Decision made:	To approve up to £107,940.00 of the Household Support Fund grant to deliver the Warmth on Prescription scheme. Individuals referred can receive up to £330 in energy support payments, an energy support pack as well as advice on how to reduce energy bills. Each pack will be tailored to the customer, depending on requirements, and will be made up of the following items: - Low energy LED lightbulbs (X8 bulbs) - Small electric throw - Radiator reflector panels (X3 sheets) - Draught proofing tape (covering doors and windows) Customers will also receive the standard Keep Herefordshire Warm energy pack items which include: temperature gage, shower timer, bag for life, radiator bleeding key, meter reading kit and energy saving tips leaflet.
Reasons for decision:	Herefordshire Council has received an allocation of £2,659,203.57 from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) under the Household Support Fund. In line with DWP guidance most of the funding should be earmarked to support those most in need and affected by the recent cost of living crisis. The decision to support vulnerable people with medical conditions that are facing fuel poverty would meet the recommended guidance. Individuals with respiratory conditions tend to be at greater risk of poor health and more vulnerable to the colder weather. These individuals therefore typically need to spend more on their fuel bills in order to keep warm over the winter months and if they are not able to their health conditions can be exacerbated. Individuals will be identified via a network of health professionals via referral into the 'Keep Herefordshire Warm' programme. This is to ensure those most in need are best placed to be in receipt of the funding. Individuals referred to the scheme can receive up to £330 in energy support as well as receiving advice on how to reduce energy bills within their household. Individuals will also receive a support pack to reduce energy consumption. The support provided could benefit up to 230 households.

	financially disadvantaged (although this is not in itself a protected
	characteristic within the Equality Act 2010). If there are households in urgent
	need due to rising living costs, they may access support through the Local
	Welfare Provision service of the Council.
	The scheme specifically targets families on low incomes with children who
	are eligible for free school meals. It will also aim to target disabled
	households, especially those that have high utility bills. The Household
	Support Fund will provide additional support to other financially
	disadvantaged households in Herefordshire, many of these households will
	include those who share a protected characteristic e.g. age, so by utilising
	the scheme this will support the council in discharging its Equality duty by
	supporting many of these households to access these funds through third
	party agencies.

	of their equality responsibilities in regards to the Equality Act.
