GUIDANCE ON DECLARING PERSONAL AND PREJUDICIAL INTERESTS AT MEETINGS

The Council's Members' Code of Conduct requires Councillors to declare against an Agenda item(s) the nature of an interest and whether the interest is personal or prejudicial. Councillors have to decide first whether or not they have a personal interest in the matter under discussion. They will then have to decide whether that personal interest is also prejudicial.

A personal interest is an interest that affects the Councillor more than most other people in the area. People in the area include those who live, work or have property in the area of the Council. Councillors will also have a personal interest if their partner, relative or a close friend, or an organisation that they or the member works for, is affected more than other people in the area. If they do have a personal interest, they must declare it but can stay and take part and vote in the meeting.

Whether an interest is prejudicial is a matter of judgement for each Councillor. What Councillors have to do is ask themselves whether a member of the public – if he or she knew all the facts – would think that the Councillor's interest was so important that their decision would be affected by it. If a Councillor has a prejudicial interest then they must declare what that interest is. A Councillor who has declared a prejudicial interest at a meeting may nevertheless be able to address that meeting, but only in circumstances where an ordinary member of the public would be also allowed to speak. In such circumstances, the Councillor concerned will have the same opportunity to address the meeting and on the same terms. However, a Councillor exercising their ability to speak in these circumstances must leave the meeting immediately after they have spoken.

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YOU HAVE A RIGHT TO: -

- Attend all Council, Cabinet, Committee and Sub-Committee meetings unless the business to be transacted would disclose 'confidential' or 'exempt' information.
- Inspect agenda and public reports at least five clear days before the date of the meeting.
- Inspect minutes of the Council and all Committees and Sub-Committees and written statements of decisions taken by the Cabinet or individual Cabinet Members for up to six years following a meeting.
- Inspect background papers used in the preparation of public reports for a period of up to four years from the date of the meeting. (A list of the background papers to a report is given at the end of each report). A background paper is a document on which the officer has relied in writing the report and which otherwise is not available to the public.
- Access to a public Register stating the names, addresses and wards of all Councillors with details of the membership of Cabinet and of all Committees and Sub-Committees.
- Have a reasonable number of copies of agenda and reports (relating to items to be considered in public) made available to the public attending meetings of the Council, Cabinet, Committees and Sub-Committees.
- Have access to a list specifying those powers on which the Council have delegated decision making to their officers identifying the officers concerned by title.
- Copy any of the documents mentioned above to which you have a right of access, subject to a reasonable charge (20p per sheet subject to a maximum of £5.00 per agenda plus a nominal fee of £1.50 for postage).
- Access to this summary of your rights as members of the public to attend meetings of the Council, Cabinet, Committees and Sub-Committees and to inspect and copy documents.

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

The application for a variation to the premises licence has received representation and is bought before the committee for determination.

Key Considerations

To consider what action should be taken, if any, to promote the four licensing objectives in accordance with the recommendation.

Community Impact

11 The granting of the licence as applied for may have an impact on the Community.

Legal Implications

- The Committee should be aware of a number of stated cases which have appeared before the Administrative Court and are binding on the Licensing Authority.
- The case of Daniel Thwaites Plc v Wirral Borough Magistrates' Court (Case No: CO/5533/2006) at the High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division Administrative Court on 6 May 2008, [2008] EWHC 838 (Admin), 2008 WL 1968943, Before the Honourable Mrs Justice Black.
- 14 In this case it was summed up that: -
 - A licensing authority must have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. Licensing authorities may depart from it if they have reason to do so but will need to give full reasons for their actions.
- Furthermore the Thwaites case established that only conditions should be attached to a licence with a view to promoting the Licensing objectives and that 'real evidence' must be presented to support the reason for imposing these conditions.
- This judgement is further supported in the case of The Queen on the Application of Bristol Council v Bristol Magistrates' Court, CO/6920/2008 High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division The Administrative Court, 24 February 2009, [2009] EWHC 625 (Admin) 2009 WL 648859 in which it was said:

'Licensing authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for licensing objectives'.

17 Schedule 5 gives a right of appeal to: -

Rejection of applications relating to premises licences

- 1 Where a licensing authority—
 - (a) rejects an application for a premises licence under section 18,
 - (b) rejects (in whole or in part) an application to vary a premises licence under section 35,
 - (c) rejects an application to vary a premises licence to specify an individual as the premises supervisor under section 39, or
 - (d) rejects an application to transfer a premises licence under section 44, the applicant may appeal against the decision.

Decision to grant premises licence or impose conditions etc.

- 2(1) This paragraph applies where a licensing authority grants a premises licence under section 18.
 - (2) The holder of the licence may appeal against any decision—
 - (a) to impose conditions on the licence under subsection (2)(a) or (3)(b) of that section, or
 - (b) to take any step mentioned in subsection (4)(b) or (c) of that section (exclusion of licensable activity or refusal to specify person as premises supervisor).

- (3) Where a person who made relevant representations in relation to the application desires to contend—
 - (a) that the licence ought not to have been granted, or
 - (b) that, on granting the licence, the licensing authority ought to have imposed different or additional conditions, or to have taken a step mentioned in subsection (4)(b) or (c) of that section,

he may appeal against the decision.

- (4) In sub-paragraph (3) "relevant representations" has the meaning given in section 18(6).
- Section 9 states that any such appeal must be made to a Magistrates Court for the area in which the premises are situated within 21 days of notification of the decision.

Consultees

- 19 Responsible authorities and persons living within the vicinity or with a business interest within the vicinity of the premises.
- A copy of the application was served on the responsible authorities. This was backed up by an email sent to them by the Licensing Authority.
- The notice of application was displayed on the premises prior to the start of the consultation period and for a period of 28 days. In addition, notice of the application was required to be published in a newspaper which was circulated within the vicinity of the premises.
- The applicant has produced a copy of that advertisement which is correct.



With reference to the Change of Conditions of operation of the Public House called "The Brewery", in Bye Street, Ledbury, Herefordshire, HR8 2AG

The Public House in question is a nicely run, quiet and orderly, premise. The talk and chatter that can quite clearly be heard when the clientele are out side the front door, on the pavement, having a smoke, using their mobile telephones and just chatting between their selves, is an interference we live with.

As very near neighbours it is understood that the present landlords wish to build up the business, they have been there about 12 months now and have been VERY successful in that aim. The Brewery public house is in a residential area. It is a quiet residential area which is also a conservation area. We need our peace conserved, please. The Youth Club next door causes no problems, even when they have band practice with their doors open, and my windows are open, they are hardly noticed, but what goes on at the pub is noticed even now.

I wish to lodge my objections to

A: The removal of the requirement for safety checks on both the Gas and Electricity supplies; that sounds daft, and is daft.

This is a business premises - safety checks are an essential. When the chip shop at the end of the terrace went up, it took lives with it and in the Fire Service is still known as "The Ledbury Incident". We don't really want a repeat of that, do we?

B: Live music in the pub just over the road?

The premises' is about six yards from my back door and back windows. No thank you. The acoustics in this part of the town are on a par with the Royal Albert Hall or, perhaps, the Opera House in Sydney, Australia. I have been in both so I do know what I am making comparisons with. Sounds and noises of voices, music from passing cars, passing cars with no music, Mums with their toddlers, children to and from school, youngsters to and from the town pubs, etcetera ad infinitum, travel very well and very clearly. Even on a foggy night we can hear every thing at both front and back of these premises.

C: Live music usually includes microphones and amplifiers.

If it happens I trust there will be a ban on such mechanical devices? Any way, the place is too small to need them and their acoustics do not require such implements.

D. The landlords are talking of having "One Man Bands"

Percussion instruments are deafening at the best of times and I do not see why I, or any-one else, should be driven out of my/their house by noise nuisance. I have no wish to need to use ear plugs in my own home just because of some-one else having a desire to almost deafen the clients who they have in side and the passing public. We get more than enough of loudness when pub goers go home from the town pubs and they are capable of waking us with their shouting and bawling. But ten or twenty minutes worth is not like several hours of it.

Please to also remember the hours of quiet, by law, are from 11 at night until 7 in the morning. The dust cart and road sweepers are often around between 6 a.m. and 6.30 and that usually wakes us up. Personally, I have no wish to be kept awake by rowdiness from any source, especially when it can be avoided.

As a further example of how we can hear what goes on in the pub, when the football was on a couple of months ago (was it something to do with the World Cup?) I went in there and asked them to turn down the volume, it was reduced a little, but with reluctance. They have a long, or deep, premise and instead of putting the noise and television screen at the back of the pub, away from their neighbours, they had it on the outside wall six yards away. The walls of all these premises are single, not double, therefore there is greater transfer of sound through said walls. Perhaps the bar staff wanted to watch the football while they worked?

E. The hours of business

At present The Brewery lock the door at 11 p.m. Those clients already in can stay, others who may drift down from the town pubs and already inebriated, cannot get in. By mid-night the pub has emptied in an orderly manner. There are about half a dozen people still in there at eleven and they are simply empting their glasses. Even the various eating houses in Bye Street close at 10.30 to avoid the drunken un-desirables who have staggered out of the town pubs. We get debris left every where and that includes vomit - the latest deposit being out side my front door and found this morning.

If the pub stays open until some un-reasonable hour, how are we, the local residents, supposed to get our own sleep?

The pub deliveries are now mid-morning because the landlords (by their own admission) cannot take the earlier mornings, the landlady staggers about through tiredness at 11 in the mornings. They may be night owls, but we have one in our block who is a milkman, so when does he start apart from some un-earthly hour, the same house has a 4 month old baby. Over the road is a lorry driver who also does not need the disturbance and there are others who do shift work while others lead "normal" lives. I, fortunately, no longer need to rise so early, but I don't wish to be woken when the pub turns out at 1.30 or 2 o'clock in the morning. We get enough of that from the town pubs, thank you very much.

F A Catering Licence

Now they also want to serve cooked snacks at mid-night. Get off!

What are they after, a full catering establishment? A greasy spoon café cum pub? When the wind is in the wrong direction, I have to shut my windows against the chip shop next door. I don't want to have to get out of bed to do that against the pub as well! If they were to be granted a catering licence for cooked food, this will, presumably, entail building work for a commercial kitchen? Remember please, this is a Conservation Area. Or would they be permitted to use the "house" kitchen? I would not have thought so.

All the food establishments in Bye Street close their doors for 10.30, we have litter from them left all over the place, we have no Police to monitor the town pubs, so we have no chance of Police protection down here. The woman from the Youth Centre next to the pub reckons the debris left there comes from the pub, so far I have backed the pub against her suggestions. I won't be able to if this disturbance licence is granted.

The landlords have spoken about this lot and at least two of us have had a letter from the landlord which, in part, sounds a bit threatening, (a copy of which is enclosed). When I said their football screen and loudspeakers would have been better placed at the back of the pub, it was suggested that that would interfere with toilet and back garden access. I suggested it would be better to mark walkways as in factories rather than upset the locals who have been here a lot longer than they have.

Please also remember that the local residence have been here a lot longer than they have.

Purpose

To consider a full review of a premises licence following an expedited review and representation against the interim steps in respect of the Crown & Sceptre Inn, Market Place, Ross-on-Wye, HR9 5NX.

Recommendation

THAT the Sub-Committee when determining this review must consider:

- what steps it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives; and
- what steps should be taken to secure the promotion of the licensing objectives including whether the interim steps should be made permanent.

- Application received against the interim steps on 14 October 2010.
- Hearing arranged for 18 October 2010 within the required 48 hours.

Options

- 1 There are a number of option open to the committee:
 - the modification of the conditions of the premises licence;
 - the exclusion of the sale of alcohol by retail (or other licensable activities) from the scope of the licence;
 - the removal of the designated premises supervisor from the licence;
 - the suspension of the licence for a period not exceeding 3 months; and
 - the revocation of the licence.

Reasons for Recommendations

2 Ensures compliance with the Licensing Act 2003 and the Crime & Disorder Act 2006.

Background Information

- The powers to call for an Expedited review are contained in Section 53A of the Licensing Act as amended by the Violent Crime Reduction Act 2006. The powers allow;
 - The police to trigger a fast track process to review a premises licence where the police consider that the premises are associated with serious crime or serious disorder (or both); and
 - The licensing authority to respond by taking interim steps quickly, where appropriate, pending a full review.
- The expedited review hearing was held on 6th October 2010 where the committee considered an application made by the Chief Constable of the West Mercia Police. At that hearing it was decided that the premises licence should be suspended forthwith. At that time the premises licence holder Mr Cousens, was not present.
- Sarah Dean has been at the premises since 27th August and as such should have been the premises licence holder and Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS), although no application had been submitted by her solicitor to that effect. At the time of the incident, which led to the Expedited Review, she was at and in charge of the running of the premises.
- On 12th October an application was received by the Licensing Authority from Sarah Dean, for transfer of the premises licence and change of DPS, both into her name, which was to have immediate effect.
- 7 The legislation allows the premises licence holder to make representation against the interim steps at any time up to the full review hearing.
- The representation against the interim steps was made by Sarah Dean and received by email at the Licensing Authority on 14th October.
- A hearing was held on 18th October to consider the representation made against the interim step. At this hearing the licence was re-instated and the following interim steps where put in place:

13 Representation

Copies of the application and certificate have been sent to the responsible authorities.

A further representation has been received from the West Mercia Police.

A representation has also been received from Enterprise Inns who own the premises on the grounds that they have business within the vicinity of the premises.

Copies of these can be found within the background papers.

Key Considerations

- 14 The licensing authority must take into account any relevant representations made. Relevant representations are those that:
 - relate to one or more of the licensing objectives;
 - · have not been withdrawn; and
 - are made by the premises licence holder, a responsible authority or an interested party (who is not also a responsible authority).

Community Impact

15 It is felt that if the wrong course of action is taken then this could have an adverse effect on the local community.

Legal Implications

An appeal may be made within 21 days of the licence holder being notified of the licensing authority's decision to a magistrates' court. An appeal may be made by the premises licence holder, the chief officer of police and/or any other person who made relevant representations.

17 The decision of the licensing authority, following the review hearing, will not have effect until the end of the period allowed for appeal, or until the appeal is disposed of. Any interim steps taken will remain in force over these periods.

- 18 Responsible authorities and persons living within the vicinity or with a business interest within the vicinity of the premises.
- The notice of review was displayed on the premises which invited representation between 6 and 19 October 2010. The notice was also displayed at the offices of the Licensing Authority at Bath Street.
