GUIDANCE ON DECLARING PERSONAL AND PREJUDICIAL INTERESTS AT MEETINGS

The Council's Members' Code of Conduct requires Councillors to declare against an Agenda item(s) the nature of an interest and whether the interest is personal or prejudicial. Councillors have to decide first whether or not they have a personal interest in the matter under discussion. They will then have to decide whether that personal interest is also prejudicial.

A personal interest is an interest that affects the Councillor more than most other people in the area. People in the area include those who live, work or have property in the area of the Council. Councillors will also have a

personal interest if their partner, relative or a close friend, or an organisation that they or the member works for, is affected more than other people in the area. If they do have a personal interest, they must declare it but can stay and take part and vote in the meeting.

Whether an interest is prejudicial is a matter of judgement for each Councillor. What Councillors have to do is ask themselves whether a member of the public – if he or she knew all the facts – would think that the Councillor's interest was so important that their decision would be affected by it. If a Councillor has a prejudicial interest then they must declare what that interest is and leave the meeting room.

20. SUGGESTIONS FROM MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC ON ISSUES FOR FUTURE SCRUTINY

No suggestions were made by Members of the Public.

A Councillor in attendance suggested that Special Educational Need (SEN) and Banded Funding should be considered for closer scrutiny.

21. CALL-IN OF CABINET DECISION ON SWIMMING PROVISION FOR PRIMARY SCHOOLS IN HEREFORD CITY

The Committee considered the Cabinet Decision to approve the decision not to reopen the St Martin's Swimming Pool (the LEA Pool), to evaluate the use of other pools for school swimming, particularly the Hereford Leisure Pool, and to report back by Easter 2009 with proposals for the future use of pools, which had been called in by three Members of the Committee.

The agenda report detailed the stated reasons for the call-in. Appended to the report was the decision notice of Cabinet setting out the decision and the report to Cabinet on 31 July 2008 on which that decision had been based. Also attached to the report at appendix 3 was an extract from the minutes of Cabinet and appendix 4 was a response to the questions raised by the call-in. Members received at the meeting copies of financial and usage statistics submitted by Councillor AT Oliver.

In the course of discussion the following principal points were noted:

- In response to various questions concerning why the pool had needed to close and the levels of maintenance, the Property Services Manager reported that the pool had been closed on Health and Safety grounds, principally due to the failure of the heating system and lack of emergency lighting. The maintenance of the LEA Pool had to be seen in the context of a £17m backlog of Council-wide maintenance. The £72,500 estimated capital investment required to enable the pool to reopen had been based on professional estimates rather than on competitive quotations.
- Responding to whether the Section 106 funding from the Bradbury Lines, Hereford, development had been allocated to the LEA pool, as specifically suggested at Central Area Planning Sub-Committee, the Committee were referred to paragraph 12 of the Cabinet report. The Director of Children's Services commented that 106 funding was to be invested in education for locality and amenity purposes.
- Concern was expressed over the capacity of the HALO Pool to accommodate
 the number of people wishing to swim, particularly in relation to future
 government proposals to introduce free swimming for the over 60s and under
 16s. In this context the Councils 'duty of care' towards the child under 'Every
 Child Matters' was also raised. Further concern was raised regarding the

potential for complaints that the paying public were unable to make use of the whole of the main pool. In response Mr Argent, Chief Executive, HALO Leisure, commented that HALO was part of the solution and not the problem in that they had reorganised the swimming programmes at the HALO pool at short notice to accommodate the schools. While there may be some minor disruption between 9am – 3pm during term times, mixed use by schools and public already occurred satisfactorily at other pools in the County and at the Hereford Leisure pool.

- Responding to questions over the use of the leisure pool for teaching Mr Argent acknowledged that while the floor of the leisure pool sloped to a beach, he was confident this was acceptable for teaching on the clear understanding that the wave machine was not used.
- The Committee acknowledged the financial and usage statistics submitted by Councillor AT Oliver. The Head of Performance, Planning and Development reported that many of the figures had been supplied by officers and were therefore known to them; however, in accordance with the decision of Cabinet, further financial and statistical work would be undertaken and would include the wider context of pool use throughout the County and this would inform the report to Cabinet at Easter 2009.
- Comment was made that public perception was that the decision to finally close the LEA Pool had already been made.
- Doubt was expressed whether the identified maintenance of the of the LEA Pool had been included in the Council's Capital Investment Plan. It was suggested that a robust feasibility / financial business case needed to be formulated.
- While claims of universal opposition to the closure by some school heads and public had been made, the Committee recognised that there was a wide range of opinion on the issue, including to the contra, which may be less vocal.
- It was suggested that the sums involved to re-open the pool were insignificant when compared to other projects e.g. the Masters House, Ledbury, the Council's overall budget and financial reserves. It was further suggested that the facility should receive annual levels of subsidy, as in the case of school transport.
- The Chairman of the Herefordshire Schools Forum reported that the Forum had considered the centrally retained element of funding from the Dedicated Schools Grant and, while sympathetic to the cause, were unable to offer further support due to the low level of central government funding to education in the County.
- Questioned on the current status of the pool the Property Services Manager reported that in effect it was decommissioned but could be re-commissioned, in that the water had been drained to avoid legionella. Responding to why the sand filters needed replacing, as listed in the £72,500 of initial investment, he reported that once the sand had dried out it had to be replaced for it to work.
- Asked why the building needed emergency lighting now rather than earlier the Director of Children's Services commented that the building had not been built to current day Health and Safety standards. The Council had a rolling programme to update and replace such equipment and this was undertaken in accordance with the priority to comply with fire risk assessments.
- Responding to questions concerning whether efforts had been made to balance the running costs of the pool the Committees attention was drawn to appendix 4 and the response to question C. The Committee were also informed that Council properties were inspected every 5 years in accordance with the Asset Management policy.
- Questioned on the position concerning the management agreement of the

LEA pool with HALO, the Committee were informed that this was still in place. Mr Argent informed the Committee that HALO had reviewed the additional user groups in accordance with the agreement to increase the use of the pool by all sections of the community.

- Questioned whether external funding was available e.g. from the Amateur Swimming Association, the Committee were informed that, so far as the Council was aware, no external funding was available for the necessary work.
- While the swimming pool assessment in 2003 had indicated there was an over provision of pool space in the County, it was suggested that with 20,000 new homes expected to be built in the coming years, the number of visiting migrant workers, and the possibility to capitalise on the new enthusiasm for swimming following the Olympics, greater use of the swimming pools should be anticipated
- A Committee member questioned if the £72,500 of works were undertaken then which budget in particular would it be financed from, and hoped that the school budgets would not be effected. An alternative comment was made that not all the finance need come from the Council as in the case of public fundraising for the replacement of the Sydonia swimming pool, Leominster.
- Mr Moynihan, Headteacher, Credenhill Primary School, commented that to the best of his knowledge the majority of the schools effected were using the HALO pool, however, 5 had not made alternative arrangements. There was a strong desire for the pool to be reopened and if that were the case then many, if not all, would return there.
- It was commented that no revenue was being generated by having the pool closed.

During the course of the meeting the Chairman invited the following to address the meeting: Mr Bradley, Dolphins Swimming Club; Mr C Kerfoot, Hereford Triathlon Club; Mr M Puddy, City of Herefords Swimming Club, and Mr Sascha Kindred, Paralympic swimming medal winner. While supporting the retention of the LEA pool, the principal points made centred on the need to provide adequate pool time for training (18-20 hours per week); that greater use of the pool could have been made by clubs had they known that sessions were available and how the expected increase in swimming (over 60s and under 16s) was to be supported.

The Cabinet Member (ICT, Education & Achievement) commented that both the LEA and HALO pools had a natural life span and unfortunately the LEA pool was now beyond its designed life expectancy. The future of the pool was an emotive issue and while he would have liked to have kept the pool open, decisions had to be taken and capital expenditure had to be prioritised. In addition there was the longer term issue regarding balancing the pools revenue accounts. He had requested at Cabinet that the options of divorcing the pool from the Education system or the transfer of the property under Community Asset Transfer (CAT) be looked at. Cabinet had agreed that a report be brought back by Easter 2009 at the latest and if, as part of that report, there was an evidence based business case to keep the pool open then it would be considered, if not then it should close.

RESOLVED: That the Committee recommend to Cabinet that:

- a) the Council invests £72,500 to enable the pool to reopen as soon as possible;
- b) there should be no additional costs to schools;
- c) the existing charge to schools be maintained; and

d) a thorough feasibility/business case for the next 2 years (to include LEA pool, HALO and users/voluntary sector) be formulated on the future of the pool in the context of the whole of Herefordshire swimming provision.

(Councillor RV Stockton requested that his abstention be recorded)

At the conclusion of the meeting a petition organised by Sarah Carr (Liberal Democrats), Hereford House, 20 East Street, Hereford, was handed to the Cabinet Member (ICT, Education & Achievement) and in summary those documents were:

- A 118 signature petition headed "Petition to reopen the LEA Swimming Pool

 I/We the undersigned call upon Roger Phillips and Herefordshire Council to
 listen to local parents and reopen the LEA Pool. Life-saving skills, not money
 saving cuts."
- 99 individual leaflets, containing a total of 144 names/signatories, each saying, "I/We the undersigned call upon Roger Phillips and Herefordshire Council to listen to local parents and reopen the LEA Pool. Life-saving skills, not money saving cuts."

EXTENDED SCHOOLS IN HEREFORDSHIRE

Report By: Early Years and Extended Services Manager

Wards Affected

Purpose

1. To consider the progress towards the implementation of extended services in and around schools within Herefordshire

Financial Implications

- 2. Capital funding for Extended Services within the General SureStart Grant is available until 2011 and is one of three interlocking strands along with funding for Children's Centres and the creation of childcare places. It will be important to focus on synergies with Children's Centres and childcare developments to add value in relation to delivery of the 'core offer' for Extended Schools. Revenue funding is available for the same period and is devolved to school cluster groups via the high schools. Guidance is given via DCSF on spend and high school bursers collate and audit data.
- 3. Grant funding for 09-10 onwards has yet to be announced by Department for Children, Schools and Families (DCSF) Funding for 08/09 is as follows

Revenue – 2008/09 - £349,011 General Sure Start Grant

Capital - 2008/09 - £303,368

Background

- 4. The Children Act 2004 requires Local Authorities and their relevant partners to cooperate to improve children's wellbeing and to ensure support for the five outcomes:
 - To be healthy
 - To stay safe
 - To enjoy and achieve
 - To make a positive contribution
 - To achieve economic wellbeing
- 5. The core principles and strategy which are key to establishing extended services closely align to a raft of parallel activity which includes:

- the development of Children's Centres
- the Herefordshire Early Years Action Plan
- the proposed Children's Trust
- the Youth Matters agenda and the formal Youth Offer.
- 6. All are charged with bringing coherence and delivering greater quality assurance to service provision. All promote the active involvement of children, young people, parents and carers in shaping services strategically and operationally. Schools at the heart of their communities are well placed to promote multi-agency working to improve outcomes for children.
- 7. Extended Schools and Children's Centres will help facilitate Herefordshire's delivery of the Every Child Matters Agenda improving outcomes for all children.
- 8. The intention is to:
 - Bring together services for children from conception onwards at neighbourhood level
 - Provide support to parents and carers
 - Enable all families to have access to the services of a centre by 2010
 - A centre in every community but with services delivered as locally as possible
 - Respond to local needs by building on existing services
- 9. The DCSF recognises that whilst there is no blueprint for how services are to be organised there is a CORE OFFER, which schools and partners will need to work towards. By 2010 every primary and secondary school will be expected to offer access to:
 - high quality childcare provided on the school site or through clusters or other local providers, with supervised transfer arrangements, available 8.00am-6.00pm all year round where appropriate
 - a varied menu of activities to be on offer, such as homework clubs and study support, sport (at least two hours a week beyond the school day for those who want it), music tuition, dance and drama, arts and crafts, special interest clubs such as chess and first aid courses, visits to libraries, museums and galleries, learning a foreign language, volunteering, business and enterprise activities
 - parenting support including information sessions for parents and carers at key transition points, parenting programmes run with the support of other children's services and family learning sessions to allow children and young people to learn with their parents
 - swift, easy and effective referral to a wide range of specialist support services such as speech therapy, child and adolescent mental health services, family support services, intensive behaviour support, and (for young people) sexual health services. Some may be delivered on school sites. This will need to link into the CAF arrangements

- providing wider community access to ICT, sports and arts facilities, including adult learning.
- In Herefordshire we are working with all schools as partners to deliver this agenda. Whilst the partnership of schools is likely to be used to define a cluster, other networks may be appropriate in order to recognise local factors, for example a smaller group of schools serving a discreet satellite community. This model also offers the kind of flexibility required to respond to the needs of the community, where services are shared rather than duplicated. This approach could be used to improve access to transport and accommodation and provides opportunities for pooling budgets and sharing resources, including personnel. The LA, with support from partner agencies, will work with schools in locality partnerships assisting them to meet together with local service providers, community representatives and voluntary agencies as appropriate. There are 7 patch-based Integrated Children's Services Development Co-ordinators who can help with this and partnerships of schools are encouraged to appoint Extended Schools Co-ordinators locally.
- 11. Under the new Ofsted inspection framework introduced in September 2005, the effectiveness of extended schools services and educational and support programmes for parents, families and members of the community will be evaluated and reported on by Ofsted.
- 12. Schools must evidence the extent to which they understand local needs and opinions, and are able to capitalise on this understanding to improve what they provide, both for their own pupils and the community as a whole.

Background

- All Sure Start, Early Years and Childcare Grant (SSEYCG) funding should support the delivery of the Government's Ten Year Strategy for Childcare, Choice for parents: the best start for children and in the case of extended schools, development by all schools of a core set of services as set out in the Extended Schools Prospectus. The strategy sets out the Government's vision to ensure that every child gets the best possible start in life and to give parents more choice about how to balance work and family life.
- The ten year childcare strategy action plan (Choice for parents, the best start for children: making it happen) was published April 2006. The plan recaps the principles of the strategy and sets it in the context of the Every Child Matters agenda. It highlights achievements, challenges and who needs to do what by when. The action plan is accessible on the Sure Start website. http://www.surestart.gov.uk/publications/?Document=1684
- The funding will also contribute to the delivery of some of the goals in the Children's Plan: Building brighter futures.
- Funding also supports the duties set out in the Childcare Act 2006. The new duties in the Act confirm local authorities' key role as strategic leaders for childcare and children's services. Local authorities and their partners in health services and Job Centre Plus are required to:
 - Improve Outcomes and narrow gaps at age five through the provision of integrated early years services.
 - Ensure there is sufficient childcare available for parents who want to work and train including an expanded and, where possible, more flexible free offer for three and four year olds.
 - Provide comprehensive information to parents.

Key priorities and challenges which Sure Start, Early Years and Childcare Grant (SSEYCG) will support in 2008-09 include:

- Following the completion of a childcare sufficiency assessment for Herefordshire.
 Filling the gaps between demand and supply identified in a childcare sufficiency
 assessment to secure sufficient childcare for working parents of children up to the
 age of 14 (18 for disabled children) The new duty which came into force April
 2008 applies to all working parents, and parents preparing for work. Particular
 attention will need to be paid to the needs of lower income parents and those
 who have disabled children.
- Delivering at the end of the Early Years Foundation Stage, a real terms reduction in the achievement gap between the lowest achieving children and the rest. This needs to be addressed within the context of securing better results for all 5 year olds.
- Focusing more sharply on raising standards and embedding a culture of continuous quality improvement across early years. The accomplishment of this together with the narrowing of the achievement gap will be supported by:
 - better use of data to monitor progress and identify where to target resources
 - strengthening alignment between the early years and school improvement functions within the authority
 - more effective use of self-evaluation tools by settings
 - securing greater graduate leadership of practise within Private, Voluntary and Independent (PV)I settings.
- Reviewing plans for delivering a children's centre in every community by 2010 to
 ensure that these achieve value for money and a fair distribution of resources to
 support services for all children while concentrating the greatest level of resource
 to meet the needs of the most disadvantaged families.
- Making adequate preparation for the transformation of disabled children's short break services.

PERFORMANCE DIGEST – APRIL-SEPTEMBER 2008/2009

Report By: Director of Children's Services

Wards Affected

County-wide

Purpose

1. To present the Performance Digest for Children's Service for the half year April to September 2008, and to highlight any issues arising.

Financial Implications

2. Remedial action in respect of the directorate's performance may require reallocation of resources within existing budgets.

Background

3. The Performance Digest is produced quarterly and is the mechanism for monitoring key performance indicators, both for the Children and Young People's Directorate and the wider Children's Trust.

Considerations

- 4. The Performance Digest for the period to the end of September 2008 is attached to this agenda, for Members' consideration. It is set out under the five outcomes of *Every Child Matters*, and service management, and includes a headline page for each outcome. A new National Indicator Set has been introduced for 2008/2009 which will eventually replace all existing Performance Assessment Framework (PAF) indicators and Best Value Performance Indicators.
- 5. In summary, key areas in each of the outcome areas, to which the Committee's attention should be drawn, are set out below:

Be Healthy

The percentage of children being breastfed at 6-8 weeks (NI 53) has remained constant for the first two quarters of 2008/2009 at around 50%. Many of the indicators in this outcome area rely on survey information – either from the nationally administered Tellus3 survey of children and young people or the local survey of children and young people. The results of the national Tellus3 survey have now been received but there was such a low response rate that a degree of caution will need to be exercised in interpreting the results. The number of Chlamydia screens being undertaken to meet the national target remains a concern although it is an issue nationally. However, the prevalence of Chlamydia in young people (NI 113) at 6.6% is below the national rate of 10%.

Staying Safe

In relation to the percentage of initial assessments for children's social care carried out within 7 working days of referral (NI 59), performance was on an upward trajectory for the first quarter of the year, against of a backdrop of continuing recruitment and retention difficulties. During the second quarter, there were a number of unforeseeable staffing difficulties within the Referral and Assessment Team which has impacted significantly on performance, giving a quarter end figure of 50.6%. This is being proactively and robustly managed and performance is expected to improve in Quarter 3. The percentage of core assessments that were carried out within 35 working days of commencement (NI 60) continues to increase, improving by 7 percentage points in Quarter 2 to 74%. This is on track to meet the year end target of 75%. Performance in relation to looked after children including placement stability, case reviews and allocations to social workers, remains strong. Although the number of referrals per 10,000 population (KIGS CH141) has stabilised at around 250, the percentage of repeat referrals (KIGS CH142) has risen to 24.2%. An audit is being undertaken to identify the reasons for the rising figure.

Enjoy and Achieve

Unvalidated results for Key Stage examinations are available but are still subject to change, prior to final figures being released in January 2009. Herefordshire's GCSE results are the best in the West Midlands. 69.4% of pupils achieved 5 or more A*-C GCSEs, a rise of 7.4% on 2007 and 3.7% above the national average. Those achieving 5 or more grade A*-Cs including English and Maths has risen by nearly 2% to 52.5%. Overall, boys' performance in Herefordshire has gone up by 7.1%. Key Stage 1 remains a key area of focus with results down again in 2008, as does achievement in the Early Year Foundation Stage. Targeted work over the last two years is expected to deliver improvements for Key Stage 1 results in 2009. Achievement in the Early Years Foundation Stage has been impacted by the high number of 'summer-born' children, an increase in the number of children with additional needs and those with English as an additional language. The targets for primary and secondary school absence (HCS 33 and 34) for the academic year 2007/2008 were not achieved although performance remained in line with the previous year's outturn at 5.19% and 7.4% respectively. Performance in relation to the percentage of statements of special educational needs prepared and issued within 18 weeks (BV 43a and b) remains strong at 100%.

Make a Positive Contribution

Work with young people through the Youth Service to gain recorded and accredited outcomes (BV 221a and b) remains on track to achieve national targets although performance dipped slightly during the summer. The percentage of young people in care communicating their views in reviews (PAF CF/63) remains strong. However, work is underway to improve the quality assurance and feedback mechanisms for young people in relation to their reviews.

Achieve Economic Wellbeing

The percentage of 16-18 year olds who are not in education, employment or training (NI 117) rose as at the end of Quarter 2 but this is expected as it includes all those young people leaving school and college at the end of the academic year. A more accurate picture will be available at the end of Quarter 3 when it is anticipated that the majority of these young people will have secured either further education, employment or training.

Service Management

The cost of services for looked after children (PAF CF/B8) has risen in the first half of the year as a result of an increase in the number of children and young people requiring placements to meet their specialist and/or complex needs, although the number of children and young people in care has fallen overall. The recruitment and retention of social workers remains a priority for the Council and is on track to have 55 full time

equivalent social workers in post by March 2009, just under the target of 57 set after the 2005 Joint Area Review.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Committee assess the levels of performance achieved for the first half of 2008/2009 and consider if further reports and/or action is judged to be necessary.
