There is the potential within the contract for a contract variation to meet need and in March 2022 the number of Independent Visitors was increased from 18 to support up to 28 children and young people.

Social Workers and Independent Reviewing Officers are encouraged to make referrals to the service based on individual need, and this has recently been re-iterated across the service

NYAS continues to raise the profile of the service via regular liaison with the Local Authority. The service is currently matching children and young people to Independent Visitors. There are three Independent Visitors who are currently in recruitment. As such over the next few weeks we anticipate that this will mean that 28 children and young people in total should have an Independent Visitor.

Demand for the service is reviewed on a regular basis and within quarterly contract meetings and will always seek to expand the service as need and demand increase.

| We do not yet, as a council, have a firm timeline to extend the use of family group conferences to children and families supported by early nelp. Our priority as we expand our service at this stage, is to focus on children and families on the edge of care and for whom reunificatio s a possibility. We've spoken to our partners in Leeds and they have explained it did take them a number of years to get to the position that hey are now in and that is where family group conferences are being offered as widely as they are in Leeds. We are working closely with | |

them to learn from their experience and obviously to try and speed up our expansion efforts. Our family group conference coordinators are independent of the case management, as they are in Leeds, and that future service redesign - expected early next year - will further reinforce that position."
