

## Record of officer decision

<b>Decision title:</b>	Decision to implement the public spaces protection order for Garrick multi storey car park
<b>Date of decision:</b>	21 April 2022

<b>Consultation:</b>	The Chief Officer of Police, Police and Crime Commissioner, Council cabinet members, ward councillor, town council, residents and businesses local to the area, users of the car park have been consulted and 93% of those who responded are in agreement that the order should be implemented. <b>Legal Services: The consultation required under section 72(4) of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 has taken place and accordingly the implementation of the order would be lawful.</b>
<b>Decision made:</b>	That the public spaces protection order for the Garrick multi-storey carpark made under Section 59 of the Antisocial Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014 is implemented
<b>Reasons for decision:</b>	For a number of years there has been complaints regarding Anti-social behaviour (ASB) at the Garrick Multi storey car park. The majority of complaints have been received by the Police with a number being reported to Environmental Health. Complaints in general were about drug use, noise, racing cars, skateboarding and cycling. The Multi agency tasking and coordination group (MATAC) has been tackling the issues on a multi-agency basis in an attempt to stop the ASB. Measures have been put in place include increased security at certain times, additional CCTV cameras, ANPR camera on the entrance and exit. There was also a community trigger which was actioned regarding the noise created from the ASB in the car park. Whilst the car park was relatively quiet during Covid the ASB has now started up again and therefore further action was needed on what was already in place. Further CCTV cameras are being installed and to implement a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO). The 4 tests were met to carry out a consultation to determine the need for the order and 95% of responders stated there was antisocial behaviour in the car park and 93% stated that the order should be implemented showing a clear majority to implement the order
