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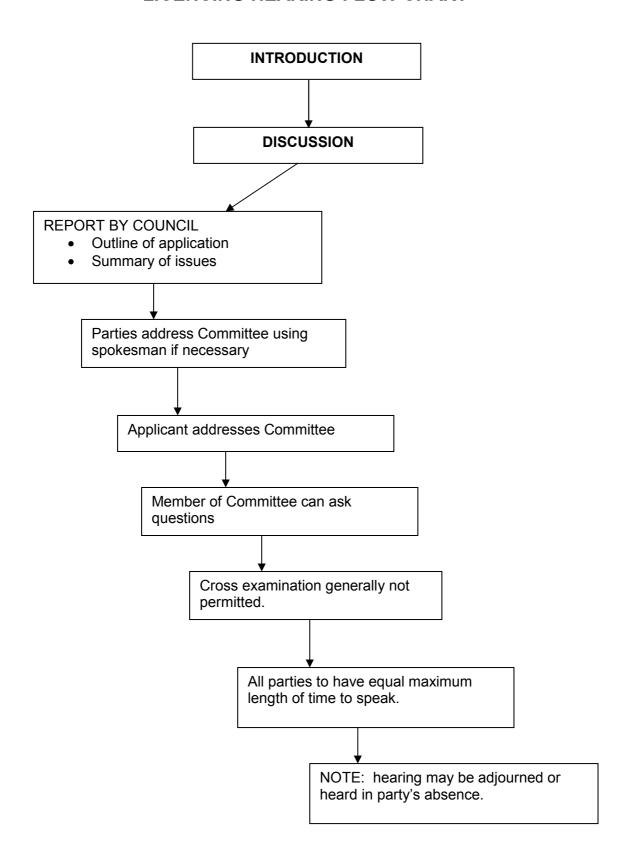
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LICENCING HEARING FLOW CHART

Licence Application

- The application is for the grant of a Licensed Premises Gaming Machine Permit for 5 machines of Category C or D.
- The premises licence holder has previously given notification of automatic entitlement in respect of 2 machines under Section 282 of the Gambling Act 2005.
- To enable premises to have 5 machines a variation application has been made for an increase in machines from 4 to 5.

- A plan of the proposed locations of the machines is attached within the background papers.
- The applicant has requested an increase in numbers due to the current demand on the current 4 AWP machines.

Key Considerations

9 Schedule 13 paragraph 4(1) states:

A licensing authority to whom an application is made under this Schedule shall consider it having regard to the licensing objectives, any relevant guidance issued by the Commission under section 25 and such other matters as they think relevant.

Community Impact

The granting of the licence as applied is unlikely to have any impact on the Community.

Legal Implications

- 11 Schedule 13 of the legislation states that:
 - 5 (1) A licensing authority may not attach conditions to a permit.
 - (2) As soon as is reasonably practicable after granting an application, a licensing authority shall issue a permit to the applicant.
 - (3) As soon as is reasonably practicable after refusing an application a licensing authority shall notify the applicant of—
 - (a) the refusal, and
 - (b) the reasons for it.
 - 6 (1) A licensing authority may grant an application under this Schedule only if the applicant holds an on-premises alcohol licence.
 - (2) A licensing authority may not refuse an application, or grant an application in respect of a different category or smaller number of gaming machines than that specified in the application, unless they have—
 - (a) notified the applicant of their intention to refuse the application, or grant the application in respect of—
 - (i) a smaller number of machines than that specified in the application,
 - (ii) a different category of machines from that specified in the application, or
 - (iii) both, and
 - (b) given the applicant an opportunity to make representations.
 - (3) A licensing authority may satisfy sub-paragraph (2)(b) by giving the applicant an opportunity to make—
 - (a) oral representations,
 - (b) written representations, or
 - (c) both
 - (4) Sub-paragraph (2)(b) shall not apply in respect of a refusal if the refusal was by virtue of sub-paragraph (1).
- 12 Appeal
 - 21(1) The applicant for or holder of a permit may appeal if the licensing authority—

- (a) reject an application for a permit,
- (b) grant an application for a permit in respect of a smaller number of machines than that specified in the application or a different category of machines from that specified in the application (or both), or
- (c) give a notice under paragraph 16.
- (2) An appeal under this paragraph must be instituted—
 - (a) in the magistrates' court for a local justice area in which the premises to which the appeal relates are wholly or partly situated,
 - (b) by notice of appeal given to the designated officer, and
 - (c) within the period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the appellant or holder receives notice of the decision against which the appeal is brought.

GUIDANCE NOTES: APPLICATION FOR THE NOTIFICATION / GRANT / VARIATION / TRANSFER OF A LICENSED PREMISES GAMING MACHINE PERMIT (FOR USE BY PREMISES LICENSED TO SUPPLY ALCOHOL FOR CONSUMPTION ON THE PREMISES)

- This form is to be used for the NOTIFICATION of up to 2 gaming machines of categories C and / or D under Section 282 of the Gambling Act 2005, or the GRANT / VARIATION / TRANSFER of a gaming machine permit under Section 283 and Schedule 13 of the Gambling Act 2005.
- All references to 'Premises Licence' refer to a Premises Licence under the Licensing Act 2003 authorising the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises.
- 3. The premises must be licensed under the Licensing Act 2003 to sell alcohol for consumption on the premises.
- 4. A 'Premises Licence holder' is a person holding a Premises Licence under the Licensing Act 2003.
- The gaming machines must be located on these licensed premises and there must be a bar for serving alcohol to customers on the premises, without the requirement that alcohol is served only with food.
- 6. The permit's duration is indefinite as it is linked to the Premises Licence. There is a first annual fee payable 30 days after the grant of the permit and an annual fee payable after that before each anniversary of the date of issue of the permit. Failure to pay the annual fee may result in the cancellation of the permit. The annual fee is £50.
- 7. Two types of gaming machines can be located in alcohol licensed premises. These are:
 - Category C: Maximum stake = 50p / Maximum prize = £25
 - Category D: Maximum stake = 10p or 30p non-monetary / Maximum prize = £5 cash or £8 non-monetary
- 8. The holder of a licensed premises gaming machine permit must comply with any relevant Code of Practice issued by the Gambling Commission under Section 24 of the Gambling Act 2005. The Gaming Machine Code of Practice for Alcohol licensed premises permits and permissions is available via the Gambling Commission's website at: http://www.gamblingcommission.gov.uk/ Should you be unclear as to the provisions of such a code of practice please contact your local licensing officer at the council address provided.
- 9. This licensing authority must notify the applicant of its grant / refusal of the application for a permit as soon as is reasonable practicable after that decision to grant / refuse has been made.














<u>Licensed Premises Gaming Machines</u> JD Wetherspoon Policy and Procedure Overview

We understand when considering this application that the Licensing Authority will consider the 3 objectives of the Gambling Act 2005 and therefore have set out below the policies and procedures JD Wetherspoon undertakes in its pubs to promote this objectives. In addition the Gambling Commission's "Gaming Machine Permits Code of Practice£ is complied with.

1. Protecting children and other vulnerable people from being harmed or exploited by gambling;

To ensure that no persons under the age of 18 are permitted to play on our gaming machines, we abide by a Challenge 21 policy in all of our premises. Under this policy, all of our employees are trained to ask any customer who appears to be under the age of 21 years to provide valid proof of age that they are over the age of 18. When in use, Door Supervisors are also fully briefed on our policy and what is expected of them in the implementation of the same.

- J D Wetherspoon has adopted the industry standards and the recommendations of the Gambling Commission and recognises only the following forms of identification as valid forms of proof of age:
 - National passport
 - Photographic Drivers' Licence
 - United Kingdom 'PASS' accredited age identification card with photograph.

In certain circumstances, other forms of ID are accepted at the discretion of the manager on duty such as international ID cards or military ID cards.

We apply this policy not to all age restricted activities on our premises.

All employees receive induction training on our Challenge 21 policy when they commence employment with the Company and then receive regular refresher training. All employees complete video training, quizzes and sign a letter to confirm that they have had this training and understand their responsibilities. All training records are retained on personnel files and these files are regularly reviewed by the pub management team and members of our Retail Audit department to ensure that the training system is being satisfactorily completed.

Staff compliance with our Challenge 21 policy is tested by a number of means:

- 1. Management review of a 'refusals log' which records when and how often bar staff are recording when a sale has been refused.
- 2. Independent mystery visitors who are aged 18 and 19 years are sent into our pubs to test compliance with our Challenge 21 policy.

Our Challenge 21 policy is also actively promoted within the premises using self-adhesive signs at every entrance, staff wearing 'It's my job to ask' badges and posters throughout the premises.

All front of house staff are aware of their responsibility for preventing underage gambling.

All machines are situated in a place where their use can be supervised.

2. Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder, or being used to support crime; and

The power to all gaming machines is turned off after the pub has closed to ensure potential thieves are not attracted by the lights in the pub.

JD Wetherspoon pubs also have two types of alarm systems, the panic alarm and intruder alarm, which cover the majority of the pub including the customer area where gaming machines are located.

The monitored intruder alarm covers the main entry points when the pub is closed. It is mainly activated by a forced entry into the pub triggering the door contacts or motion detectors. This pub is internally described as having a 'level 1 response' to its alarm system, meaning police response. This is an automated system which feeds through to Secom central station, our alarm consultants, who notify the police and the registered key holders of the pub.

JD Wetherspoon prides itself on provide safe, well run premises for all people to enjoy themselves in. Over our estate of 780 pubs we spend considerable time and resources ensuring they are all well equipped with adequate and appropriate CCTV coverage.

3. Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way.

All of our AWP machines are located in well supervised areas fully open to the public at large and are provided by reputable companies.

6 The grounds for the review are: -

The premises is an independent retail shop situated in Ross on Wye.

The request for this review is based on the licensing objectives regarding the prevention of crime and disorder and the protection of children from harm.

The premise has been the subject the subject of a test purchase operation which it failed.

7 The information provided to support this application is: -

During the evening of Wednesday 27th June Herefordshire Council trading standards department carried out a test purchase operation at the premise.

A 16 year old male was sold 4 cans of Fosters lager 4.0%

Police records show previous sales of alcohol at the premises on:

13/08/10 - 1920hrs

26/08/08 - 1930hrs

23/12/07 - 1415hrs

The premises licence holder and DPS has remained unchanged since the grant of the licensing 2006.

Herefordshire Council Licensing Policy states that any premises failing a test purchase will be reviewed.

Representation have been received from West Mercia Police, Herefordshire Council Trading Standards and the Licensing Authority.

Key Considerations

To consider what action should be taken, if any, to promote the four licensing objectives in accordance with the recommendation.

Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of Reviews states at paragraph: -

11.29 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:

- for the sale and distribution of Class A drugs and the laundering of the proceeds of drugs crime;
- for the sale and distribution of illegal firearms;
- for the evasion of copyright in respect of pirated or unlicensed films and music, which does considerable damage to the industries affected;
- for the illegal purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people;
- for prostitution or the sale of unlawful pornography;
- by organised groups of paedophiles to groom children;
- as the base for the organisation of criminal activity, particularly by gangs;
- for the organisation of racist activity or the promotion of racist attacks;
- for knowingly employing a person who is unlawfully in the UK or who cannot lawfully be employed as a result of a condition on that person's leave to enter; for unlawful gambling; and
- for the sale of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.
- 11.30 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered. We would also encourage liaison with the local Community Safety Partnership.

The attention of the Committee is drawn to the stated case of Daniel Thwaites Plc v Wirral Borough Magistrates' Court (Case No: CO/5533/2006) at the High Court of Justice Queen's Bench Division Administrative Court on 6 May 2008, [2008] EWHC 838 (Admin), 2008 WL 1968943, Before the Honourable Mrs Justice Black. In this case it was summed up that: -

"Among other things, section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that in carrying out its functions a licensing authority must have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The requirement is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, it is recognised that the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and so long as the Guidance has been properly and carefully understood and considered, licensing authorities may depart from it if they have reason to do so. When doing so, licensing authorities will need to give full reasons for their actions. Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken."

Community Impact

11 It is felt that any decision made will have a minimal impact on the Community.

Legal Implications

- 12 Schedule 5 Section 8(2) gives a right of appeal to:
 - a) the applicant for the review,
 - b) the holder of the premises licence, or
 - c) any person who made relevant representation in relation to the application.

Section 9 states that any such appeal must be made to a Magistrates Court for the area in which the premises are situated within 21 days of notification of the decision.

Consultees

- Responsible authorities and persons living or with a business interest within the vicinity of the premises.
- A copy of the application was served on the responsible authorities. This was backed up by an email sent to them by the Licensing Authority.
- The notice of review was displayed on the premises prior to the start of the consultation period and was displayed for 28 days. In addition the notice was also displayed at the offices of the Licensing Unit at Bath Street, Hereford over the same period.

I am an officer authorised under the Licensing Act 2003.

I refer to review application which I have submitted in respect of Gwalia Stores, Ross on Wye.

The premises is an independent retailer situated in the centre of Ross on Wye selling general grocery goods and alcohol.

The premises was the subject of a test purchase operation when it served a 16 year old youth without making an challenge.

The review was launched on 17th July 2012 and a copy of the application and the notice were served on the premises.

It is therefore disappointing to note that at this time no contact has been made with the Licensing Authority by the premises licence holder Mr Ramanathan RATHEYAN. This is particularly alarming as records clearly indicate that this is the fourth test purchase failure in the past 5 years.

As no contact has been made by the holder of the licence I cannot be satisfied that this person has an intention to promote any of the licensing objectives and through the lack of contact would appear not to be taking the matter seriously. For this reason I request that the Licensing Committee consider **revocation** of the premises licence,

However if the committee were not minded to take this course of action then the very minimum that the Licensing Authority would like done to the licence in order to promote the licensing objectives is as follows:

- 1) Removal of the current designated premise supervisor.
- 2) That a personal licence holder shall be on the premises at all times alcohol is offered for sale.
- 3) All staff engaged in the sale of alcohol to be trained in Responsible alcohol retailing to the minimum standard of BIIAB level 1 or any equivalent training agreed by Herefordshire Council Trading Standards within 1 month of commencing employment at the premises. (Where there are existing staff this training shall be completed within 1 month of the date that this condition first appears on the licence). Retraining shall take place every 6 months. Training records shall be kept on the premises and produced to the police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of Herefordshire Council on demand.
- 4) A written register of refusals will be kept including a description of the people who have been unable to provide required Identification to prove their age. Such records shall be kept for a period of 12 months and will be collected on a daily basis by the Designated Premises Supervisor and produced to the police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of Herefordshire Council on demand.
- 5) The premises shall operate a Challenge 25 Policy. Such policy shall be written down and kept at the premises. The policy shall be produced on demand of the Police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of Herefordshire Council. West Mercia Police are in receipt of a review application for **Gwalia Stores**, **Broad Street**, **Ross on Wye**.

This review application is submitted in the name of Herefordshire Council Licensing Authority and came about as a result of Herefordshire Council Trading Standards operation to check age verification standards with regards to the sale of age restricted goods and in particular the sale of alcohol to young people.

This operation took place on 27 June 2012, and resulted in an underage sale of alcohol to a young person.

This premise has been subject to a number of similar operations in the past. A number of these have resulted in sales of alcohol to underage young people on the following dates -

13/08/2010 26/08/2008 23/12/2007.

The premises licence holder and the specified designated premises supervisor for this shop is Ratheyan Ramanathan. He has been in this position of authority since 2006 and therefore was in place throughout the period when the test purchase failures took place.

It is a fact that the sale of alcohol to young people has a detrimental effect to their health and wellbeing. The need to ensure these sales do not take place is a mandatory condition on all premises licences issued under the Licensing Act 2003. It is the responsibility of licensed premises to actively promote the licensing objectives - and in particular those of the prevention of crime and disorder and the protection of children from harm.

It is the view of West Mercia Police that this premises has failed to comply with the conditions attached to the premises licence and therefore has not promoted the licensing objectives. It is the view of West Mercia Police that due to the history of the premises that the premises licence for this location should be revoked.

On 27/6/12 a sale of alcohol was made to a 16 year old child. The seller did not ask for any identification to determine the child's age before selling the alcohol. The store was displaying shelf edge markers showing both Challenge 21 and Challenge 25 policies in use and therefore it was unclear which policy was being used.

Herefordshire Council Trading Standards make the following representation regarding this matter and feel the following conditions and changes are made to the premises licence.

- 1) Removal of the current designated premise supervisor.
- 2) That a personal licence holder shall be on the premises at all times alcohol is offered for sale.
- 3) All staff engaged in the sale of alcohol to be trained in Responsible alcohol retailing to the minimum standard of BIIAB level 1 or any equivalent training agreed by Herefordshire Council Trading Standards within 1 month of commencing employment at the premises. (Where there are existing staff this training shall be completed within 1 month of the date that this condition first appears on the licence). Retraining shall take place every 6 months. Training records shall be kept on the premises and produced to the police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of Herefordshire Council on demand
- 4) A written register of refusals will be kept including a description of the people who have been unable to provide required Identification to prove their age.
