Summary of engagement or consultation undertaken (eg. who you've engaged with, and how, or why do you believe this is not required)

Engagement is ongoing with key stakeholders including current provider to gain their view on development opportunities for the service. Engagement with young people who have experience of living in a supported accommodation settings is planned both in face-to-face meetings and via surveys. The key findings from the engagement and coproduction activities will inform the development of the service specification.

Key stakeholders within the children and young people directorate have been consulted with to review the potential impact and ensure all options and the impact have been given due consideration.

The service is currently delivered from 8 properties owned by Herefordshire Council. One of these properties offering 5 homes for young people will continue to be used as part of this contract. 3 homes will not be used moving forward as the current contract has demonstrated the location of these is not suitable.

The Council has recently secured funding from the government to deliver a Single Homelessness Accommodation Programme (SHAP), the funding supports the Governments Rough Sleeping Strategy published in September 2022. SHAP funding can be utilised to provide supported accommodation for young people over the age of 18 who are at risk of or experiencing homelessness or rough sleeping including care experienced young people. This funding will allow the Council to purchase properties which will be used as a step down provision in the preparation for young people become ready in the future to live alone. It is proposed to use SHAP funding to deliver 10 additional properties for use under this contract, alongside the existing 5 homes currently used growing the service from 8 to 15 homes.

The Council's Sufficiency Strategy for Children and Young People 2023-2028 highlights the need to take multiple approaches to build capacity across all placements. Increasing the availability of local supported accommodation supports the council's commitment to its care leavers as Corporate Parent. There are options for accommodating care leavers and 16 and 17 year old children in care in Herefordshire however due to levels of demand for this type of accommodation a number of young people continue to be accommodated out of county which are often spot purchased placements at significant cost. When you factor in the likelihood that young people who live out of county grow roots in that area but may have to wait longer to be housed there is often an additional cost to the LA in supporting these young people for longer as a result. The provision of additional local accommodation with support will enable vulnerable young people to remain close to their local connections and provide a local, good quality and cost effective service. This is expected to improve outcomes for individual young people.

Young people living in this accommodation will be children in care and care leavers aged 16-25 who have, by the very virtue of being a looked after child, experienced trauma and adverse childhood experiences. Young people may also have multiple and have been exposed to high risk environmental factors (i.e groomed to exploit) which leads to vulnerabilities such as substance misuse, mental health needs, antisocial or challenging behaviour, offending history and vulnerability to criminal or sexual exploitation.

The service will operate a hub and spoke model to offer a flexible mixed economy of accommodation including supported accommodation staffed 24/7 and supported accommodation with outreach support. In addition to support the service will also provide housing management to promote the occupants' capacity to manage their own tenancies in the future. The service will also deliver floating support for 12 months for those young people who have secured move on into independent tenancies in the community to ensure any risk of future tenancy failure is mitigated against. The aim of this is to help support young people to sustain their tenancies wherever possible and reduce the number of young people who need to return to provision which offers higher level support for second and third chances. There is a careful balance to be had with providing the level of support and second chances, as we would to our own children, and enabling young people need support for longer to feel confident and able to live alone. This model strengthens that opportunity by providing a stronger accommodation and support offer which will, in turn, reduce the number of our young people experiencing homelessness.

Opportunities for care leavers to develop and achieve improved outcomes will be enabled through a service that will work in partnership to develop and implement a personalised support plan for each person, identifying how they can manage their own needs, mitigate risks and take up opportunities. The aim is for young people to transition from the accommodation towards independent living within 2 years however this can be flexed if needed.

The service will be commissioned using an outcome focused approach and providers will select their own delivery model .The support service will be procured via a single tender approaching the market in this way supports competitive tendering and provides opportunities for new partnerships to develop. The contracts will be as flexible as possible allowing for additional investment should it become available or for funding to be withdrawn if needs change.

The service will be delivered to a mix of young people with a variety of needs. Whilst each young person will have their own space, opportunity for group work in shared spaces forms part of the service provision. The main 24/7 staffed property includes indoor and outdoor recreational and shared space this provides opportunities for interactions between young people and external other agencies/ providers.

This service also supports the agreed priorities in Herefordshire's health and wellbeing strategy, including mental health and wellbeing. This service is for vulnerable care leavers and it is expected the service will have a positive impact on young people particularly people with mental health needs.

Whilst each young person will have their own independent living area, there will be a shared front door to the property. It is possible that relationships between and behaviours of the young people living in the accommodation, or those they associate with within the property, may lead to cohesion issues. This will be mitigated by the provision of 24/7 support within the accommodation with support staff having access to the shared front door and communal areas. The support provider will work with the young people to address any issues that arise within the property, with neighbours or within the wider community.
