Consultation:	Informal consultation has taken place with partner agencies, primary care and community hospital in favour of trialling interventions to manage those most vulnerable and complex drinkers and increase early identification of risky and problematic drinking. No consultation with service users completed due to time constraints. A specialist community provider for alcohol treatment is already commissioned by the Council therefore approaching the market at this time would not result in better value for money.			
Decision made:	To award a variation to the existing contract, for the remainder of the current financial year 21/22, for Specialist Alcohol treatment to fund specialist assertive outreach workers and online interventions to increase early identification of risky drinking including evaluation of the project.			
Reasons for decision:	Evidence suggests increased use of alcohol throughout the covid-19 pandemic, the closure of many support services and reduced contact with support networks or health services such as GP will have significantly delayed early identification of problematic and risky drinking. Increasing the reach of the current service to expand online interventions and campaigns for early identification of risky drinking will contribute to preventing a further escalation of alcohol related harm including liver damage and increased mental ill health.			

The specialist provider will be commissioned to ; : Deliver increased online marketing, awareness and harm reduction Deliver online Self Help modules Increased Brief Interventions following identification of risky drinking by partner agencies e.g. GP Health Checks, Mental Health services, Online Self screening Nationally, alcohol related deaths rose by 19.6% in 2020, this is the highest level recorded in a single calendar year since the start of modern records (in 2001). Locally we have seen increasing deaths in vulnerable drinkers, many of whom have had disruption to their engagement in support services due to the impact of the pandemic. Changes to support systems have also led to increased mental health issues and complexities in many cases. The specialist provider will be commissioned to; recruit specialist assertive outreach workers to increase the successful engagement of the most complex and vulnerable drinkers. Reducing the risk of ongoing harm and frequent admission to hospital. Individuals requiring support will be identified primarily through the alcohol multi-disciplinary team (MDT) hosted by Wye Valley Trust. An evaluation of the project will be completed detailing activity levels and recommendations for future provision.
