The premises is a multi national small size convience store.

On Monday 13 December 2010, a search warrant was executed at the premises. This was a joint operation between Herefordshire Trading Standards, HM Revenue and Customs, supported by officers from West Mercia Police. On this occasion, the premises licence holder Mr AZAD was on the premises. In the region of 300,000 cigarettes, 10kg of tobacco and a large amount of alchol was seized. None of these items had been subject HMRC procedure and therefore no UK tax had been paid.

On Wednesday 16 March 2011, a further warrant was executed at the premises. On this occasion 4,400 cigarettes were seized for the same reasons as in December 2010.

On this visit it was established that Mr AZAD was not at the premises and that he was believed to be out of the country and had been since shortly after the visit in December. Therefore the premises does not have a designated premises supervisor and any sales of alcohol will be an unauthorised liceansable activity. On this occasion a notice under S19 Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001 was served on a member of staff at the premises, indicating that there had been a breach of the premises licence and therefore the sale of alcohol should cease

These breaches directly impact on the licensing objectives of the prevention of serious crime and disorder.

I am giving this certificate because I am of the opinion that other procedures under the Licensing Act are inappropriate in this case, because.

- Two separate incidents where warrants were executed at the premises resulting in large amounts of tobacco, cigarettes and alcohol were found and seized. It has been established that these items are smuggled goods and have not been subject to HMRC checks and tax compliance
- The most recent visit established that the premises licence holder Ali AZAD is out of the country and has not been seen at the premises since December 2010. Therefore there is no designated premises supervisor in place and any sales of alcohol are unlicensed.
- The interim conditions being sought are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime, the protection of children from harm and ensuring public safety.
