GUIDANCE ON DECLARING PERSONAL AND PREJUDICIAL INTERESTS AT MEETINGS

The Council's Members' Code of Conduct requires Councillors to declare against an Agenda item(s) the nature of an interest and whether the interest is personal or prejudicial. Councillors have to decide first whether or not they have a personal interest in the matter under discussion. They will then have to decide whether that personal interest is also prejudicial.

A personal interest is an interest that affects the Councillor more than most other people in the area. People in the area include those who live, work or have property in the area of the Council. Councillors will also have a personal interest if their partner, relative or a close friend, or an organisation that they or the member works for, is affected more than other people in the area. If they do have a personal interest, they must declare it but can stay and take part and vote in the meeting.

Whether an interest is prejudicial is a matter of judgement for each Councillor. What Councillors have to do is ask themselves whether a member of the public – if he or she knew all the facts – would think that the Councillor's interest was so important that their decision would be affected by it. If a Councillor has a prejudicial interest then they must declare what that interest is. A Councillor who has declared a prejudicial interest at a meeting may nevertheless be able to address that meeting. but only in circumstances where an ordinary member of the public would be also allowed to speak. In such circumstances, the Councillor concerned will have the same opportunity to address the meeting and on the same terms. However, a Councillor exercising their ability to speak in these circumstances must leave the meeting immediately after they have spoken.

GUIDANCE FOR THE AGREED SYLLABUS CONFERENCE

Purpose

1. To inform the Conference of a number of issues relating to the role of an Agreed Syllabus Conference and agree key principals and a draft timetable to guide the formulation of an Agreed Religious Education Syllabus.

Background

- 2. At the meeting of the Herefordshire Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education (SACRE) held on 9 March 2009, SACRE noted that Herefordshire Schools are using the Herefordshire Agreed Syllabus which was introduced in September 2006. It is a requirement that the Syllabus be reviewed every 5 years. Therefore the current syllabus needs to be reviewed and agreed for implementation by September 2011. Having considered the time needed to undertake consultation and redrafting of the Agreed Religious Education Syllabus, particularly in view of the changes to guidance and the introduction of the new secondary curriculum and the Primary Curriculum Review, SACRE agreed to recommend that the Local Education Authority re-establish the Herefordshire Agreed Syllabus Conference.
- 3. In accordance with Section 35, Schedule 31 of the Education Act 1996 the Local Education Authority (LEA) established a Herefordshire Agreed Syllabus Conference to produce and recommend to the LEA an agreed Religious Education Syllabus for Herefordshire.
- 4. The Conference should be aware that the process of undertaking a syllabus review is governed by legislation and legal advice will be made available at the meetings as necessary.

Current Guidance

5. In late spring 2009 the DCSF produced a consultation document "Religious education in English Schools: Non-statutory guidance 2009" which is designed to supersede the guidance in circ DfE 1/94. At the time of writing the new guidance has not been confirmed, however, the basic principals governing the workings of an Agreed Syllabus Conference have not changed from those given in cir DfE 1/94 and therefore an extract from the 2009 draft guidance is attached at Appendix 1.

Key Principles for the Review

It is important that the review of the Herefordshire RE syllabus is linked to some key principles that provide both a foundation for the review and give direction to the task ahead. These principles will therefore provide an important reference point for those practitioners involved with any working parties formed to revise the syllabus and report back to the Conference. In accordance with the decision of SACRE on 9 March 2009 the Chairman (Cllr J Stone), SACRE Lead Officer (Mrs B Knight) and the Consultant for RE (Mrs J Mackley) have undertaken some preliminary work to inform

the Syllabus review. As a result the Consultant for Religious Education has compiled 6 key principles for the review for consideration (Appendix 2).

Timetable for the review

7 To ensure that the review meets the Syllabus implementation date of September 2011, the Consultant for Religious Education has compiled a draft timetable for consideration (Appendix 3).

Decision-making

- On any question to be decided by conference, the representative committees, as outlined in Appendix 1 paragraph 5.4.2, shall each have a single vote.
- 9 Only an Agreed Syllabus Conference may recommend an agreed syllabus and its recommendation must be unanimously agreed by the committees constituting the conference.

5.4 Agreed Syllabus Conferences

5.4.1 Role and working of Agreed Syllabus Conferences

Every LA is required to establish and support an occasional body called an Agreed Syllabus

Conference (ASC). Its role is to produce and recommend an agreed syllabus for RE which meets legal requirements and is educationally sound, and then review it every five years. An ASC can specify what must be taught through the locally agreed syllabus but it may not require schools to allocate particular time to RE in the curriculum. The guidance offered by the Framework provides a national benchmark for an ASC when revising its syllabus.

An ASC and any sub-committee it may appoint³⁸ must meet in public, subject to exceptions in relation to confidentiality.³⁹ Each of the four committees of a conference must cast its single vote in favour of a recommendation that an agreed syllabus be adopted by the LA before the LA can adopt that syllabus.⁴⁰ Any sub-committee of an ASC must include at least one member of each of its constituent committees.

5.4.2 Membership of an ASC

An ASC is required to be made up of four committees representing respectively:41

A Christian denominations and other religions and religious denominations

- B The Church of England
- C Teacher associations
- D The local authority

There is no provision for an ASC to include co-opted members, but this does not mean that advice cannot be sought beyond its membership. Some individuals might be invited to attend all

meetings of the conference, and of committees of the conference, in order for their advice to be available to members of the ASC. For an ASC to work effectively and produce a syllabus, it is important that its membership is as inclusive as the law allows.

5.4.3 Nature of an agreed syllabus

The local agreed syllabus must meet statutory requirements and reflect breadth and balance in RE, particularly in taking into account local characteristics and circumstances. To ensure the effective promotion of high quality RE for pupils, it is recommended that an agreed syllabus should:

- provide a clear structure which users find easy to follow and which highlights the contribution of RE to the curriculum;
- ensure that learning in RE has both continuity and progression;
- have clear statements about expected standards and assessment arrangements;
- provide clear guidance about the process of learning which should underpin effective planning of pupils' learning in RE;
- provide appropriate levels of challenge for pupils of differing ages and abilities; these should be progressive and demanding but realistic; and
- reflect curriculum developments nationally (such as the aims of the curriculum, the use of key concepts and ideas, the personal, learning and thinking skills) to ensure RE is part of a coherent curriculum for all pupils.

The Framework is the basis for the illustrative non-statutory programmes for RE set out by the Qualifications and Curriculum Authority (QCA) alongside the National Curriculum. Both the Framework and the programmes of study, provide guidance on designing a RE curriculum for agreed syllabuses and for programmes of RE in schools with a religious character. To ensure a consistent entitlement to breadth and richness in RE for all pupils, and adherence to a coherent national set of standards, it is recommended that ASCs should use the illustrative programmes of study published by the QCA, as the basis for their development of the local syllabus. The ASC can interpret those programmes of study in the light of local circumstances, and to select appropriate content and construct learning experiences.42

Syllabuses should enable schools to develop a balanced and inclusive approach to the organising of concepts, content, understanding, skills and attitudes.

Key Principles

The review and development of the Herefordshire Agreed Syllabus will....

- be built on collaboration and consultation;
- be evolutionary not revolutionary: build on the strengths of the current syllabus, taking account of the secondary curriculum changes from Sept 2008 and the primary curriculum review (2009f)
- draw strongly on national developments in RE, particularly the non statutory national framework for RE 2004;
- promote improved teaching and learning in RE;
- provide support for teachers through non statutory guidance and training.

Do these draft principles accurately represent the position of the Herefordshire Agreed Syllabus conference?
