Decision made:	To introduce a 'click and collect' library service from Kington Library,
	along with the collection of green garden waste sacks that have
	been pre-ordered and paid for.
	Initial hours of operation to be Tuesday 10.00 – 1.00 and Saturday
	11.00 – 13.00. This is in line with existing sites delivering 'click and
	collect' operating for approximately one third of their historic
	opening hours. This to be subject to regular review.
	The service will begin on 26 th September 2020.
Reasons for decision:	The eleven sites delivering a library service on behalf of
	Herefordshire Council were closed on March 20 th 2020 due to the
	COVID-19 outbreak. In line with government guidance, libraries have
	been allowed to operate again from 4 th July. The national
	professional body, Libraries Connected, has worked with the
	Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport as well as Public
	Health England, to produce a library recovery toolkit. This has been adopted as best practice across England and recommends a phased
	reintroduction of library services.

	Herefordshire Library Service has worked with the relevant other
	Council Departments to ensure due process is followed to provide
	the service in a manner that is safe for staff and customers.
	Haraford Pass Loominster and Ladhury libraries are already
	Hereford, Ross, Leominster and Ledbury libraries are already offering a 'click and collect' type service.
	Customers will be able to order library books in advance, these
	requests will be collated for them and they will be advised when the
	books are ready for collection. Collection will be from the front door
	of the relevant building.
	In addition, Kington library will also be a collection point for green
	in addition, kington library will also be a collection point for green

	garden waste sacks that have been pre-ordered and paid for via the Herefordshire Council website.
Highlight any associated risks/finance/legal/equality considerations:	A full COVID-19 secure risk assessment has been undertaken to ensure ways of working that will protect both staff and customers. This has been shared with and approved by both Herefordshire Council's Health & Safety team and UNISON. The service's revenue budget includes costs for staff to provide the service. The only financial implication will be for ongoing PPE such as
	hand sanitizer. Legal advice has been sought. This advice has confirmed that in accordance with current UK Government guidance, updated on July 3 rd , we may reintroduce the library service.
	The service will also ensure compliance with any legal obligations that may be required as part of the UK Government's Test and Trace programme. Currently this does not apply to 'click and collect' type services but should this change, then appropriate compliance measures will be undertaken.
Details of any alternative options considered and rejected:	The option not to reintroduce the service yet was considered. This was rejected as this element of the service can be reintroduced safely and is in line with national guidance
