	It is Herefordshire Councils ambition that all people have access to safe,
	appropriate accommodation, which meets their immediate needs and
	provides a safe space. The provision of pods will form part of the council's approach to preventing and relieving homelessness.

There is an established demand for the provision of winter accommodation, as of October 2023 there are 18 people rough sleeping in the county. Demand data demonstrates up to 22 individuals will typically require this service. This proposal ensures we have sufficient accommodation to safely and appropriately accommodate males and females safely and meet the forecasted local demand. Advice of Herefordshire Council Planning Department has been taken and a planning application will be submitted, whilst this decision is determined, the premises can be used as set out. Equality considerations. The premises are level access and a level access toilet. Separate accommodation can be provided on site for males and females. It will be staffed during opening times to ensure compliance with the conditions of admittance and acceptable behaviour. **Details of any** Alternative options considered: alternative options considered and Do nothing this was rejected for the following reasons: rejected: Funding has been provided to the council to enable this provision to be in place. Should it not be used for its intended purpose it would need to be returned to DLUHC, this would be a lost opportunity for the council to provide winter provision for a very vulnerable cohort of people and could lead to reputational damage to the council. The council has a duty provide emergency accommodation under the Severe Weather Emergency Protocol (SWEP) to protect people experiencing rough sleeping in the event of extreme weather, should there be no offer of a winter shelter this is likely to exceed the cost of this proposal leading to additional costs for the council. Utilise funding to deliver on street winter survival packs. This option was rejected as this could lead to negative outcomes for people experiencing rough sleeping including serious injury or death.
