Thank you for your email

I am rather confused with the request for further model conditions

We are a small country bowls club and at the most will have no more than 60 members /visitors at any function. We have about 12 functions a year and the rest of the time the bar will be open on club evening/days to members. Very, very rarely do we have children.

We have safe guarding policies for children and vulnerable adults in place.

We have a member with a B11AB Personal Alcohol License.

We can agree to the conditions of Public safety, Prevention of Crime and disorder, Challenge 25, keep a record of refusals etc .

However is this B11AB level 1 course really necessary?

The expense of such a course just adds to the amount we seem to have spent in obtaining a Club License. Our Planned Club Bar activities do not seem to add up to professionally training our delegated members vetoed by the committee.

We are not a business but an amateur sports club and a club premises certificate was applied for, to make sure we were operating our proposed bar within the licensing laws.
