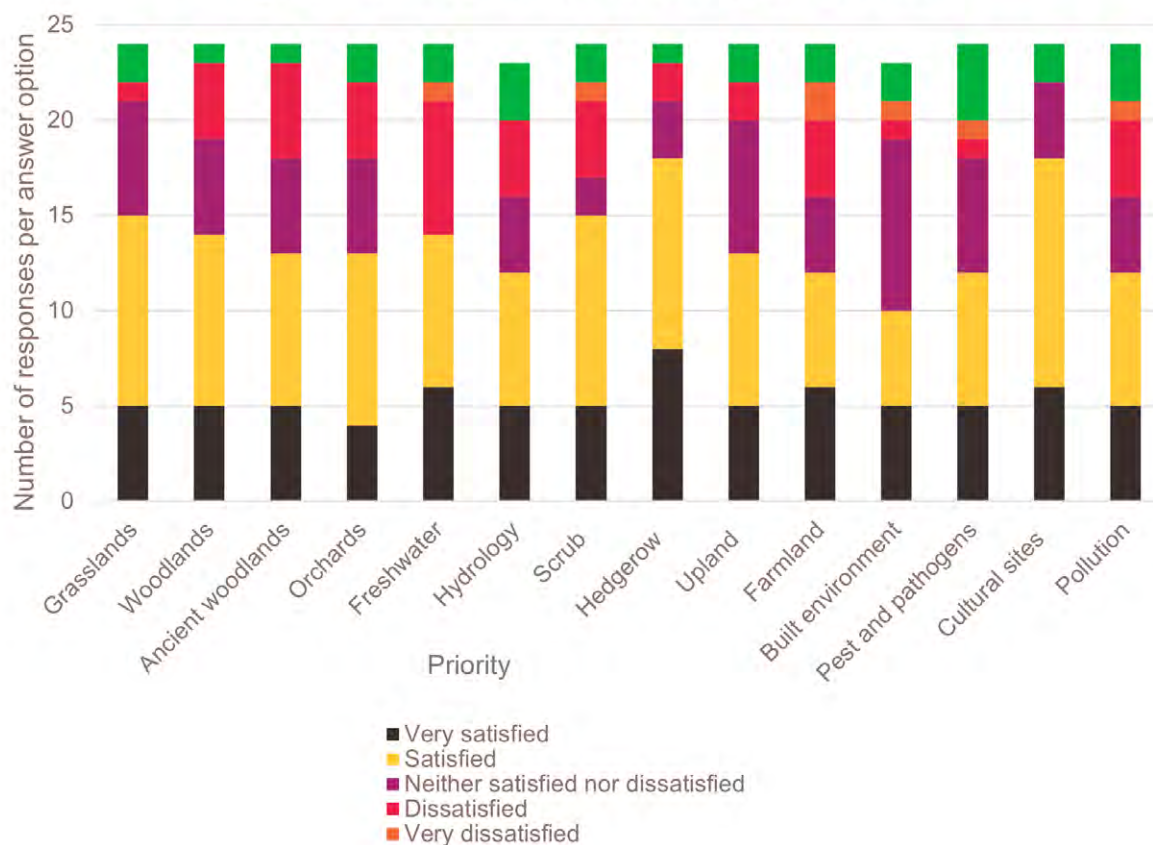
Respondents also identified gaps and inaccuracies in species lists, habitat mapping and landscape descriptions, alongside concerns about the usability, accessibility and long term status of the online mapping. There was strong feedback on the need to better reflect existing local data, improve ecological connectivity, and recognise the role of woodlands, urban areas and farmland in nature recovery. Many respondents called for clearer delivery mechanisms, sufficient resourcing, more targeted engagement with landowners, parish councils and communities, and more practical guidance on how individuals can contribute, noting that without improved clarity, funding and coordination, delivery of the LNRS objectives may be challenging.

“Pollution takes many forms. The LNRS seems to be quite vague on this and doesn’t set out the effects of different forms of pollution on the county, or really how it will be tackled.”

“Maybe include more about how county residents can help; practical volunteering to implement actions, highlight importance of building works at home connecting to the correct drainage system....not just to the easiest or closest!”

Detailed comments on Priorities

Overall, while satisfaction with the LNRS priorities is generally positive, with most responses across all themes falling within “satisfied” or “very satisfied”, there is a consistent presence of neutral and dissatisfied views, indicating mixed confidence.

The feedback suggests that this reflects concerns about the strategy’s deliverability and alignment with existing decision-making, particularly perceptions that planning decisions continue to permit biodiversity loss. Respondents also highlighted perceived gaps in the representation of certain habitats, notably scrub, traditional orchards, hedgerows, rivers, and soil, alongside concerns over an overemphasis on woodland and a lack of recognition of productive woodland. Responders also indicated uncertainty around practical implementation, especially on private land, and the economic viability of measures for landowners was a recurring theme, contributing to the high proportion of neutral responses. Additional issues identified include limited coverage of topics such as light pollution, cross-boundary environmental impacts, and grazing pressures, as well as a perceived lack of protection for existing habitats.



“The main point I want to raise is that there is no mention of productive woodland, as far as I can see. As we know, productive woodland is managed to grow and harvest timber sustainably, and it plays an important role not only economically but also environmentally and socially. Its absence feels like a significant gap in the current document”

“Needs more on hedgerows and rivers”

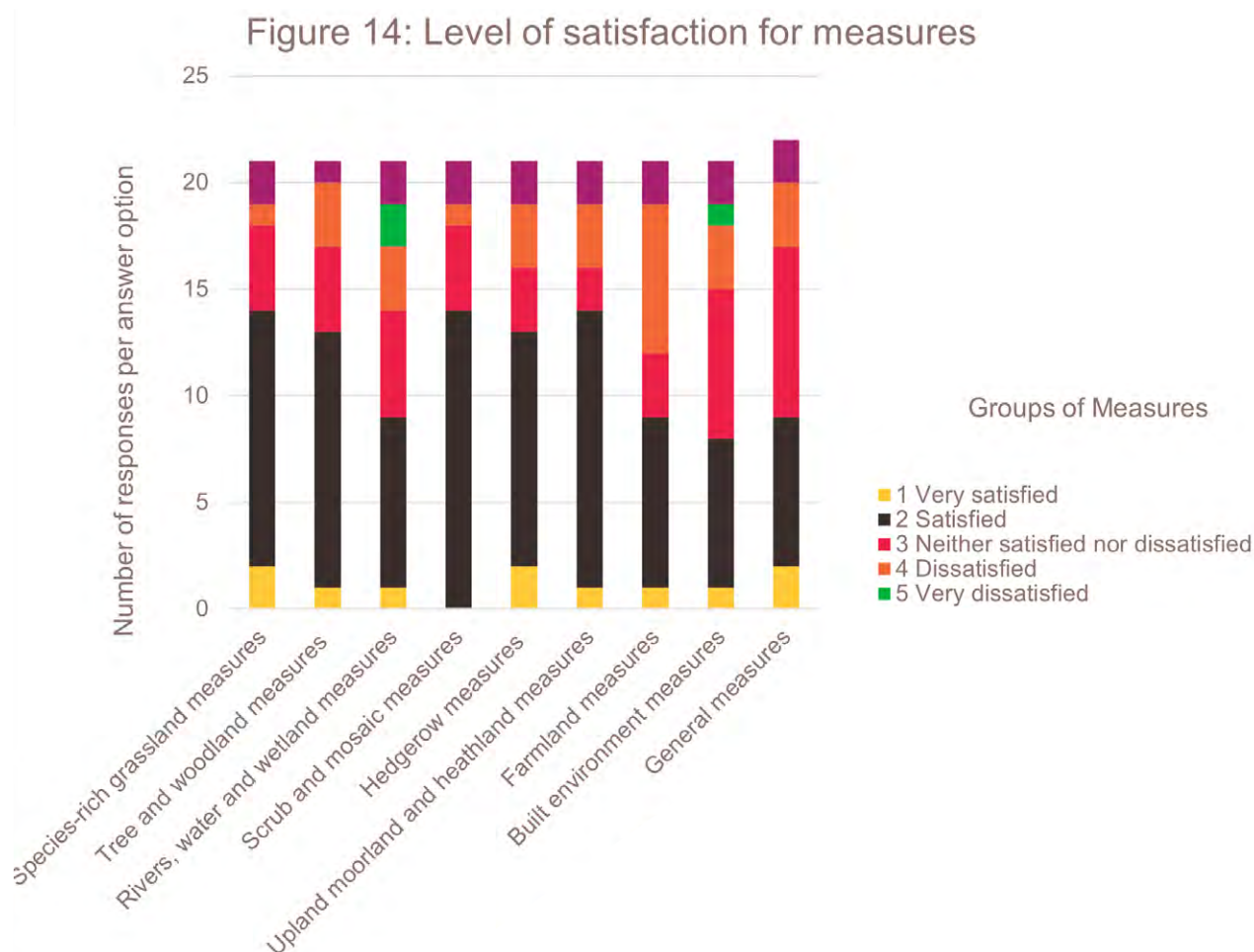
“I believe scrub is under-represented. Basically, anywhere that woodland is supported as a priority action, scrub should also be supported provided that it is created in a way that promotes natural succession. Otherwise, we fall into the common trap of ‘skipping’ scrub as a habitat and going straight for woodland via twigs-in-guards-in-a-field. Orchards are generally under-represented throughout. At the very least, traditional orchards should be encouraged for any un-developed land where historical maps (e.g. 19th Century readily available OS maps) indicate orchards were previously present.”

Detailed comments on Measures

Figure 14 shows generally positive satisfaction across most groups of measures, with “satisfied” responses forming the largest proportion in nearly all categories. Measures relating to hedgerows, species-rich grassland, and upland moorland/heathland display the strongest positive responses, with very few dissatisfied ratings. In contrast, rivers, water and wetland measures and built environment measures show comparatively higher levels of dissatisfaction, including some “very dissatisfied” responses, indicating more mixed perceptions in these areas. Neutral responses are present across all categories but are more pronounced for built environment and general measures, suggesting some uncertainty or ambivalence.

Overall, while the balance of responses leans clearly towards satisfaction, there is variation between measure types, with water-related and built environment measures attracting more critical or uncertain feedback.

In the written responses respondents broadly supported the intent of the habitat measures but identified significant gaps in detail, ambition, and deliverability. A recurring theme was that measures often lack specificity resulting in concerns about whether they will lead to meaningful change.



Several respondents suggested additional or strengthened measures. For woodland, there were calls for increased emphasis on active management, such as ensuring a higher proportion of woodland has up-to-date management plans. In the built environment, feedback highlighted insufficient detail on managing nature-rich spaces, suggesting stronger requirements for council contractors and clearer links to planning and building standards (e.g. permeable surfaces and appropriate drainage connections) to reduce indirect impacts on biodiversity.

Across agricultural and rural habitats, responses frequently noted that proposed measures feel unrealistic without stronger policy support at national level. There were calls for more ambitious approaches, including reducing livestock density, addressing overgrazing in uplands, and strengthening measures for hedgerow protection, buffer strips, and reductions in agricultural inputs. River and wetland measures were also seen as lacking ambition, with suggestions to align more closely with existing programmes (e.g. the Wyescapes and Ridge to River Landscape Recovery projects) and to prioritise hydrological restoration, natural flood management, and reinstatement of previously lost ponds in appropriate locations.



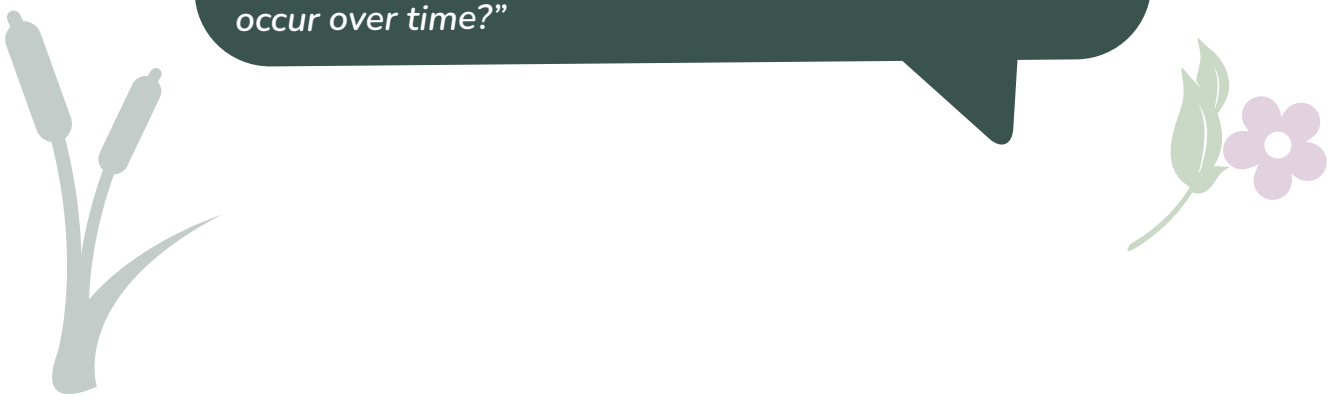
Detailed comments on Species

Responses broadly support the proposed species and associated measures, with particular emphasis on improving woodland quality for migratory birds and increasing focus on invertebrates as key components of the food chain. Several comments did question the balance of the current species list, recommending greater diversity and proposing more locally significant or threatened species. There is support for using species assemblages, alongside calls for flexibility to update these and communicate recovery successes over time. More fundamentally, some responses advocate a stronger emphasis on habitat restoration and ecosystem function, suggesting that healthy ecosystems will enable species recovery more effectively than a focus on individual species.

"The list of species seems a little odd with such a large number of moths. It would be good to include a more diverse range of taxa, although I realise you have provided a rationale."

"Migratory birds using woodland to breed in, specifically pied flycatcher and redstart. They are at the edge of their range in Herefordshire and an indicator of woodland quality."

"Describing Assemblages is a also good idea to promote understanding of the different habitats. Are you in-building a mechanism where you can add more species or amend these to specific stated assemblages, these changes bearing out of the implementation of nature recovery strategies? will you have a communication strategy of more 'Success recovery stories' as these occur over time?"



Detailed comments on the Local Habitat Map

Feedback primarily focused on significant usability and technical issues with the mapping platform, including crashes, slow performance, and difficulty navigating layers. Users found the map cluttered, with unclear colours, symbols, and overly complex legends.

There were also concerns about missing or inaccurate data (e.g. under-represented habitats and misclassified spaces), alongside suggestions to improve structure, grouping, and guidance.

A smaller number of comments questioned the clarity, practicality, and completeness of the LNRS itself, though some respondents recognised its overall potential.

"There are just so many colours and priorities it takes a while to get used to it-but OK after a while. I guess it depends on what you are looking to find out-so maybe some questions before people start to use it could be helpful?"

"The colours are so similar that I can't tell what you're identifying. The designations seem so random in shape, they are nonsensical."

"Quicker loading/refresh and not crashing"



5. Map survey results

The mapping survey received 78 responses. These were locational feedback where respondents were able to click the relevant point on the map and added specific comments about that place.

Responses to the mapping survey highlight a mix of support for nature recovery and significant concerns about mapping accuracy, habitat protection, and land use. Many respondents emphasise the ecological value of specific sites, including species-rich meadows, traditional orchards, ancient woodland, river corridors, ponds, and upland landscapes (notably the Olchon Valley), often citing the presence of priority or protected species such as bats, barn owls, skylarks, great crested newts, and rare flora. There is strong support for enhancing and restoring habitats—particularly woodland management, orchard restoration, wetland creation, and improved connectivity through hedgerows and ecological corridors. However, a dominant theme is that current LNRS mapping does not accurately reflect on-the-ground conditions, with omissions of Local Wildlife Sites, misclassification of land (e.g. arable land or residential areas shown as potential habitats), and incorrect boundaries, leading to calls for updates, corrections, and better alignment with existing datasets. Respondents also raise concerns about threats from development, pollution, poor land management, and overgrazing, alongside requests for stronger protection, clearer designations, and recognition of locally important landscapes. A smaller number of landowners request removal of their land from the mapping, reflecting tensions between conservation priorities and land use or ownership considerations.

“This is marked white on the LNRS map it is a traditional orchard marked on Magic maps”

“The common has recently been cleared of overgrown tree cover and debris, mainly willow, that was restricting light to the pond and gradually reducing it's depth. Increased light has led to an increase in flora. All materials were retained on site to make additional habitats for invertebrates and small mammals.”

“This area has a wealth of wildlife, all of which need protecting. Numerous ponds are home for species such as Great Crested Newts, Skylarks are heard on a daily basis, and hares are often spotted in the surrounding fields. Bats can also be seen at dusk.”

Land removal from the opportunities mapping

During the Public Consultation, landholders were given the option to request removal of their land from the LNRS opportunities mapping. This applied only to areas where potential opportunities had been identified (i.e. the ACIB layer and subsequent measures layers). Areas with existing designations within the APIB layer were not subject to amendment.

Eight requests were received to remove land from the mapping, all relating to farmland. These requests were approved following verification that the requester was the landowner. Areas and habitats designated as Areas of Particular Importance for Biodiversity (APIBs) were not altered; only the mapped potential measures were removed.

6. Recommendations

Responses received across **all engagement channels** provided a range of recommendations and potential actions to refine the LNRS. Each submission was carefully reviewed, and where feasible, actions were incorporated into the strategy. The following tables summarise all the recommendations received, indicate whether they were actioned, and provide a brief explanation of how they were addressed or why they could not be implemented.

7. Summary and conclusion

The Herefordshire Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) public consultation, undertaken over seven weeks from February to March 2026, generated substantial engagement, with 609 comments collected through surveys, events, and direct contact. The consultation combined multiple engagement methods, including 22 in-person events, online surveys, webinars, and targeted promotional activity, resulting in broad geographic reach and strong participation from local residents, although some demographic groups (notably working-age adults, the under 25s and certain postcode areas) were underrepresented.



Overall, feedback demonstrates strong support for the LNRS vision, priorities, and identified habitats, with over 90% of respondents expressing agreement with the strategy's direction and more than 80% satisfied with habitat and species priorities. The documents and presentation were also well received, with a majority finding them clear, detailed, and visually effective, though some respondents highlighted the need for more accessible summaries and simplified formats.

However, the consultation has also highlighted a consistent and important gap between support for the strategy's ambitions and confidence in its delivery. A recurring theme across all engagement channels is that the LNRS is perceived as aspirational, with insufficient clarity around how outcomes will be achieved in practice. Respondents emphasised the need for a more clearly defined implementation framework, including clear targets, measurable indicators of success, delivery timescales, and identifiable responsibilities. Without this, there is a risk that the strategy may lack credibility and fail to achieve meaningful on-the-ground change.

Financial constraints were identified as the most significant barrier to delivery, alongside concerns around public awareness and engagement. In this context, the success of the LNRS will depend heavily on its ability to secure and coordinate funding, as well as to strengthen communication and awareness-raising activities. Improved engagement with landowners, farmers, businesses, and local communities was consistently highlighted as essential, particularly given the voluntary nature of the strategy and the need to ensure that proposed measures are both practical and economically viable.

The findings also highlight the importance of stronger integration with planning and policy frameworks. Concerns have been raised about perceived inconsistencies between LNRS objectives and existing planning decisions, with some having a desire for the strategy to play a more influential role in shaping development outcomes. Ensuring that the LNRS is embedded effectively within local decision-making processes will therefore be critical to its long-term impact.



Technical improvements are also required in key areas. In particular, feedback on the Local Habitat Map indicates that while it is a valuable tool, issues relating to usability, clarity, performance, and data accuracy limit its effectiveness for many users. Addressing these issues—alongside improving accessibility of supporting documents through clearer summaries, visual content, and user-friendly formats—will be important to maximise engagement and usability across a wider audience.

The consultation has further identified several thematic gaps and areas for strengthening the strategy. These include greater emphasis on habitat connectivity, wetlands, hedgerows, soils, and the role of ecosystem processes; improved coverage of pollution (including artificial light), climate risks, and cross-boundary impacts; and a stronger focus on practical guidance and delivery mechanisms. Addressing these issues will help to ensure that the LNRS is both comprehensive and responsive to local priorities.

Consultation feedback has been used to introduce a range of targeted improvements to both the content and usability of the LNRS. The strategy now more clearly communicates that measures are advisory, supported by additional case studies and strengthened guidance to aid delivery. New supporting actions have been added to address gaps in ecological data and encourage greater biological recording and public engagement, including working with new groups and organisations, such as children and young people, during the delivery phase. The mapping tool has been significantly refined, with clearer labelling, improved colour contrast, simplified and more intuitive layer structure, enhanced navigation (including parish boundaries), and new functionality such as transparency sliders and better links between map features and the measures directory. Technical performance has also been improved through data streamlining, and a revised ‘how to use’ resource has been developed to support users.

Substantial updates have also been made to mapping data, priorities, and measures to improve accuracy, clarity, and coverage. Missing or incorrect spatial data has been corrected, with additional habitats, heritage features, and species-relevant datasets incorporated. Across the strategy, wording has been revised to be more outcome-focused, while new and expanded content strengthens coverage of key issues such as urban environments, light pollution, soil health, water management, species control, and climate adaptation. Additional supporting actions, updated guidance links, and stronger references to standards (e.g. UK Forestry Standards) have been included, alongside greater emphasis on habitat connectivity, wider environmental benefits, and links to phosphate mitigation. Species lists have been expanded or clarified, and cross-cutting themes such as rewilding, public participation, and embedding LNRS in decision-making have been more clearly integrated throughout.



Moving forward, the strategy will serve as a key framework for the development of projects and the coordination of nature recovery activity across Herefordshire. Delivery will focus on four core elements in line with national guidance:

1. Convening and leading cross-sector partnerships to prioritise and coordinate action;
2. Embedding the LNRS within local plans, policies, and organisational decision-making to ensure biodiversity is considered alongside development and other priorities;
3. Identifying and supporting the development of strategic, investable projects aligned with LNRS priorities; and
4. Monitoring and reporting on delivery to track progress, contribute to national targets, and inform future strategy updates.

As the strategy is adopted and implemented, it will be integrated into other council strategies and plans. In particular, it will form a key consideration within the Herefordshire Core Strategy development plan moving forward.

Overall, the LNRS will act as a central framework for coordinating investment, decision-making, and action to deliver long-term environmental improvement at a local scale.

In conclusion, the consultation confirms that there is strong support for the LNRS as a strategic framework for nature recovery in Herefordshire, but also provides a clear mandate for refinement. The key challenge moving forward is to transition from a well-supported vision to a credible and deliverable programme of action. This will require strengthening implementation detail, securing resources, improving integration with policy and planning, and maintaining ongoing engagement with stakeholders. If these issues are effectively addressed, the LNRS has significant potential to deliver measurable, long-term improvements in biodiversity and ecological resilience across the county.

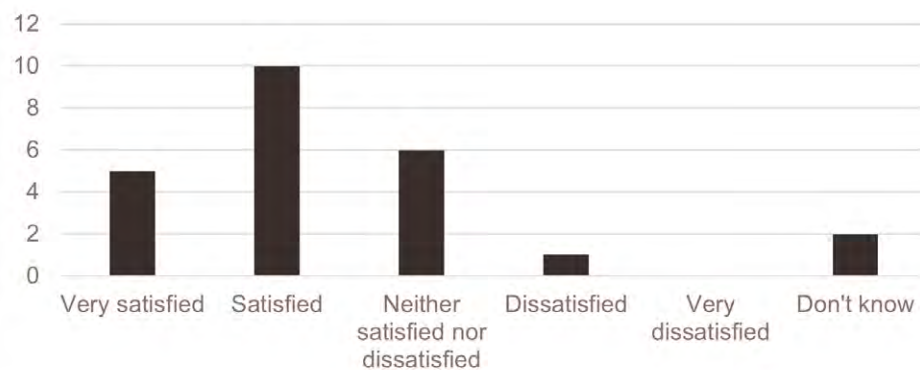


Figure 16. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Herefordshire's woodlands are well-managed and restored with woodland corridors created across the landscape

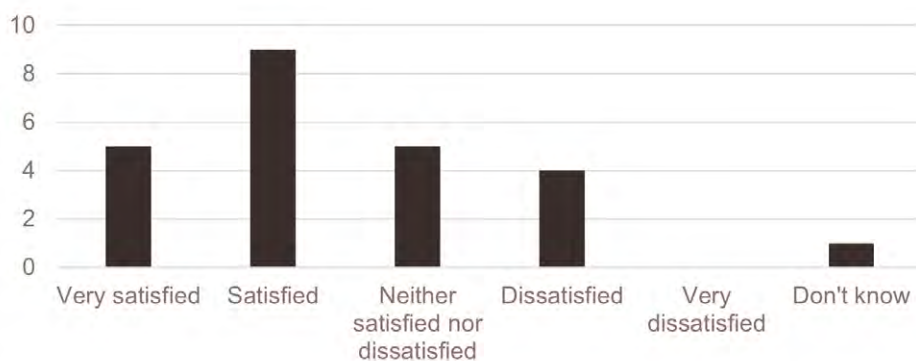


Figure 17. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Ancient woodlands are more extensive, and existing ones are well-managed and restored

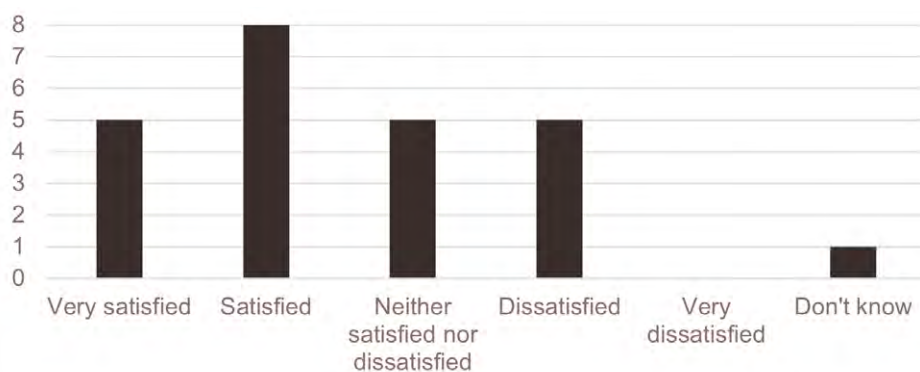


Figure 18. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Traditional orchards are more extensive, and existing ones are well-managed and restored

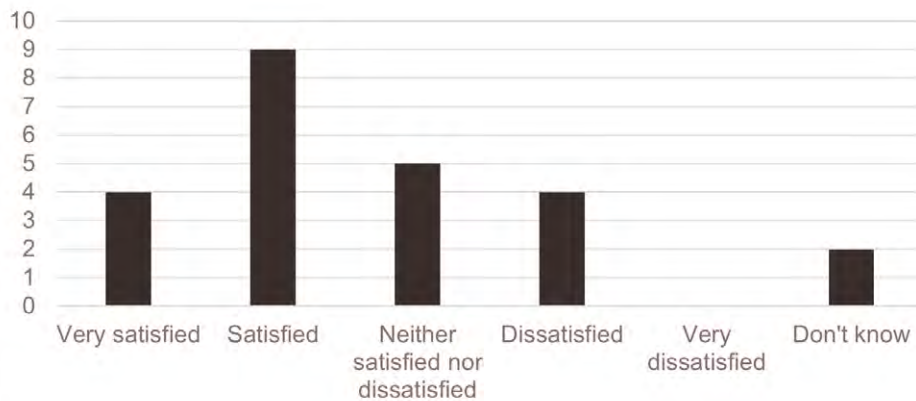


Figure 19. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Freshwater habitats are safeguarded

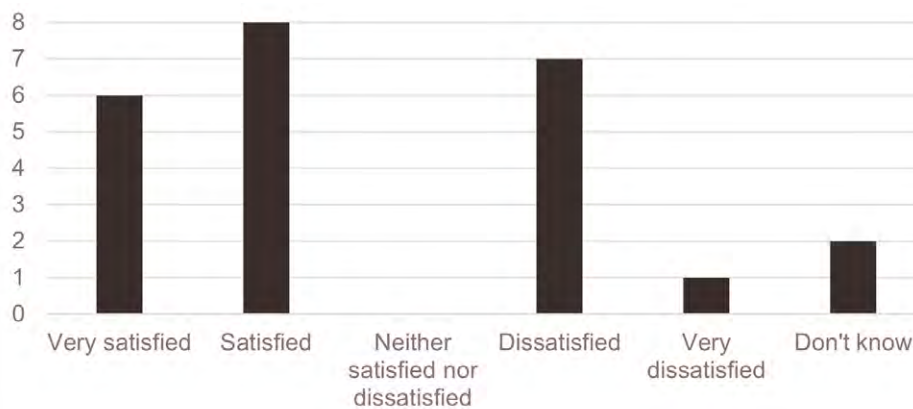


Figure 20. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Natural hydrological functions are restored at a catchment scale

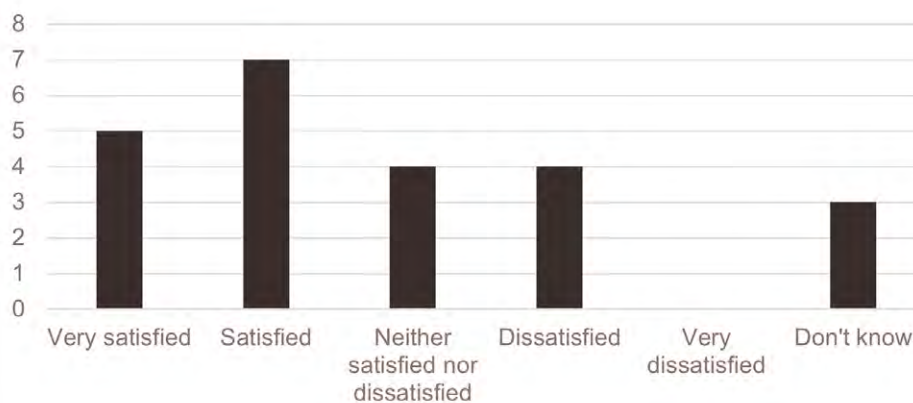


Figure 21. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Scrub and mosaic habitats are safeguarded, restored and created

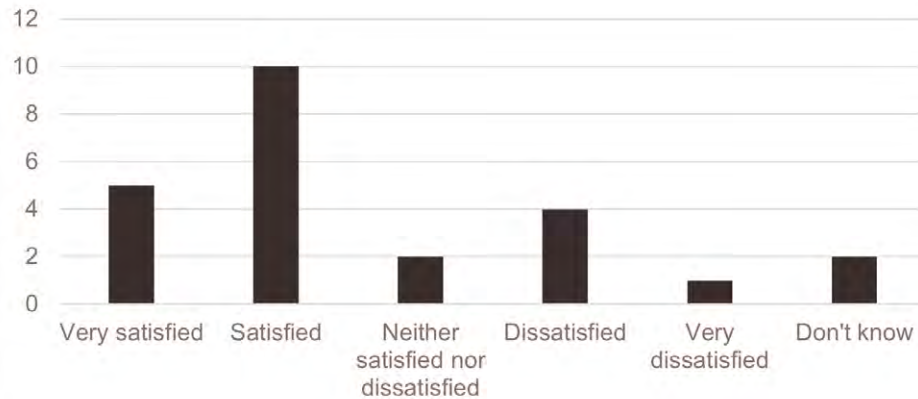


Figure 22. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Hedgerow networks provide core habitats for biodiversity and landscape character

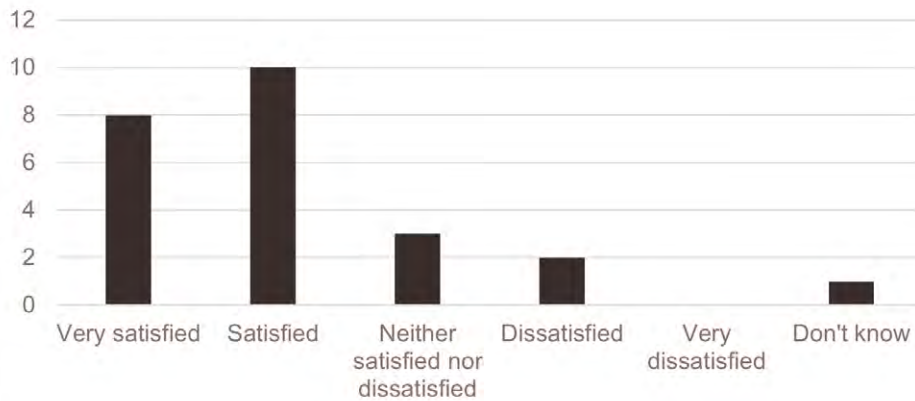


Figure 23. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Upland habitats are restored, and their condition is improved

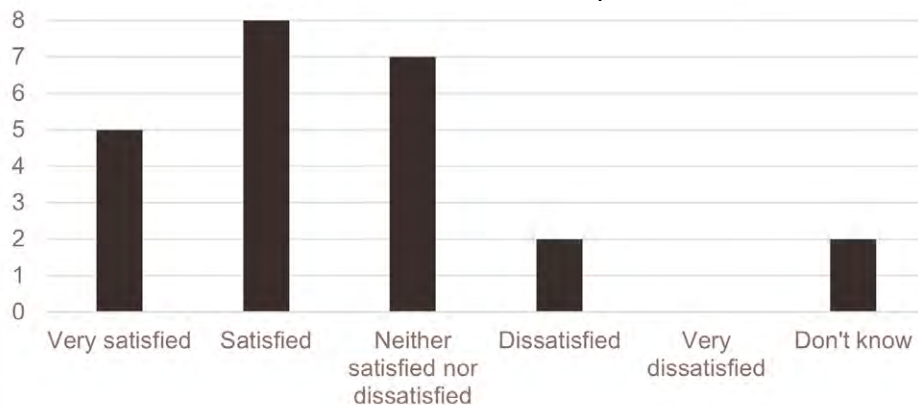


Figure 24. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Nature-friendly farming practices are widely adopted across Herefordshire

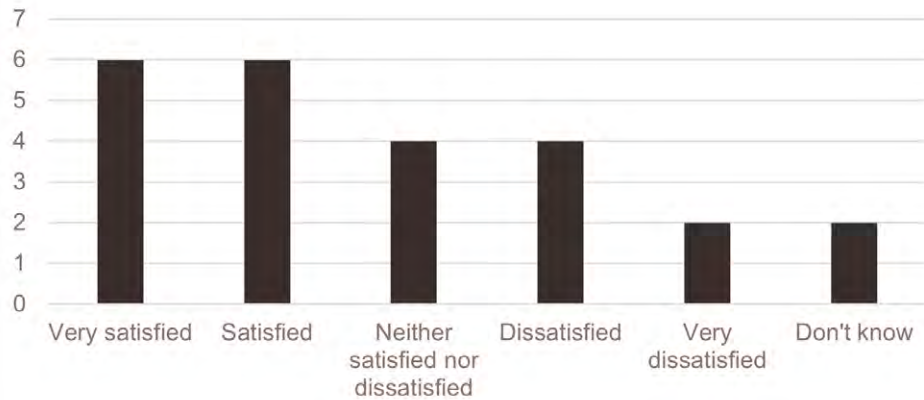


Figure 25. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Nature-rich areas within the built environment are accessible, climate resilient and biodiverse

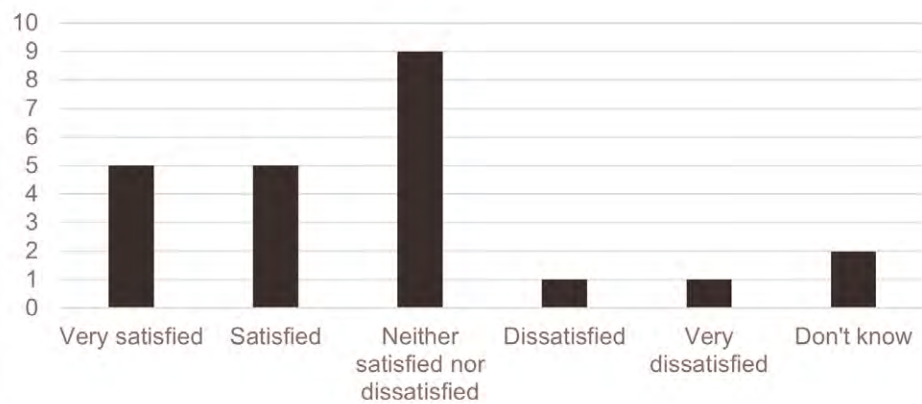


Figure 26. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Ecosystem resilience to invasive species, pests, and pathogens is strengthened

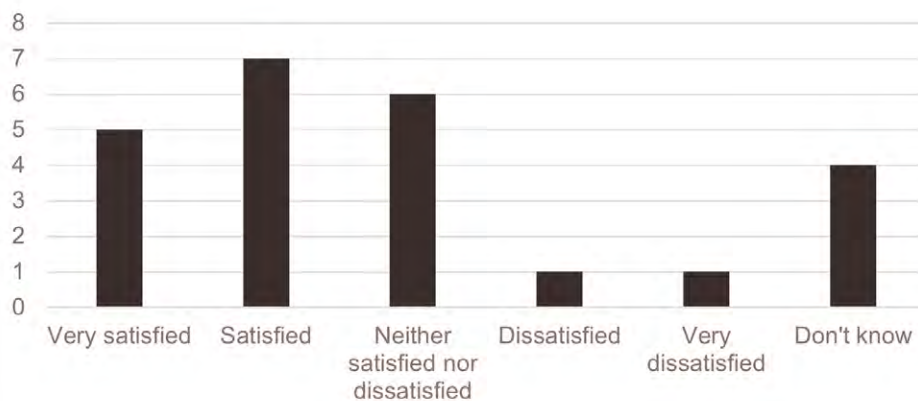


Figure 27. Reponse data:

PRIORITY: Cultural sites are rich in nature while being well maintained for their heritage value

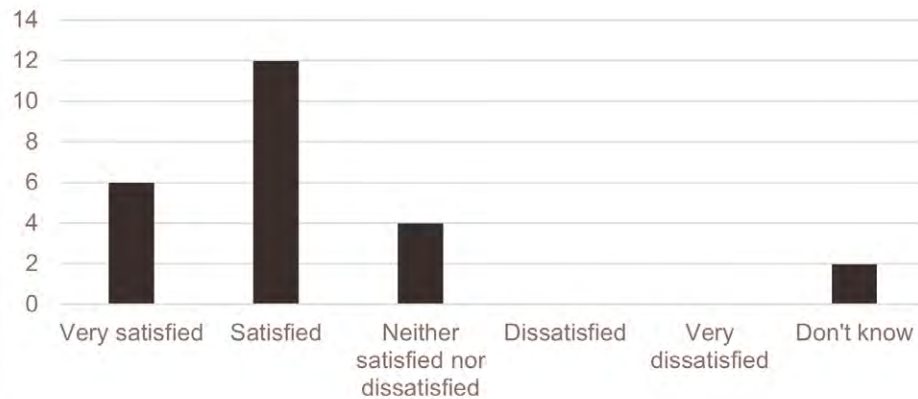
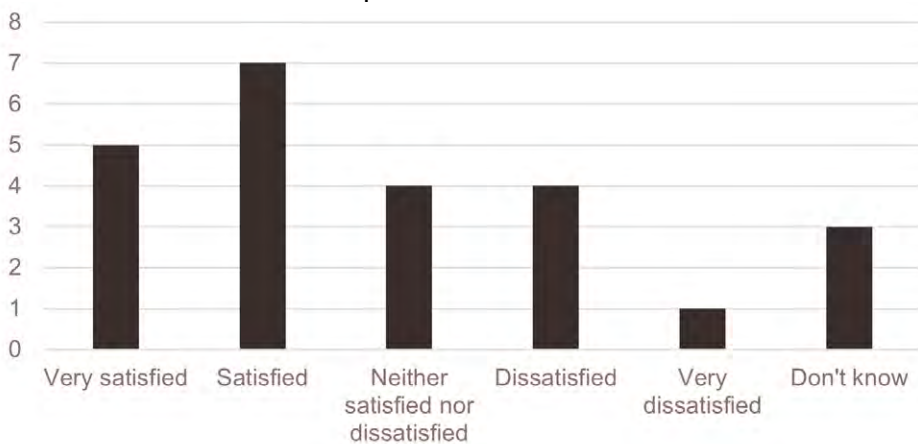


Figure 28. Reponse data:

Species-rich grassland habitat measures

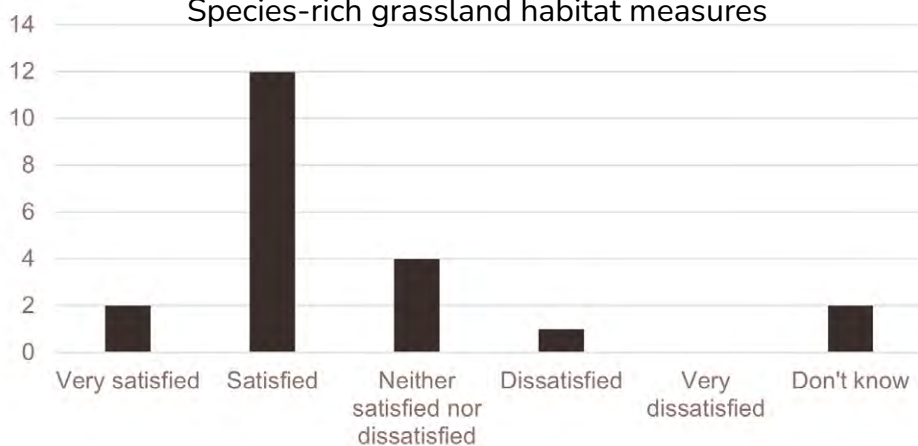
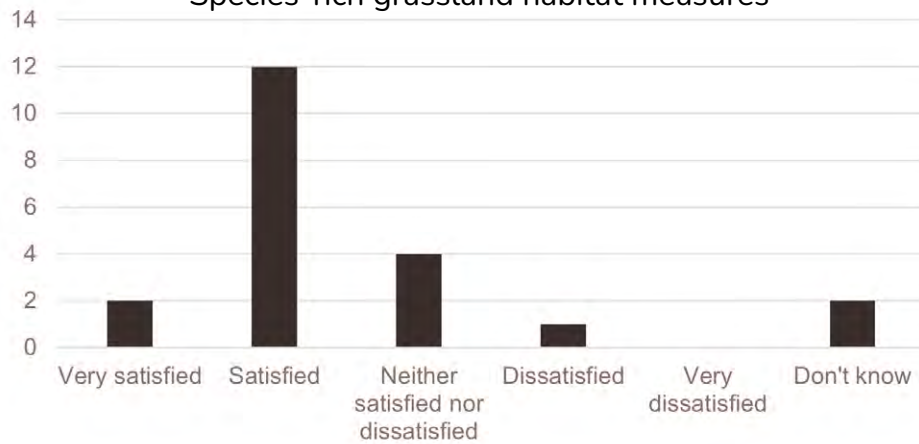
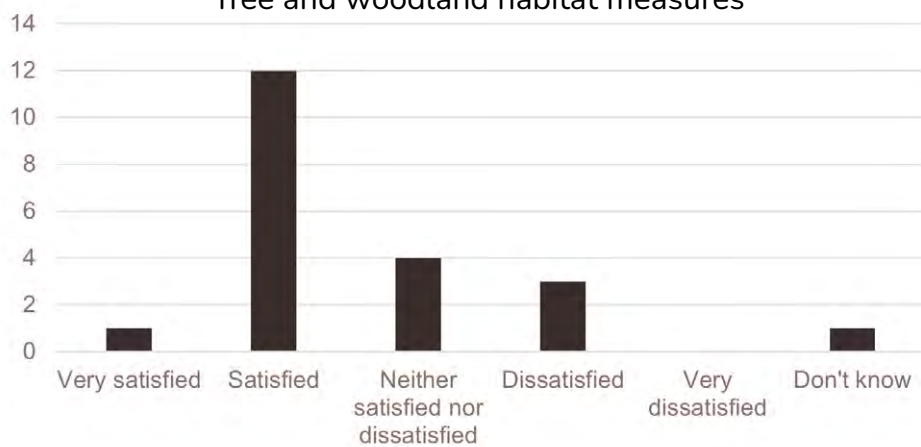


Figure 30. Reponse data:

Rivers, water and wetland habitat measures

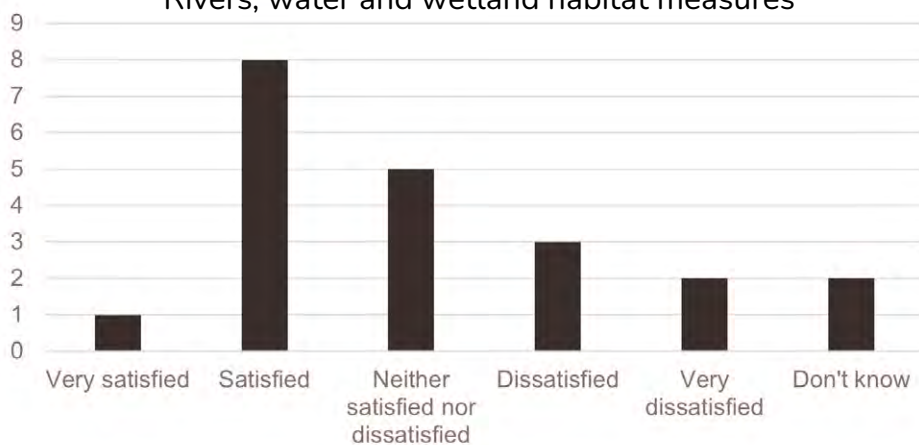
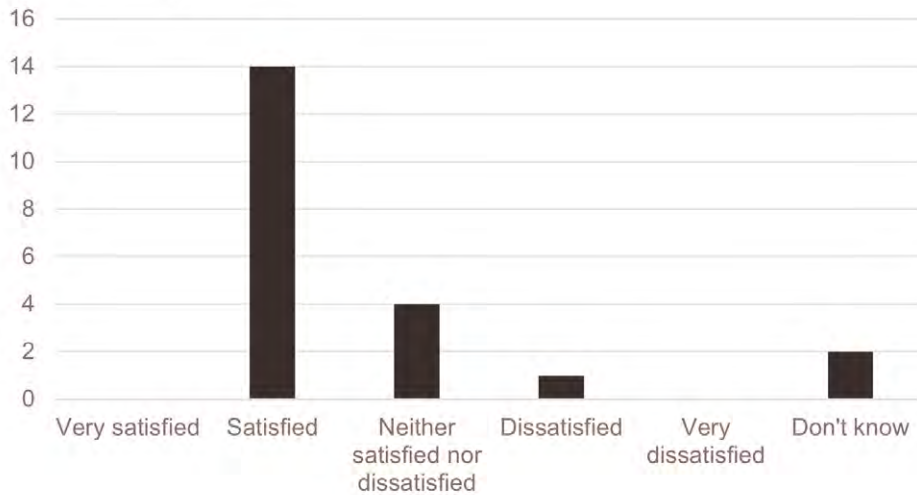
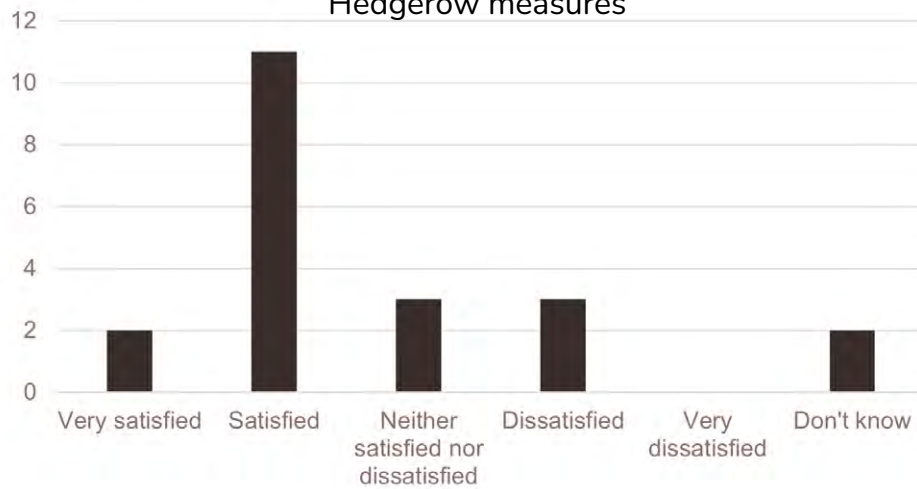


Figure 33. Reponse data:

Upland moorland and heathland habitat measures

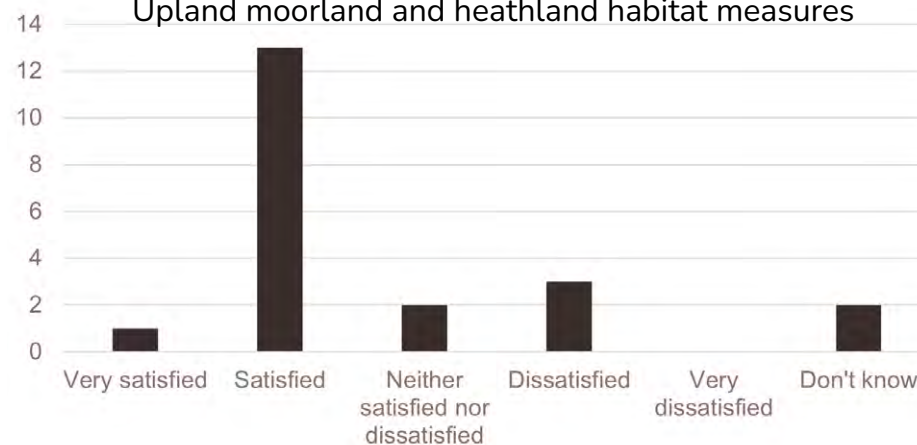
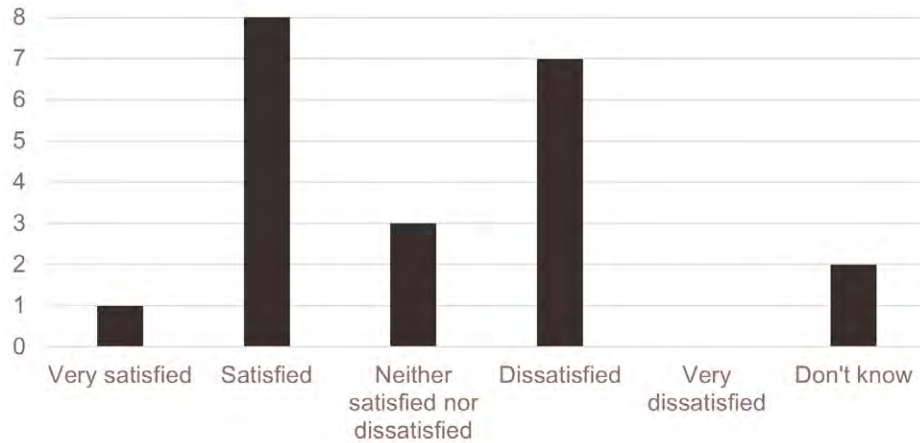
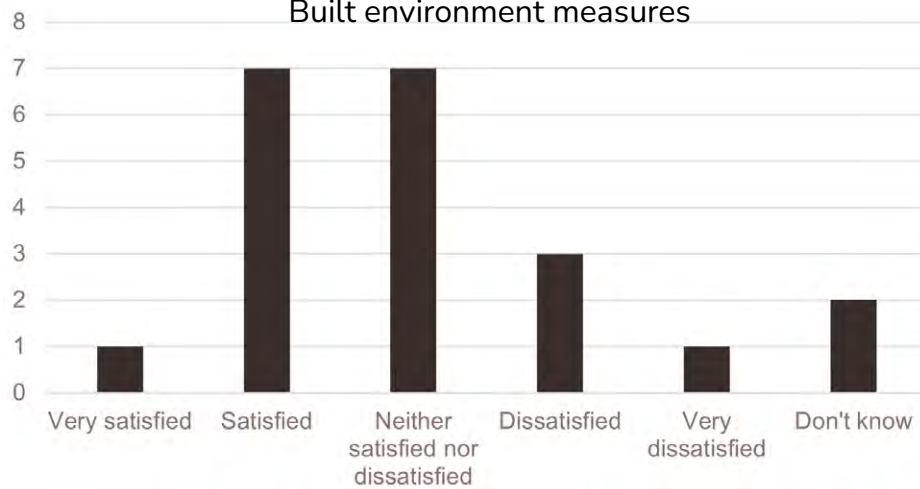


Figure 36. Reponse data:
